1789 map & survey (see xerox) whole site part of no.7: Burnt House, garden, + publish (then held with Ham Court) - Note that Mrs. Sammons (tenant of Ham Court) has repaired it, + let it to han waring, who has planted + much improved the garden at her an expense.

This seems to be the tenent held in 1700 by Jane Coxeter [wife of fichard Coxeter of Weeld Monor, or rather its presented under a lease of 1643, + described as: "a college, now the white Hart Inn in Compton called Jordan's cottage, in the Whing of William Stamp, & a newbrage or tenent in Weald with 12 yardlands, occupied

by Jane Conster".

(There are no other refs to the White Hart Inn, which cross probably elected since Cronsell House etc. call hardly be called a "collage"—

(smithy not maked on 1876 Ordnance Survey map, but is in 1921).

The house is late 16th-century in origin, with a short using (abbe) soon after) on N. along Church Street, (probably the service end).

-originally timber-framed:

-in the 18th century most of the roofs (working southwards to the Commell House sed) were reneved. (If "Burnt House" can be taken literally, it is possible some of the roof and or timber framing at the south end was barraged - though we saw no endowe of burning).
