
70-Years-Old Fiddler Leads Dancing

It was again evident on Whit Monday that the Bampton Morris Dancers have not lost any of their attraction for those interested in old folk dances and morris dances. Large numbers of visitors from the surrounding district and some from as far away as London, visited Bampton on Monday to watch this centuries old custom of morris dancing in the streets. The Morris Men in their quaint costumes bedecked with ribbons and bells were again under the leadership of the 70 years old fiddler, Mr. W. Wells, and from about 9 a.m. until dusk they danced almost continuously in the streets and in the gardens of the larger houses. Fortunately the weather was fine for the greater part of the day and the people who gathered to watch were able to see the dancing to advantage.

In the opinion of Mr. Wells, more visitors were present on this occasion than

for several years past.
