I wrote The Pillbox several years ago. A small company was interested in putting it on and it was given a rehearsed reading. Then other things happened, and it went back in that famous bottom drawer that all writers have. It was when the opportunity to put on an exhibition on pillboxes in the Vesey Room arose that I remembered it – and that is why you are about to see its first ever performance, in Bampton Village Hall.

My original idea was to write a trilogy of short plays all based around the same pillbox in the same community set at twenty year intervals: 1940, 1960 and 1980. The intention was to explore changes in society through the post-war period while following the consequences of certain dramatic events for the individuals and families involved. I may still complete the project, but for the time being we just have the 1940 instalment, which sees four very different men of the Home Guard waiting around their newly built pillbox for what seemed the inevitable German invasion. The tensions that build among them are explosively intensified when a young woman from the village shows up at the pillbox with a picnic basket for her fiancé...

Simon Rae

**Simon Rae** set his first stage play on Millennium Eve, and has been writing and producing plays ever since. His theatre company, Top Edge Productions, has toured the length and breadth of the UK and have been invited to take part in this year's Gdansk International Shakespeare Festival. Simon is also a poet, biographer, broadcaster and novelist.

Tom Blackmore has been developing new work for the theatre for 20 years, adapting and presenting material for performance and directing new work by writers such as Frank Cottrell-Boyce, Jean Findlay, Simon Rae, and Sue Casson. His own first play, Making History, an intimate history of the Nuremberg Trials, based on recently recovered letters exchanged between chief British prosecutor David Maxwell Fyfe and his wife in 1946, was premiered in Britain to critical acclaim, and is currently under development for a film entitled Under an English Heaven.
