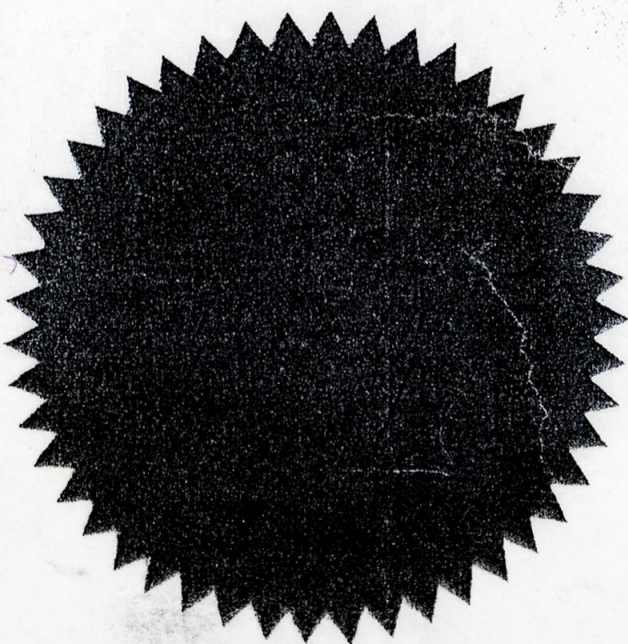

I hope you're keeping well and enjoying the present spell of fine weather - even if we could really do with some rain. The lawns are looking very brown now!


I'm enclosing my own latest version of the Dixey family tree, put together from all of the information that I've got, mainly from my sister Pat. There is, however, a very interesting addition, another recently discovered branch of the family with members currently living in the Oxon/Berks area. This results from one of those amazing coincidences and happened as follows.

I was on holiday this year with my wife Carole and daughter Anna and we all had personalised luggage straps on our cases. After breakfast a fellow came up to us and remarked on our name, Dixey. He said that was his mother's name. So I asked where he lived and he said Marcham, which is just along from Bampton. It was his father who came from Marcham; his mother's family came either from Bampton or Faringdon. His name is Henry William Pointer and you'll find him on Page Two. The link is that he is a descendent of Samuel William Dixey whereas you are descended from another brother, Arthur Dixey. So he is directly related to you. That bottom line starting with Elizabeth Jane and finishing with Bill Pointer's mother, Eleanor Mariah is a whole new field of research as far as I'm concerned. Bill has a cousin, Robert Dixey (who lives in Didcot), who has been doing research on that side of the Dixey family. He is already in touch with my sister Pat so it is to be hoped that this will lead to a lot more information about our family. Apparently Robert has some old photographs as well which he has said he will get copied.

I find this quite exciting. My one real regret is that my father never lived to find that he had so many relatives living. After his one brother died in the 1920s he always thought he was on his own.

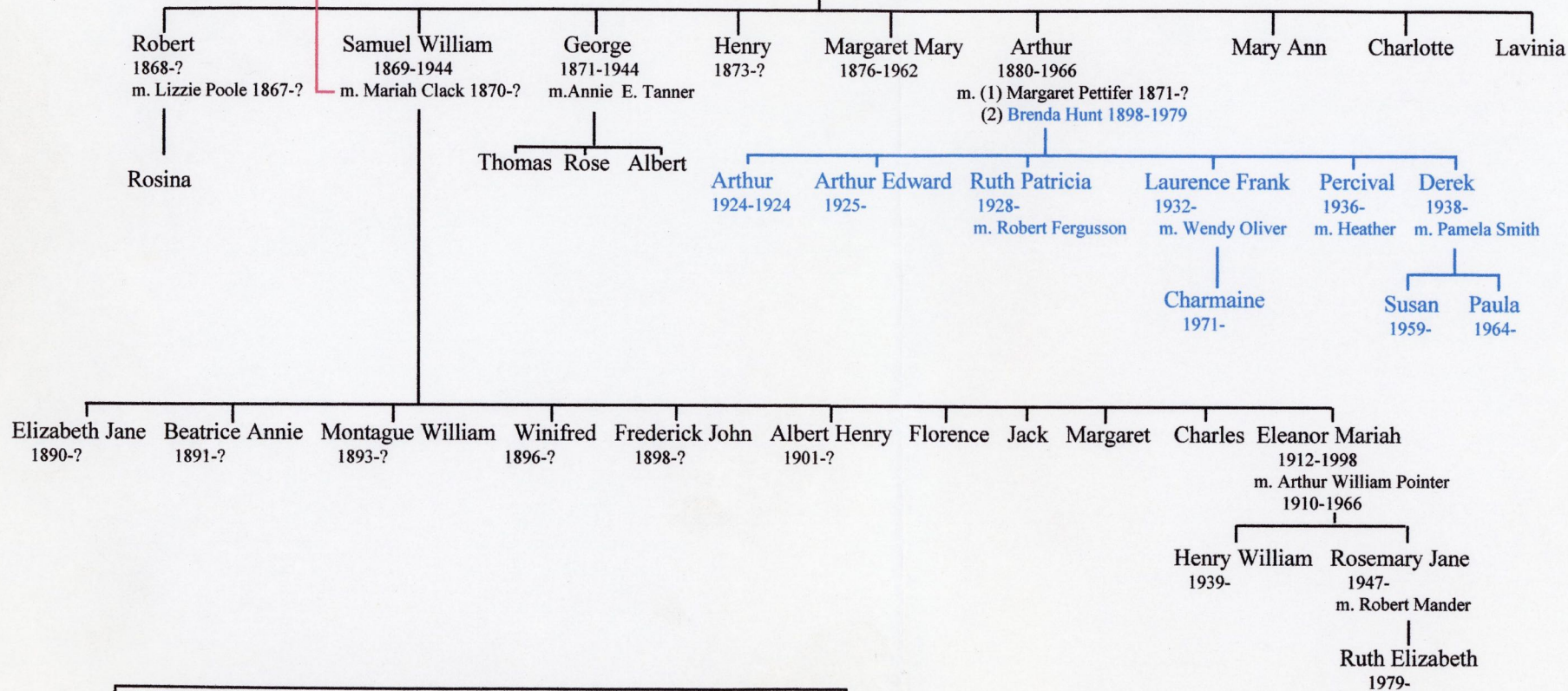

BAMPTON EAST DIVISION. Witney, Sept. 13.

Henry Dixey, a lad of Bampton, was fined 13s. including costs, for damaging a fence at Lew, the property of F. Penson.

PETTY SESSIONS. - JULY 12th.
DRUNK.

Henry Dixie, of Bampton, was charged by P.C. Paintin with being drunk and riotous, at Bampton, on the 10th inst.; there being five previous convictions against him, he was now fined £2, and costs, or one month's hard labour.

PETTY SESSIONS, - THURSDAY, NOV. 10.
TRESPASSERS.

Henry Dixey and Thomas Tanner, labourers, of Bampton, were charged with being on land in search of game on October 24th, at Bampton.

P.C. Surman deposed that on October 24th, about 5.40 in the evening, he was in Moor Lane, when he saw the defendants a few yards away from him. Directly they saw him, they went off towards weald. Witness went after them, and searched them. He found a wire on Dixey, who was carrying a gun, and he found on Tanner a warm partridge.

Defendants denied the offence, Tanner saying he picked up the bird on the road, and it was cold.

Supt. Keal proved five previous convictions against Dixey and one against Tanner, and in default of paying £2 12s. 6d. and £1 2s. 6d. respectively, they were committed for 21 and 7 days' hard labour.

PETTY SESSIONS.
ILLEGAL FISHING.

Henry Dixey and George Wright, of Bampton, were summoned for having, on 28th June, fished for trout in the mill stream Bampton, belonging to Mr. Hobbs.

Defendants acknowledged fishing, but said there was no private right of fishing there...

Fined 2s. 6d. each or seven days imprisonment. Defendants said they could not pay, and were removed in custody.

WITNEY.
PETTY SESSIONS.

Thomas Hunt, George Dixey, and Henry Dixey, of Bampton, were summoned for trespassing on land in the occupation of Mr. Gerring, at Bampton, on 15th October.

PRINT

Hunt and George Dixey pleaded guilty, and Henry Dixey not guilty.

P.C. Stevens deposed: On 15th October last I was on duty on the highway at weald Bampton. I saw defendants, Hunt and George Dixey, in a field belonging to Mr. Gerring. I watched them and they came down the field, Hunt in the centre of the field with a dog, and George Dixey near to the hedge. Hunt was beating the sweedes as he came down. When they got to the bottom Hunt went to the hedge and beat it. At that time Henry Dixey came round the corner in the road with a gun. He saw me and they signalled to each other. They ran away, but I caught Henry Dixey and found a powder flask and shot flask.

By the bench: I did not see Henry Dixey off the road.

Case against Henry Dixey dismissed.

Previous convictions were put in against Hunt and George Dixey, the former being fined 30s., and the latter 5s.
