The SPAJERS (Society for the Preservation of Ancient Junketing)

As part of the celebrations in Bampton (Oxfordshire) for the Queen's Coronation on June 2nd 1953 it was decided to run a pram race through the town with one person in the pram and another pushing it stopping at a number of public houses where one had to drink a half pint of ale. Money was collected at this event by nurses from the then Radcliffe Infirmary hospital in Oxford and used for their hospital. This apparently raised more than they expected, so it was decided to run this race annually and has been ever since. The proceeds are now given to all Bampton Pensioners at Christmas, with an outing to the Seaside in the summer.

The present committee are in the throes of putting together an exhibition of photos etc to mark our 60th year. It would be greatly appreciated if you could let us have a letter in recognition of this event for our exhibition.

Please find enclosed a copy of the original letter that went out to all householders in Bampton together with copies of what was paid to them in 1954 and also our latest accounts which now show we pay each pensioner £20 at Christmas. Now there are over 400 of them.

A GREAT SHIRT RACE

As run in Foreign Parts.

Traditionally this Race is as follows:-

Competitors are in pairs, each pair should possess themselves of an ankle length night shirt. If this is not possible, owing to the preponderance of new fangled pyjamas, an ankle length chemise, nightdress smock, frock, or dressing gown etc. may be used.

Also each pair must equip themselves with a handcart, failing this, a baby carriage, invalid chair, wheelbarrow, or any pushable conveyance.

The Race will be from the Mill Arches, to the Swan Inn Buckland Road, with stops at the Elephant & Castle, Wheatsheaf, Horseshoe, Talbot, Jubilee, and New, Inns.

It is to be regretted that the other desirable Houses must be bypassed owing to the length of the Route, but next year the Race will be re-routed to put this in order.

The P. A. J.'s Official Starter will preside with D.B. Gun and blanks. The Traditional method was by Blunderbuss (Powder only fired skyward)

One Participant must sit in the conveyance and his partner be prepared to push at a stylish trot

On the Starter's gun a smart gallop must be made to the Elephant & Castle Inn whereat each man must pay for and drink not less than one half pint of alcoholic liquor.

Again, traditionally, spectators should ascertain that the runners drink not less than the stipulated amount, and no drink paid for in advance to save time.

On completion of this dring, the pusher must be the passenger, and a still faster gallop made to the Wheatsheaf Inn with the procedure performed again, and so on to the Swan Inn.

Regulations are as follows: Start at the top of Bridge Street on to the Elephant and Castle, Wheatshaf, Horse Shoe, Talbot Hotel, Jubilee, New Inn, and first in the entrance of the Swan Inn the Wimmers.

Four Watchers of the highest integrity at each house.

Watchers will receive a high class badge (with chain) in due course.

Vehicles to have numbers for the Watcher's benefit.

Vehicles to have means of audible warning, i.e. bell, horn, whistle, trumpet or portable harmonium,

Vehicles specially designed for Shirt Racing to be handicapped if the Watchers consider it necessary.

Entrance fees will be collected seven days before the Race, including 10d for numbers.

Numbers not plainly shown will disqualify.

After the Watchers at the first stop have observed that all refreshments have been absorbed in a right and proper fashion, it is their duty to proceed quickly to the next stop to assist their friends in seeing drinks are being rightfully dispensed. So, eight Watchers proceed to the third stop and so on. At the New Inn, for the last reviver, it is hoped to hand one Watcher for each pair of racers.



This only in the event of two of your patrons winning.


A little judicious advertising has been arranged and a select committee will sponsor a collection for local old age pensioners, so the Race this time will be of more tangible service to the Community.

Bampton entrants win the great shirt race: Rain cuts attendance

TWO young Bampton men, Thorarinn Benediks, aged 19, and John Wixey, 18, were the winners of "the great shirt race" at Bampton on Saturday night.

Robert Radband and Cyril Smith, who had won the event for the last three years, were beaten into third place.

Revived six years ago, the race is said to be a 19th century Whitsuntide custom, the entrants competing in pairs and racing through the town wearing night-shirts or similar garments, and in turn pushing each other in perambulators, hand-carts, barrows or, in fact, in any sort of contraption on wheels.

Spectators travelled from miles around to watch the race and crowds of people lined the route.

The weather was fairly kind, for after a wet day the rain stopped some time before the competitors went to the starting line and did not begin again until after the race was over.

But, no doubt, it affected the attendance, which was unfortunate, as the Society for the Preservation of Ancient Junketing, the organisers, depend largely on the event to raise funds for the Bampton old age pensioners' Christmas fund.

Nevertheless the crowds gave generously and the fund should benefit considerably.

EQUAL TO RECORD FIELD

The weather did not deter the competitors, and 21 pairs, equal to last year's record field, were marshalled across the road at the starting line.

The course, about three-quarters of a mile long, had been changed this year and was a much improved one, at least from the spectator's point of view, as the competitors passed twice through the Market Square, where it was possible for hundreds of people to congregate. The finishing line was opposite the Women's Institute hall.

Perhaps the most doubtful pleasure for the runners was the fact that they had to stop at six inns en route and drink half a pint of ale at each one.

For the very young entrants glasses of lemonade were standing with the beer on the tables outside the inns.

WOMEN COMPETITORS

Mr. Paul Bovington, using a public address system, called the runners to the starting line by the New Inn, and they were off when the official starter, Mr.

Ernest Shepherd, raised a 12-bore gun to his shoulder and fired.

The first stop was the Jubilee, where the glasses of ale disappeared in a single gulp, but already the field had begun to spread out.

Two women competitors with a perambulator were already in the rear, but they were obviously enjoying themselves too much to worry about their position in the race.

Through the Square to the Talbot, the Horseshoes, the Elephant and on to the Wheat-sheaf raced the entrants, and as they turned along Church View and Church Street on the last lap, spectators took up their positions near the finishing post. Round the corner into the Square came the first runners.

Most of them overshot the last inn, the Dragon and Lamb, only to swirl round in the pools of water and dash for the last half pint. Then on to the finish where the ten first pairs became eligible for a prize.

Benediks and Wixey, who were sixth last year, were closely followed by two corporals from the Royal Corps of Signals, Weald, Bampton — Quentin Gray, aged 19, and Barry Cripps, aged 20.

ALE AND CUPS

The results were confirmed after the judges had checked that the competitors had their clearance tickets from each inn to show they had suitably disposed of the ale.

Mr. J. Beddington, of Bampton, distributed the prizes.

The first prize was five gallons of ale and two inscribed cups. The runners-up received a "Steam alarm, mark 3," a mysterious piece of equipment in which the three main parts were a gas ring, a kettle and an alarm clock. But if they wished, the corporals could exchange it for bottles of whisky.

The day's festivities ended with a dance at the WI Hall.
