A WOODLAND FOR BAMPTON

Creation of an area of woodland would be a truly permanent way of marking the beginning of the third Millennium. The immediate surroundings of Bampton lack

ancient woodland and only minor plantings have taken place in recent times. A well designed wood, even of modest size. would offer an area of lasting interest and enjoyment for the people of the village. There would be many opportunities for volunteers to participate in planting and care of the woodland while the children of the village could also be invited to help - particularly with the introduction of native woodland flowers. The children would also have the permanent benefit of a centre for ecological study. With the passing of each season the growth of the new trees could be observed and, within the life of the many people in

the village, the woodland would have begun to mature giving an enrichment of wild life and an appreciable improvement in the local environment.

The possibility of Bampton undertaking such a project has arisen following a contact with the Woodland Trust - which is the largest conservation charity concerned with the nation's woodlands, and an organisation similar in nature to the National Trust. The Woodland Trust operates by taking over existing woodlands, often as bequests, or by purchasing land to create new ones. Woodlands are then maintained in perpetuity for the benefit of the public in general with full provision for reasonable access. The Millennium commission is working with the Woodland Trust for the provision of funds from the National Lottery to encourage new woods close to towns and villages, and Bampton

is fortunate in being able to take advantage of this scheme. The Trust is prepared to carry out the process of land purchase, design, planting, and long term manage-



ment of such a project and to arrange more than half the necessary funding. The remainder will need to be raised by local efforts.

The project was given the endorsement of the village Millennium Committee, and the Parish Council following the village meeting on 1st February. The Woodland Trust was then able to open negotiations for land purchase. During earlier investigations. farmers owning land on the outskirts of the village had been approached, but only one expressed a willingness to sell a suitable area. This is, however, considered well suited for our purpose, being approximately 200 metres beyond the new recreation field and accessible both from the Buckland road and from a public right of way. A woodland created on this site would connect with an existing network of ditches and mature hedgerows which provide excellent wild life corridors.

project would admirably complement the landscaping planned for the Recreation Field which includes tree planting.

The Woodland Trust has finally reached an

agreement with the farmer for the purchase of 7.5 acres, which is sufficient for approximately 2,500 trees. We are now, therefore, in a position to open the project to the Village to agree the details of the layout and to launch the fund raising operation. The total budget for the creation of the wood together with maintenance for the first eight years comes to approximately £70,000, and the target amount to be raised locally is being set at £30,000. The fund raising programme will be organised by the Woodland Trust, but Graham Haslam of the Parish Council, John Battersby, and myself, will be providing local support. Public contributions will be through the completion of pledge forms with no pay-

ment being requested until we are sure that the target amount can be achieved. As a registered charity, the trust is able to claim a tax rebate on larger donations thus increasing their value by approximately one third. Pledge forms will be available at Abbey Properties - who have also kindly agreed to act as a collection point for completed forms.

Andrew Beer the Woodland Trust coordinator came along to a meeting in the Village Hall on the 22nd July. It was a well attended meeting. Mr. Beer explained in detail what the woodland project entailed. Everyone left feeling more positive knowing their ideas and wishes will be taken into consideration.

In the next edition of the 'Beam' we will be able to give a progress report - including, we hope, the news of the success of the fund raising.

THE BELLS OF ST MARY'S

Another bastion of male chauvinism was destroyed in the belfry of Bampton Church on the evening of Monday 12th July 1999. At the weekly bell ringing practice six of Bampton's own lady ringers were present, plus two lady ringers from the Clanfield tower. The Captain, David Rose, was pressured into letting the ladies take over the ringing of all eight bells for a short period. The three heaviest bells have always been considered too heavy for lady ringers. There is some justification in this view as the biggest bell weighs twenty-five hundredweight, making it one the heaviest in the County.

Three of the more experienced lady ringers were given a minute or so to prove they could ring the heavyweights after which the male ringers, with some reluctance, sat back to watch the ladies perform. After twenty seconds or so the ladies settled into a very good rhythm and gave a very acceptable performance - they needed a few seconds to overcome the shock of being allowed to take over the whole show.

There is every reason to believe that this was the very first time Bampton's famous bells have been rung by an all ladies team; so history, in all probability, has been made. The first lady ringer joined the team in the mid 1950s and the number of lady ringers has increased steadily since then. Bampton tower can also claim four husband and wife ringing combinations.

There is a rumour, at present unconfirmed, that three male ringers, all pensionable age, and with one hundred and sixty years of ringing experience between them, are seeking an urgent meting with the Vicar to negotiate redundancy/severance payment terms.

BAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Annual Parish Assembly

by Parish Council Chairman David Hawkins

It's not really a secret meeting, but from the poor attendance at this year's Annual Parish Assembly held in mid May at the Town Hall, you may have thought so. Reports from the Chairman of the Parish Council, Chairman of the Primary School Governors, The Welfare Trust and The Exhibition Foundation, for the past 12 months, makes for a good insight into what has been happening in our village. Below are the two reports given by the Parish Council Chairman, David Hawkins

Parish Chairman's Report

This is the 1st year of this council's 4-year term. We welcome Dr Graham Haslem and Mr Jonathan Phillips onto the Council. Your council has continued the Previous council's objectives to introduce improvements and maintain standards on so many Bampton issues and to support various village campaigns where applicable.

Campaigns

Market Square Garage Site -This attempt to raise £300,000 to prevent the developer building a three storey block of 10 flats was the most challenging campaign over this last 12 months. The Parish Council fully supported Mr Julian Johnston in his campaign and your chairman and Dr Haslem worked with him in the attempt to raise this huge sum of money. Within the 6 weeks available, some £100,000 was raised. This was a most creditable sum which reflected a very professionally run campaign. Although your Chairman and Dr Haslem then appealed to the developers to reconsider the design of the complex. They have announced that they cannot risk going back to WODC to amend their plans and that they will proceed with the building in June or July.

Your Council has fully supported the Church View campaign to provide only suitable low rise houses or bungalows in the small paddock area adjacent to The Youth Club. The 6 semi-detached houses planned by the developer have been strongly opposed for a number of reasons and we were surprised and most disap-

-pointed that WODC did not share our views. Your council is still not content that possible soil contamination in the paddock has been fully investigated and has insisted that the developer carries out appropriate

Your Council fully supported the Fire Fighters Recruitment Drive last July. The Oxfordshire Chief Fire Officer outlined the recruiting problems for firefighters here in Bampton, but active support from your council has helped to alleviate this tremendously

Your Council has maintained its efforts to produce a Cleaner and Tidier Bampton. Addition of new equipment for the Lengthman and closer liaison with WODC to minimise duplication of effort has meant the we have been able to clean up areas well away from the village centre - areas that previously remained untidy.

Other Issues

Law and Order - Your council remains concerned about the minor and, sometimes not so minor, acts of vandalism in Bampton. In spite of the police assuring us that crime figures for Bampton are very low in comparison with many other towns and villages, we insisted that we should meet with the police to express our concerns. We were told that police resources were being reorganised in Spring 1999 and that the level of police patrolling should im-

Traffic Calming - this scheme was introduced over a 3 month period last autumn. It was generally well received and feed back has been that it has helped to improve speed awareness. Certainly certain measures, e.g. in Buckland Road, seem to be working well. The council is not, however, content with the quality of the road markings and is withholding final payment to the contractor until it is made good.

Allotment Leases - The new allotment leases are now in place and lay down clearly what is expected of allotment hold-

Cemetery - considerable progress has

been made in the cemetery with a new and extended path, the removal of the fence, and the re-walling of the boundary fence to provide just a single access.

Future Projects

Your council has taken an active part in the Millennium plans for Bampton and have fully supported the Millennium Action Group in their efforts so far. On the basis that individual organisations should take on various projects (planning - funding - implementation), your council has agreed to consider the following:

- * New Bus Shelter next to the Horseshoe
- * An Internet Website for Bampton
- * A new Village Notice Board
- * A possible new clock for the Town Hall.

Affordabilty considerations will require us to consider which of these will proceed.

Market Square Improvements - notwithstanding the 3-storey building that will replace the garage, we are liaising closely with OCC Highways Department and with WODC to consider how best to improve the Market Square area.

We have some interesting ideas but all plans will be put to the village before final decisions are made.

Town Hall - Linked with the Market Square improvements is the urgent work needed to repair the stonework of the Town Hall, particularly on the South and West facing sides. Tenders for work over the next 5 years suggest that we will need to raise about £35,000. We are determined that this should be completed as soon as

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all councillors for their considerable support and enthusiasm. These sincere thanks are extended to your very hard working Clerk who has held the post of Clerk and Secretary over this period. In summary, your council has achieved much over this last year and we look forward to our remaining 3 years in

Report from the Trustees of the Recreation Ground.

The policy is to improve sporting and recreational facilities for all ages and both sexes. I am happy to report that all facilities are in a good state of repair and considerable improvements have been achieved over this last year.

Sandford's Field

Work during this year has concentrated on the surrounds which had become overgrown and thereby reducing the useful area. We are glad to report that this work is now complete.

Playing Field's

Pembroke Place and Mercury Close face high costs every year, just to keep pace with inspection reports. We are very grateful to Mr. Alan Dunbar for keeping on top of the maintenance of these important facilities

Recreation Ground

Three football pitches and the cricket pitch are now well established. It should now be possible to allow men's teams to hire the football pitches and thereby increase the revenue. The long awaited Pavilion was started in June 1998 and, in spite of a few delays, was completed on time in February

Unfortunately, because we made a decision at that time to put the building onto mains drainage, the village opening was delayed until early April. The feedback from the village is that we are most fortunate to have such a first class facility. We appointed Mr. Derek Moscrop to be the pavilion Manager having interviewed 3 candidates.

Special mention should be made of the efforts of Lord Donoughmore in chairing the working group and in securing Lottery support, to Mr. Jonathan Phillips for obtaining a most generous grant from WODC, and to Mr. Alan Dunbar for his superb performance as Project Officer. Also to all members of the working group for all the hours they spent at numerousmeetings and fund raising. We have a very marketable facility, which should and must not stand idle.

USE THEM OR LOSE THEM

Two Years on

Regular readers of the 'Beam' will remember the campaign run by the Parish Council in 1997 to promote better use of the facilities and the many services that we are fortunate to have in Bampton. A reminder of the poster, which is shown below. shows that we had over 40 serving servof Bampton's

2,500 resi-

dents Two years on, and with only the Garage and the Barbers as casualties. most of the other services have survived. But for how much longer? I was alarmed to read in a recent survey undertaken by West Oxfordshire District Council that 80% of Bampton residents do their main shopping in Witney, 10% elsewhere in the West Oxfordshire District, and 10%

outside the district, e.g., Abingdon or Swindon. Fortunately, the same survey showed that 90% of Bampton residents 'top-up' their shopping in the village, and obviously use many of the services.

Whilst one can understand the appeal of the big supermarkets, there is obviously scope to increase the proportion of goods that we buy in Bampton.

Another interesting survey on Housing and Services in West Oxfordshire showed that

increasing the number of houses in a village (unless in very significant numbers) does not particularly help to sustain facilities. Between 1977 and 1999, houses in this district increased by 17% and the population by 8%. However, in the same period the number of shops decreased by ices, which badly needed the full support 20%, pubs by 17% and Post Offices by

opportunity of maintaining our valuable facilities.

The bottom line however, remains 'Use them or Lose them'. Next time you are shopping in Witney or Oxford ask, yourself why you are not saving time, petrol money, and effort by not buying the same goods or services in Bampton. I would very much like to hear your views.

What is a Minor Injuries Unit?

The Minor Injuries Unit (MIU) is a new purpose built extension to Witney Community Hospital. The service is for anyone of any age, and is run on a drop-in basis. Patients are seen in order of clinical priority.

It is newly equipped with:

- three examination cubicles
- a stitch/plaster room
- X-ray facilities

is equipped to deal with most minor injuries and will save long journeys to the John Radcliffe Hospital. The X-ray facilities will be available for 7 hours a day. Outside these hours, patients may be asked to come back the next day, or may be directed, if the injury is more serious, to Accident & Emergency at the John Radcliffe Hospital.

What are Minor Injuries?

- · minor bumps on the head
- · sprains and broken bones
- · burns, cuts and bruises
- simple ear, nose and eyecomplaints
- removal of splinters and other foreign bodies

After initial treatment some people may be referred to specialist such as the eye hospital.

What are not minor injuries?

- · cough, cold, flu
- problems with breathing
- · chest pains and tummy ache
- suspected heart attack
- stroke

Patients should see their own GP for these. In an emergency call for an ambulance

We have just launched a wallet sized Emergency Card which can be carried at all times, and also a Personal Information File, which can be kept at home. This file will contain information about the person they care for, which will help those who take on the caring role in their absence. These cards will soon be available in surgeries and chemists.

OXFORD COMMUNITY MEDIATION

Problems in your Neighbourhood

Oxford Community Mediation is an independent charity. We help people throughout the county to sort out disputes. We have worked on issues from parties to parking and dogs to drains. In addition to problems, we can also help people who are having difficulties with friends, workmates or other family matters. We can even get involved with disputes involving community groups, schools, tenants and landlords.

Mediators help those involved to be clear about the problem and what is needed to make things better. One of the mediators' main roles is to help people to communicate effectively with each other. Mediators do not give advice nor do they take sides. We're flexible in terms of arranging times and places to meet and, at every step, the decisions are made by those involved in the dispute. We do not charge a set fee but we welcome and rely on donations, however large or small from clients who are able to contribute. Mediation often takes a lot of courage but it is about making things better in the long run, in a way that is satisfactory to everybody. 'Not for Profit' Family Mediation in Oxfordshire

Much research has been carried out on the long term effects of parental separation and divorce. If parental separation is handled with sensitivity and without conflict it does not have long term adverse effects on children. Family mediation is a future focused process in which trained and impartial mediators help separated or divorced clients, who are in dispute, to communicate better. Experience, and research, has shown that resolving disputes face-to-face in mediation is often more effective, both in terms of cost and time. than at arms length over a period of time via soliticitors. Improved communication also helps reduce conflict and bitterness.

The Oxfordshire Family Mediation Service has 10 years experience of providing family mediation services, and last year launched a children's support and information service for children of 6 years and upwards who are caught up in parental separation and divorce. The service has a contract with the Legal Aid Board to offer free mediation to anyone qualifying for legal aid to resolve disputes with their former partners over future arrangements for children, property or finances. Nobody is forced to opt for mediation because it can only work when it is a voluntary process.

'We can't speak very well. We can usually hear OK, but when it comes to speaking back in reply, we sometimes find that difficult. We are usually supported and cared for by paid staff who can speak very well. But we have heard that some people like us have managed to have an additional unpaid independent person - someone called a citizen advocate - start to make a one to one relationship with them. We hear that sometimes this helps a person speak up for their rights for themselves or the advocate speaks up on their behalf. if that is what they want. It sounds a great idea, as I've got some things I'd like to speak about, but don't feel able to ... But the trouble is that there are not enough advocates to go round. We are sorry about that because we would like an advocate too. If you are someone who can speak up for someone else, and who could give an hour a fortnight visiting and sharing a cup of tea on a regular basis, then I or someone else like me should be very pleased to meet you.

Cancer is a disease that touches many of us since between a third and a quarter of the population die from cancer. This does not include the many who are being treated for cancer or who are living with cancer or who are cured of cancer. The emotional impact on being given a cancer diagnosis can be huge. People's instinctive reaction is often that 'I will die' yet this is not necessarily the case.

Turning Point was set up a year and a half ago for people who have been given cancer diagnosis. It is a small friendly, therapeutic group that meets weekly in Witney. The group members provide mutual support and contribute to their own well being through meditation and guided imagery.

A Week End Bus to and from Oxford

I know we have just got a new No. 18 bus into Oxford, and a new frequent No 19 Bus service into Witney which is great. But, what we could do with is a service to Witney and Oxford in the evenings. Even if it was only for Friday, Saturday and Sunday Evenings, it would he excellent

I have teenage children, who can drive and have cars, but if they go into Oxford it's normally to a club to meet their friends for a drink. If they take their cars, this means they can't have a drink, or they might be tempted to - you know what youngsters are like - or the car may be broken into (which has happened to us). My children's friends come from Witney or Carterton, where there is a No.100 Bus every twenty minutes right up to the early hours of the morning. Here in Bampton our No. 19 Bus finishes at 6pm, so if we don't want them to drive to Witney or Oxford, it's down to us to take and collect them, or give them the fare for a taxi.

Wouldn't it be a good idea if the No. 100 Bus could detour around in this direction? It wouldn't have to be every twenty minutes, but say once every hour until 2pm for Fridays and Saturdays and 12pm on Sunday.

I'm sure the youngsters in Bampton would appreciate this service and parents too.

In my teenage years we did have a bus service until 11pm to Witney. I remember coming out of the Palace Cinema, saying quickly goodnight to my partner and jumping on the last bus home. If you missed it you were in for a long walk home and a good telling off when you got there. This day and age I would hate to think of my children having to walk home, especially after reading almost everyday in the papers what can happen to people, even a 100 yards from their door.

It may even give a new interest to the teenagers, instead of saying 'there's nothing to do in Bampton at the weekends', and get up to mischief through boredom, they could jump on the bus and go to Witney or Oxford where there is more life.

I have spoken to our District Councilor, Jonathan Phillips and he has been very busy talking to the West Oxfordshire Council about it. They have told Jonathan to get in touch with the StageCoach Company and see if they would be interested.

What is worrying though is the fact that we may be losing our extra service of the No 19 Buses, due to lack of use. At the moment it is under review, so use it or we might lose it! This would be a terrible shame if this happens. The time and effort which goes into persuading the necessary people that our village needs a new bus service seems to be a waste of time when it doesn't get used. Come on people, one minute you're saying we need a new bus service, then we get one, and it's not used!!

One good thing at the moment is that the No.18 Clanfield to Oxford bus run by 'Steve's Travel" is doing exceptionally well; long may it continue!!

Your correspondent in the last issue seems to be under the impression, I'm sure like many others, that the speed control system is having a positive effect!

Because I was sceptical of this view, I recently acquired and used a 'speed gun', which I operated on the Aston Road for some 45 minutes. I checked the speed of 20 cars and 2 motorcycles; one car was travelling at 68 miles per hour, two at around 50 miles per hour and the majority averaged 35-40 miles per hour, only one

car was within the speed limit. Observation on the Buckland Road would I am sure, reveal similar statistics, and include HGV's on the 'rat run' from the A420 to the A40

I have spoken to other villagers and they have expressed similar concerns. They, like myself, feel that the project has, unfortunately, not realised the expectations of the community.

It would be good to see a greater police presence, although one police officer told me that there are not enough accidents to warrant such action. This suggests that there is a finite statistical figure of deaths and injuries, which must be reached before effective action is taken.

Smoke Detectors save lives

Oxfordshire Fire Service is again encouraging everyone to fit a smoke detector in their home and to regularly check those already fitted. Too many people are still dying or being injured from fire in their own homes.

You are 12 times more likely to die if you do not have a smoke alarm, should a fire occur in your home. Smoke alarms have been highly successful in cutting the toll of domestic fires by providing a crucial early escape warning. However, the Fire Service find that people are still dying or being injured unnecessarily because they are not looking after their smoke alarm once

Fires can, and do, happen to anyone. The simplest way to protect yourself is by making sure you have a smoke alarm installed and working properly. It takes only a couple of minutes to install and it could save your life and the lives of your

Maintenance of your smoke alarm is easy:

* Once a month - check the alarm by pressing the test button.

* Once a year - change battery. Vacuum and wipe the alarm casing to ensure dust is not blocking the sensor chambers (for mains wired alarms, switch mains off first).

A smoke alarm is a small investment for a huge benefit.



BAMPTON ENVIRONMENTAL WATCH GROUP

Although the planning scene in Bampton remains a perennial source of concern, a recent cheering event is the appointment of Councillor Jonathan Phillips as Chairman of West Oxfordshire District Council's Planning Committee. To have such a knowledgeable, experienced and sympathetic figure at the helm is a great plus for Bampton and all other communities within the District's jurisdiction which are concerned with maintaining their integrity. character and viability in the face of continuous pressure for more building in the countryside.

On the planning front readers do not have to be told that the long awaited Market Square development has made a very desultory start. Further south, the Paddocks scheme for ten houses behind

Church View is being delayed pending the removal of soil on the site to ensure there is no still infection underneath. This very contentious planning application has illustrated how effective citizen protest can be with those living in Church View forming a Residents Association which managed to send over 40 individual letters to the District Planning Department, criticizing features of the scheme that adversely affected their own homes in particular and the immediate environment in general BEWG played a useful part in this effort with two members of the Executive Committee - Gillie Marsh, architectural consultant, and Martyn Bishop, planning specialist - providing consultation and advice on planning legislation and practice and particularly what specific features of de-

velopment contravene planning law. It is a good example of 'vox populi' making itself heard and we would like to suggest that when an inappropriate planning application for a particular corner of the village is under consideration those residents in the locality who are opposed to it consult together to make joint representation to the District Council's Planning Department.

Notification of all planning applications is posted in the vicinity of the proposed development on a conspicuous yellow form, which remains in situ for three weeks. In such situations BEWG would be happy to lend support, contact Ralph Norman Tel: 850823 or Martyn Bishop Tel: 850412. It is significant that while West Oxfordshire District council did grant

planning permission for the Paddocks development there were considerable misgivings over the scheme with more abstentions than votes cast and the latter split, requiring the Chairman's casting vote to ratify the decision.

Turning to less contentious issues, the surveyor of SUSTRANS who surveyed the plans for two cycle paths round Bampton has reported to the Parish Council, and it is very likely that the scheme will be adopted as part of the Village's Millennium

In addition to initiating this long-term venture with its broad implications. BEWG is also helping the Millennium on a more modest scale in designing a shelter for the bus stop outside 'The Horseshoe' in Bridge Street. Gillie Marsh has designed a simple structure comprising two upright posts in painted aluminum, two metres high and one metre apart, with a slate roof. The Parish Council has accepted this and a grant to cover the cost is being

The Open Meeting on 28th July, featured a timely talk 'Farming and Wild Life -Compatible or Not' by Richard Snow who is an active member of FWAG. On 27th October the lecture will be on the Hawk and Owl Trust, and will be held in the Village Hall, at 8pm. Non-members are welcome for a donation of £1 or taking out membership at the door.

Freda Bradley's book on growing up in Bampton, which she talked about with Don Rouse at the last AGM, is finished and is being read and edited by friendly critics before being sent to a publisher. An Update

We are working on the first proposed bike path - the route from Bampton to Tadpole Bridge.

The engineer from Sustrans (the national cycle track organiser), has examined the road and the verges and decided exactly where our bike path should go. The Oxfordshire County Council Highways department is looking at traffic flow at all times of the day including the busy rush hour and the school run times, to advise on traffic calming measures.

Most of the track will be on the existing verges, though in parts this will involve piping and filling in the ditches to make the verge wide enough. This is because, for safety reasons, there has to be a metre of verge between the bike path and the road.

The Trustees of the Bampton Recreation Ground have agreed to allow the bike path to go through the recreation ground alongside the trim-track.

Once the track gets to Tadpole Bridge, the Environment Agency has agreed to allow bikes along the service road to Rushy Lock - where a picnic area has been developed.

This is an expensive project but all of us will benefit; walkers, wheelchairs as well as bicycles can use bike paths. There will be at least one good cycle ride out of Bampton for children and families without feeling threatened by the thundering traffic. The project intends to create more bike paths - to Buckland, Witney and eventually to Carterton.



Car Sharing

A radical solution to over-parking in Bampton Streets.

I find that I use my car on average, once a week

The bus service is adequate for Witney and Carterton. We can even get to Oxford and back now without the stress of traffic queues and finding an expensive place to park. It is even possible to get to Oxford in time for work and get back after work. The only area of difficulty occurs when we want to go outside the confines of Bampton in the evenings. However, as I said, being a happy homebody, I only use my car once a week and there are lots of people in Bampton just the same. If we were to share car ownership this would reduce the cars in Bampton by a significant number.

Say Miss Brown owns a car. Mr. Green wants to share it. The value of the car is £1200. Mr. Green pays Miss Brown £600. Insurance is halved between them tax is halved between them, AA membership is halved between them, MOT test is halved between them. Both Mr. Green and Miss Brown must fill up with petrol at the end of each day's use so that the tank is full at the start of every new journey.

Maintenance costs would be paid in proportion to car use so a note must be kept of mileage - a little book left; which can one used to note mileage at beginning and end of each journey. If however, there was an unfortunate accident - the fault of the driver - that would be the total responsibility of that driver.

Chris has received commendations for his work at Bampton Castle from both the Air Officers Commanding Logistics Command and Strike Command.



The Gardening Page

Here we are into August already, and soon it will be autumn; time to start thinking about tidying the garden and planting your spring bulbs. Well, before we start think-

ing of all that cold weather to come, I've been having a look at using the flowers, herbs and fruit out of my garden in a herbal cosmetic way.

Herbal recipes use some of the most common plants that we have in our gardens. One of the commonest ways to use herbs is to make herb tea. This is made by

crushing the plants or leaves in the palm of your hand. This enables their juices to mix easier when the boiling water is poured over them. Let this mixture stand for at least half an hour in a jug or teapot then strain. A wineglass full of tea drunk three times a day is the recommended daily tipple for a long life. If the tea is kept any longer than three days it can begin to ferment, so should be thrown away. To make a pot of tea (family size), use three handfuls of fresh leaves or one handful of dried leaves for each teapot or into


What I'm really into though is the herbal remedies for the skin and hair. My hair and skin look their age at times so I'm going to pass the useful information I found on to you, and you can have a dabble at it as well as me!!

Wild Herb Face packs

Chop leaves up fine into equal amounts from a combination of dandelion, nettle and elder flowers and mix together. Simmer in just enough water to prevent from burning in the pan, until they make a thick mash (about 10 minutes).

Wait until the mixture has cooled down enough to handle without burning yourself. Then spread it onto thin muslin or clean cloth and slap it straight on to your face. OUT OF WORK FARMER - TURNED AGRICULTURE CORRESPONDENT

Well it is almost Autumn time again, when the trees change colour, when the evening

smell of flowers always seems to be at its strongest. a time of Harvest Festivals and the Garner Floor is full of food to take us through the Winter. Oh how I wish I could ramble on with such romantic prose, then perhaps my wife would stop calling me a 'Boring old miserable Git' But life is all about reality, the Garner floor is full with all those loads of corn that were tipped up in the rush of the harvest, but were they as dry as we thought they were? What about those few loads

the barns mice proof and bird proof? Whatever happened to nature's laws, barn owls feeding off barn mice? That is how it has been for more than 2000 years and we didn't seem to be that badly off. Not on, says the EEC, the owls and the mice must go elsewhere as they might defecate on the corn! So whether its birds, mice or EEC, one way or the other Jo public is going to get it! I know which defecater I would sooner have ! Talking of birds going

elsewhere, I don't know whether it is just coincidence or not, perhaps the more



knowledgeable ornithologists amongst 'Beam' readers can correct my theory. As many of you know, we have been dairy farming at University Farm for forty years and during that time there has always been a very active Rookery in the wood above the farm. Since our large herd of cows and their even larger slurry pit disappeared, there have been no rooks in the rookery! I know that the Rooks always enjoyed coming to the slurry pit, digging into the crust for muck to line their nests and for worms to feed their young. It just seems odd - no cows - no muck - no rooks.

If my theory is right then we need to get a proper balanced Agriculture policy quickly before all the herds disappear and we end up having 'feed lots' like they do in America. Thousands of cows in very con-

fined areas, that would definitely be 'factory farming' and we can do without that so let's do all we can to maintain the traditional way of British Farming now. The other day I

was over at Tinknell's in Clanfield and was invited to look around one of the new breed of tractors; my God what a difference to the tractors of the 1960s let alone the old baby Fordsons of the 1940s. They have got everything on board; computers to tell you at what rate you are putting this and that on per hectare! Miles per hour or metres per minute. Monitors with screens to tell you what is happening around you. Air

conditioning, CD players; even a paper roll holder; trouble was I couldn't find the button that operated the flush! Mind you in my day they were air conditioned all right, you sat outside in it. Either freezing, baking or just getting soaked! I remember the first cabs that came out, the warning inside said "In the event of the tractor turning over "STAY IN SEAT". The mind boggled as to how you were going to achieve it!

Being over at Clanfield brought on a snell

I used to love working down in the fields that we had by Sharney Brook, taking sandwiches with a bottle of tea so as not to waste time coming home (could not afford thermos flask in those days). Now if you have never been down there, you should try it, it is so peaceful; it was Dad's favourite place with his cows and portable milking parlour. The only thing that spoilt it for me was the horse flies! By the time you realised they were biting you, they had their heads buried up to their ears in your flesh. Mind you that made them easier and a lot more satisfying to kill with a good slap of the hand. Another good thing about working down there was its close proximity to the Thames. At lunchtime and at the end of the day we would often go across to the river for the dual purpose of washing the dust from our dirty sweating bodies and having a refreshing swim. The Thames was much cleaner then; well it was before we got in!

The modern day tractor driver will never be able to enjoy that sort of thing. Firstly, he will never sweat or get dirty to the extent that we did. Secondly, as his cab has all the modern devices to cook a meal and boil a kettle he won't be stopping for lunch. Am I worried about the association of local Tractor Drivers demanding my resignation from the Beam? Not a bit, poor devils, as there is now only about one fifth of them in number as there were in the 1970s and their workload has doubled. They are stuck in their cabs all day, with no tachometer to say they must take a break of forty-five minutes after every four and a half hours, and what is more the self employed cannot afford a break. No. they are going to be too knackered to do any letter writing. In my book lads (in these days of equality, lassies as well), you earn your luxury cabins. I am in awe of the way you keep up with modern technology and all the demands of the Government institutions. Perhaps one day those immortal words will be reiterated in your direction as you try to provide this country with food - "Never has so many owed so much to so few"

Isn't to nice to see a lot more Linseed grown? It is a pity that it is not in flower at the same time as the Oilseed Rape, wouldn't the countryside be a colourful place then. Linseed is such a beautiful seed

to handle. I have happy memories of pushing the linseed down the shoot in the granary for the mill to grind it for mixing into the cattle feed. We used to take our shoes and socks off so that the fine grain did not get lost in them, the feeling of the lovely cool and slippery grain running between my toes will stay with me for the rest of my life.

You know writing this article had made me realise how privileged I have been in living and working in this country before the EEC! Just take the last paragraph. none of that could happen today. To start with the EEC has stopped all farmers milling and mixing their own foodstuffs without special licenses and controls, yet it was practice that farmers had enjoyed for centuries. They cannot even plant their own home produced grain without a lot of bureaucracy. So watch it gardeners, you

Another thing about the above paragraph. I was only eight years old when I was doing that work; it would probably be called slave labour today. In those days it was all part of life's lovely learning curve.

SUMMER LEMONS

A short piece about the versatile lemon.

In the heat of the summer there is little more refreshing than fresh lemons, or to invigorate summer dishes such as salmon, scallops and tomatoes. Excitingly our lemon tree, which lives reasonably happily against the glazed wall of the inner hall, looks as if it might produce a small handful of fruit this

year - they appear to be easy enough to grow - with patience.

Lemonade

The supposedly authentic method for making this is to rub sugar lumps into the rinds of 4 or 5 lemons until you reach the pith, before adding water and leaving for a while. It is indeed superb, but it takes forever. Here's a simpler way:

Recipe

Rinds of 2 lemons and 1 orange Juice of 4 lemons and 2 oranges 2 pints boiling water Sugar to taste

Put the fruit rinds and juice in a jug and cover with boiling water.

Leave to cool, add sugar to taste. Chill and serve with ice cubes

Lemon Barley Water

Recipe

4oz pearl barley 4oz caster sugar

2 finely sliced lemons

2pints of boiling water

Pour the boiling water over the pearl barley, sugar and lemons. Strain before serving.

Pickled Lemons or Limes

There are a number of recipes for this middle eastern classic. They can also be bought at Sainsbury's - but at a price. Scrub and slice fruit. Put in a single layer in a colander, sprinklewith salt and leave to drain for 24 hours. They should be soft and limp. Put the slices in layers in a glass jar, sprinkling each layer with a little paprika. Pour on groundnut oil to cover. Close the jar and leave for at least three weeks. Serve with fish, or as a pickle with cold meat. The lemon oil can be used in salad dressings.

Lemon Gin Jellies

This 'wow' of a pudding is from Sybil Kaspoor's Modern British Food.

I prefer to use vegetarian gelatine, which has the advantage of givin a softer 'set' to the jelly - if you do this, follow the instructions on the packet, as brands dif-

Recipe

7fl oz lemon juice (about 5 large lemons do use the real stuff) Finely pared rind peel of 2 lemons

10 oz granulate sugar 8 cloves 1/2 fl oz gin 1 sachet powdered gelatine

Place the lemon juice, lemon peel, sugar, cloves and water in a saucepan.

Dissolve the sugar over a low heat and allow to cool for 10 minutes.

Strain through a muslin-lined sieve and add the gin. Place 3 tbspns hot water into a cup and sprinkle the gelatine over it. Leave to soak for a few minutes, then place in a pan of simmering water. Add some of the lemon syrup. Once both solutions are at the same temperature, mix together and pour into a bowl, or into small individual glasses.

West Ox Arts

Highlights March, April, May, June By Margaret Bruce Mitford

Four interesting exhibitions reflecting different media for artistic expression were mounted in the past four months.

Paintings and Writing by Tom Kemp showed 49 abstract paintings which are achieved by using hand movements that are basic to the skill of writing, without making known letters or character. The result is very impressive.

Material Matters illustrated how fabric and thread can be used to create works of art both three dimensional and as wall hangings, and ranging from small intimate sizes to large scale work. Varied imagery and a ravishing range of colour demonstrated the new limits to which the textile medium is being pushed.

Machine Embroidery (workshop), was presented by Denise Harrison, one of the exhibitors in the show, which was put on by textile workers from Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire.

Oxford Arts Society's Members work which consisted of 8 pieces of sculpture and 52 paintings, drawings and prints embracing a wide variety of themes. This exhibition marked the annual event of Oxford Art Week.

Textured Images by Richard Dack and Ann Norman in some respects chimes in with the first two exhibitions by showing a commonality between two very different artistic modes.

Richard Decks painting in mixed media on paper produced textures images that reflected the colours and different textiles employed in the tassels and ropes made by Ann Norman and other textile artefacts borrowed from Peter Collingwood.

Two interesting workshops by Richard Dack and Ann Norman respectively made this unusual exhibition a specially interesting event.






