1925: On the saturday one of the dancers was ill. (Frank Tanner?) His grandfather told Sonner that he would dance on the Monday; he refused and got a clip round the ear. He went into the cellar where his father asked him what the trouble was. When he told his father he was clipped round the ear again, and told to get into the yard to practise. Previously, Sonner hadn't been interested in regular dancing; although he had (like Frank Woodley) often stepped in for the odd dance.

On returning home on the Whit Monday, they were in their cups, and had an argument over something

(perhaps the dancing or Jinkey's fee?) and Nipper Dixey broke Jinkey's fiddle. AW has it now and has repaired it. (ST)

1920's: General notes.

The Old team practised from the Friday before Easter, six nights a week for half an hour a night. Then had a couple of hours on Whit Saturday in the Elephant, which local people could watch if they paid to come in.

Sam Bennett was kept and fed at the Elephant.

The odd man - usually 'Cocky' Tanner - carried the coats, pipes, pins, needles, etc.

The Fool then collected as well, including chasing cars.

On Whit Monday, the team was ready to start at 8a.m. (ST)was ready at 6 a.m. in 1925). They had a pint at the Elephant, all the dancers put a shilling in the hatto start it rattling, then went off down the Weald bottom. Back to the Elephant at 10 or 10.35 for a half hour eat. By now the crowds had been brought up from the station to the Elephant. After eating (i.e. 10.30 or 10.45) they went into town. In the afternoon they danced at the big gardens. Back to the Elephant at night to share out the money (Sam Bennett got an equal share as the others). Outside of the pub car lights were rigged up and there was barn dancing until three or four o'clock in the morning.

There was some casual dancing on the day after.

Everybody just took the time off of work; ST never remembers anyone getting the sack - it was an accepted practise.

On the Saturday after Whit, the team went out to

Clanfield to dance.

On the Saturday following that, they danced at Alvescot; then at Stafford-Cripps' house at Filkins, where they had tea. Then onto the 'Lamb and Flag' in Filkins.

1931: Frank Woodley first danced this year; previously disinterested in dancing regularly. Only danced this and the following year.

Either this year or 1932, 'Brannan' Brooks shit his trousers at Stratford. (FW)

1932: At 3 a.m., the brook started rising, and by morning the lowers end of the town was under water. The old team turned out and were carried over the water to dance in the centre of town.

ST danced in the afternoon. Jinkey's side didn't go out at all.

Other information gathered 10th-12th. November, 1978.

There were some cottages opposite Weald Manor Farm which were knocked down around 1916 or 17, where some of the damcing Tanners and Hunts lived.

1927: Sam Bennett brought over a team of women from Ilmington to dance at Bampton, in the evening. They wore black skifts and white tops, with a few bells on their arms and no ribbons. They 'looked like a morgue', said Sonny.

Sonny used to go over to Sam Bennett's orchards to get plums, and Sam would arrange for him to dance a few jigs for the other customers. Sonny got the plums free for this.

When Frank Woodley danced there was a 'regimented' style of dancing, with everybody coming off the same foot. When they finished a dance, they walked round in a circle until the next dance, unless a break was agreed upon. He thought that the Shergold side was a 'shambles'.

The team used to dance wearing boots; and Sonny did just that in his first few years.

Sonny's son Jim first danced in 1952 when 9 years old.

Jim Buckingham's sister, Kit (Kizzy) went to school with Sonny. She 'used to like a jig', and danced in civvies up to the late 1960's.

Arnold trained Bill and Frankie Daniels, Jasper Walsh and Jim Buckingham. Francis tries to Poach boys; currently trying to get Anthony Collett, among others.
