FIRE STATION THREATENED?


Bampton Fire Station could close if more recruits cannot be found.

Thirteen retained or part-time fire fighters are needed for the service to be fully functional. Today there are only seven. This means, on average, for two or three hours each day the local crew cannot turn out. A few months ago a fire in Bampton had to be dealt with from Witney. In a house fire with people trapped those extra few minutes could make a life and death difference.



Sub Officer Brian Kew explains

Sub Officer Brian Kew says, "the situation's been made worse recently because several people have had to retire. Now every time the alerter goes off, I have to think if we can respond or not. The existing members give all the time they can, but sometimes it is not enough". Sub Officer Kew has only three years of service left himself.

CAN YOU HELP?

Potential recruits can be men or women aged between 18 and 40. You must be physically fit with a desire to do something to help your community. You need to be able to get to the station within five minutes of an emergency call out, so working locally is essential, and your employer must be supportive - you will be called away at a moment's notice and might not be back for several hours.

Volunteer fire fighters are paid. There is an annual retainer of about £1,000 plus call out fees.

There was a plea for millennium allotments to be provided by the purchase of the field next to the existing ones.


A fifth pleaded for a cycle path through the village to improve safety, particularly for parents taking children to school, and to encourage more of us to get out of our cars.

Traffic calming measures

Since November 1996 two independent surveys have been carried out by the Police and the Area Engineers Department. The parish council prepared two reports. Stage 1 of the report covered policing measures based on those most successful elsewhere. Stage 2 produced costing of Stage 1.

The parish council has asked for a detailed plan to be drawn up showing all the proposals. The plan and Stages 1 and 2 of the report will be made available for public inspection and your comments will be sought. When and where this will take place will be publicised at a later date (please refer to the Parish Council Notice Board and local press), hopefully in August 1997.

Proposed Development in Station Road

This planning application for 15 large houses in the field immediately on the right as you leave the village was previously refused in 1996 but resubmitted in April. The application was again rejected, unanimously, by the Parish Council on the grounds that the access road would create a traffic hazard on the approach to the village. The type of housing proposed

would also not be readily affordable by young people of the village who need homes.

Mercury Close/Pembroke Place Playgrounds

Considerable work has taken place this year providing new equipment and safer play surfaces. In future it is proposed to publish separately the cost of repair work to damaged equipment in the playgrounds.

Sports Pavilion, Buckland Road

Planning approval has been obtained and progress is being made with the preparation of a Lottery application. If all goes well we would hope to start building the pavilion in spring 1998.

Use them or Lose them campaign

The Parish Council has launched this campaign to support local businesses in the village. They are a vital source of employment at the very heart of village life. Other ideas for posters or publicity would be most welcome.

Pavements areas - New Rd, Bridge St, Oueen St. Broad Street

Concerns regarding the poor condition of footpaths have been brought to the atten-

tion of the County Council who have the matter in hand.

Police Liaison Meeting

The Parish Council is arranging aN open Police Liaison Meeting. This has not been finalised, but it is hoped to take place in September in the Village Hall, when you will have the opportunity to put any concerns directly to the police.

War Memorial

In the last few years is has become common practice for some teenagers to climb on the War Memorial. Why? We don't know, they never used to. All sorts of rubbish is left behind and the whole area looks a mess. The Parish Council, inspite of their best efforts, find it impossible to keep this area tidy for more than a few hours.

Older members of the community find this very upsetting, especially those who fought or lost family members in the wars. We would ask that if you see teenagers on the War Memorial, explain to them it is sacred and to "please get off".

Charge for Road Closures

Further to the article in the Oxford Times of 20th June 1997, the Parish Council have investigated the matter further. They have been assured that the charges ranging from £175 - £300 are not applicable to the type of road closures we endorse at May Day and Spring Bank Holiday. Charges for road closures only apply for major construction work by contractors, not when the roads are closed for pedestrian safety such as the Street Fair and Shirt Race.

DISTRICT COUNCIL NEWS

from Jonathan Phillips District Councillor

County Council Budget.

As most of you know Oxfordshire County Council has set a budget 6 million pounds above the cap. Although it has been told by the new Government to stick to the cap, it is appealing against this decision. In case this fails, several Libraries are now under threat of closure and the County is looking to see where else it can make savings. Already District Councils are being asked to contribute to the running costs of the County Museum in Woodstock and WODC may have to take on the costs of Cogges Farm. A few years ago Bampton Youth Centre had 75% of its running costs paid by the County Council this year it will only receive 40%! More and more Parish and Town Councils are having to precept for items that used to be paid for by the County Council i.e. traffic calming measures, street lighting, provision of Youth Workers. If the County Council loses its appeal over the cap, new council Tax demands will have to be sent out at a cost to us of nearly £500,000!

West Oxfordshire Local Plan to 2001.

The District Council has now reconsidered the Local Plan in the light of consultation. Minster Lovell complained vociferously over the proposal to put 140 houses in New Minster and has been besieged by developers wishing to put even more houses in this historic Chartist Settlement. I am glad to say this has been rejected along with developments in Aston, Bampton, Curbridge, Eynsham and North Leigh. Interestingly, Oxfordshire County Council, which is the Strategic planning Authority for the County, has stated that large scale developments in the rural areas of West Oxfordshire are "unsuitable". This means basically that such developments would encourage commuting by car into Oxford on the already inadequate road system. This is a very encouraging turn of events for this district particularly as we start to look at where to put houses up to the year 2011. Will the County, as a result of this, reduce the number of houses to be built in West Oxfordshire rural areas in the period 2001 - 2011?

The Future Management of West Oxfordshire District Council.

It has been a year of change in West Oxfordshire District Council. We have a new Chief Executive - Geoff Bonner; and Chief Financial Officer - Angela Muir; a new Chief Environmental Officer - Paul Lancaster; and, just over a year ago. a new Chief Planning Officer - Andrew Tucker. Until recently the councils key object was to keep its expenditure under tight control and the levels of Community Charge/Council Tax as low as possible. This has had a significant impact on council management culture:-

- (a) Service provision by and large has been confined to meeting statutory obligations. There has not been any major development of the sort of discretionary activities such as leisure provision and environmental activities adopted by other councils.
- **(b)** The council has a very cautious approach to financial matters with expenditure being strictly limited to meeting identifiable needs.
- (c) The council has tended to see its role in the local community primarily as a provider of services. It has not thought it necessary to assume the permanent community leadership role favoured by other councils to address wider community concerns or to build partnerships within the local community.

As a result of this tight financial control many other councils could well be envious of West Oxfordshire's situation with good services, good staff, expenditure under control, resources available for growth and a real opportunity to plan for the future of the council and the community.

Pressure has grown for the provision of better leisure facilities together with the desire of the public to recycle and protect the environment in West Oxfordshire. All these things have a cost for which we, the Council Tax payer, will have to provide. In our review we must keep this in mind but not destroy the enviable position in which we are at present. Yes, we can undoubtedly do more, but caution should be the order of the day particularly as the County Council is asking the District is asking the District Council and Parish and Town

Councils to pay more for services they have previously provided without in any way reducing the proportion of Council Tax which it demands.

Neighbourhood Notification.

(West Oxfordshire Observer - April 1997) It is hoped to start this for all planning applications in West Oxfordshire on 1st July 1997. Please let us know how this works. Is it an improvements on the present arrangements and is it worth the considerable extra cost?

Oxfordshire Village Shops Association.

Oxfordshire Rural Community Council has now set up a Village Shop Association in West Oxfordshire with a launch in mid-March which was attended by more than 50 people. Walker's Crisps, Terry's Suchard gave presentations and staff from the Oxford branch of Bookers were also present

The Association want to stress to rural village shopkeepers the benefits of joining and attending meetings. Already buying deals and promotional offers have been made and the meetings are an excellent chance for shop keepers to exchange ideas. I hope all will take advantage of this great initiative to try and help our village shops

If you value your local shops and services, use them on a regular basis not just in an emergency - otherwise they will not survive for you to use all.




PROGRESS FOR BAMPTON RECREATION GROUND





The Reverend David Lloyd is playing it What is your position on the ordination during the year ahead. Do look out for long. He moved into Bampton last August, and became our vicar the following month. He has in fact five parishes to care for, - Aston, Clanfield, Lew and Grafton as well as Bampton. all ages and social groups are represented in church life. To this end, we have revived the Junior Church, and have a Family Service on the second Sunday of each month. I am developing links with the Youth Club, and continue to offer services in local sheltered housing developments.

What are your Links with the local C. of E. Primary School?

I contribute to assemblies fortnightly at Aston, Bampton, and Clanfield schools. I am also involved as a parent. Our younger son attends Bampton school, and the elder is at Henry Box in Witney.

Can you tell us something of your own

Well, I'm from Wales originally, although I've travelled quite a bit. I taught for five years before coming to Bampton.

How do you relax?

One of my main interests is Drama. I've performed in lots of things and it's a real regret that rehearsals simply don't fit in with the flexible working hours of my job. In the meantime, I read and birdwatching keeps me happy!

In conclusion?

I hope to meet as many of you as possible

You asked for views about the issues raised in the December issue of the Beam Here are some random views - which you are free to use - or not use as you think fit.

Traffic in the village.

Increasingly the village is being used as a through road for lorry traffic and a short cut from the A420 to the A40. Traffic calming - either in the shape of mini roundabouts, sleeping policemen or even a bypass in the future, seem to be important - though there are problems with any of these solutions

But the problem is urgent. The present level of traffic is tolerable. In ten or twenty vears time it will not be

Transport.

Linda Mills raises the important subject of transport - and she is right to suggest that a regular (hourly) bus service to Carterton or Witney to connect with the excellent bus service from both these towns is very important. It would cut down the number of car journeys made to and from the village - and encourage those with young families to remain in the village

At present it is difficult to commute by public transport to Witney or Oxford. An hourly bus service - including evenings would transform the situation

Bottle Banks.

Neither the Market Square nor the present site are good. The Market Square was an eyesore in the village and a disturbance to those who live round it.

Dear Editor,

In the April 1997 edition of the Bampton Beam there was a short article reporting that three of us had recently celebrated our fiftieth anniversaries as bell ringers.

May I use your columns, please to correct a couple of errors which crept into that article.

Firstly, the wooden canopy which I designed and, with the help of my ringing



colleagues, fitted over the bells was a temporary affair to protect our valuable asset whilst the steeplejacks were going about their business. If any masonry rubble had fallen from top to bottom inside the steeple it would have been doing about 90 miles per hour when it hit the bells, and could have caused considerable damage.

The sixteen foot square canopy was removed when the steeple was declared safe. before we resumed ringing

The second point, I would like to ratify is that we no longer ring on Oak Appleday (unless it is a Sunday)! When King Charles was safely delivered, after his oak tree exploits there was a "Royal Decree" which called for an annual "Thanks giving" ring. This annual custom died during the early Victorian era. But, the "Pancake" bell is still rung at mid-day every Shrove Tuesday. Sadly this is the only old bell ringing custom still maintained in Bampton.

Bampton Youth Club the ongoing story

The club opens on Thursdays from 7.30 -10.00pm for 15-25 year olds. The rapport between club members and workers continues to grow, though the individuals and overall numbers attending fluctuates enor-

The behaviour of the boys and girls is largely influenced by who is there. There is a problem of drug misuse involving a number of young people. They try to upset others but are more often a nuisance than aggressive.

People who have been inconsiderate to others have been banned in the last eighteen months. Some have been allowed back on the understanding that they respect and abide by club rules.

We are sometimes visited by traveller vouths, mainly in winter. I first encountered them by visiting them and their parents on their site. I was unnerved by them at first, but the boys attending the club have always been polite and friendly to other workers and to me.

Activities

Accommodating older young people requires the workers to be flexible in their approach to developing good youth work practice. By providing space and activities (pool, darts, table tennis and football) the club enables the workers to interact and gain the confidence and trust of the young

person, so that they can help and advise when needed. We also encourage members to express themselves in an artistic manner, for example we are constantly repainting murals on the walls and cupboards. The club is also fortunate to have a TV, Hi-Fi, and soft chairs, which give it a lounge/home-type atmosphere.

Outside Activities

In the past 3 years the club has organised two trips away, one to London (Boys life Experience) and one to Banbury (Girls Drama Project/Sex Education). We plan to hold a number of future trips:

- * Ouad biking
- * Swimming at Oasis, Swindon
- * Outdoor pursuits weekend, **Brecon Beacons, South Wales**
- * Pony Trekking, Cotswolds

Social Education

The Youth club, however, is not just a place where young people go to hang out. An ongoing development in communicating the right message to young individuals is necessary if they are to become good citizens, and this also part of the youth club's aims. What we try to do is to address social problems encountered by young people as a group and as individu-

Youth work can be, and sometimes is, quite daunting, encountering many different problems that young people require answers to. They are apt to ask questions that you know nothing about or they try to embarrass you with questions they think will shock. In the last year I have counselled young people on sex education/ contraceptives drugs use/misuse; employment/unemployment; school work; home life and relationships; moral understanding: criminal activities. I have also been a genuine (in-confidence) listener when needed. The youth club intends to extend its group sessions and the young people have requested in depth information on the following:

Police - young people and the law Drugs - awareness of and misuse

Employment - careers, etc

We will be asking experts in each of these fields to help out and advise with these

WEST OXFORDSHIRE DRUG REFERENCE **GROUP**

This group was established early in 1996 under the direction of a Government White paper with the main aims of increasing the safety of communities from drug related crime: reducing the accentability and availability of drugs to young people; and reducing the health risks and other damage caused by drug misuse.

Drug misuse and availability are difficult to assess but the view of the agencies working in this field is that most illegal drugs are readily available and probably 50% of young people experiment with drugs (particularly cannabis) at some time or other. However most of them come through this phase of their lives without harmful effects. Nevertheless, it is essential to guard against complacency and it is reassuring to know that a lot of work is taking place in West Oxfordshire

- the Thames Valley Police Drug Strategy includes action on informant, education and a diversion scheme for juvenile offenders;
- in our College and Secondary Schools, a structured programme of drugs education/awareness is now in its third year;
- the Youth Service run "The Flat" counselling and information service at Church Green, Witney where support is available on many issues including drugs;
- the health authorities in Oxfordshire are co-ordinating the services they provide for rehabilitation and care for addicts:
- a new project "The Arrest Referral Scheme" is also encouraging - its basic aim is to offer help, care and counselling to people taken into police custody who may have a drugs problem.

It is important also to remember that smoking and alcohol cause serious long term health problems

Interested members of BEWG met on Tuesday 6th May to formalise and launch the above scheme.

The group was addressed by David Jones, Field Officer for West Oxfordshire, who gave details of the work undertaken by the county authority, to maintain and protect the footpath network around the Bampton area. He explained to members how they could play their part in ensuring the network of paths was kept in good order. for use by all.

Members selected paths to walk on a regular basis. Any problems encountered would be advised to the Field Officer via the group co-ordinator. There are, of course, many paths not yet covered within the scheme, and anyone interested whether or not a member of BEWG, is welcome to join in.

The April Open Meeting was of particular interest in that it showed how a local community could organise to prevent its local nature reserve from being taken over for development. The Royate Hill Reserve in central Bristol is a length of disused railway embankment which had become the habitat of wild flowers, trees and animals and was used intensely by local inhabitants and much valued, as an easily accessible spot for old age pensioners and safe place for children to play. Local consternation was high when it was learned that the developers intended to raise the embankment and build a high density housing estate on the flattened

A handful of determined residents mobilised the local people to fight this scheme by writing letters, organising petitions lobbying influential figures etc, and collaborated with the Bristol Planning Authority to oppose the Appeal launched by the developers against refusal of planning permission. Support was also canvassed na-

tionwide from other environmental and conservation groups, and after a lengthy struggle the Appeal was not sustained. A major reason for this decision being the intense feeling the local community had demonstrated for this piece of land to be preserved

Finally BEWG entered the market economy by taking a stall at the Bampton Market in May for the sale of bric-a-brac. which realised the encouraging sum of £124, 09p, with most items sold



1966 in the Old Grammar School - now the library. In 1967, rooms became available at the Old Primary School in Church View and for ten years, regular sessions were held there. It was then decided that playgroup needed its own building and permission was sought to site it in the grounds of the Primary School. This was granted and a full programme of fund raising began. All the work was carried out by parents and the building was erected in January 1977. The commitment and hard work of parents and staff meant the building was paid for within two years. Since then many repairs and improvements have been made. Recently a new roof was fitted and a disabled toilet. A shed has been erected for outdoor toys, and a new swing and slide area created with the use of safety bark. We are planning a garden area where the children will be able to grow their own flowers and vegetables.

To supplement our fees grants/donations, we hold several fund raising events during the year. NEW HOUSES IN PEMBROKE PLACE

These low cost houses are an interesting addition to our village scene. They stand north of the Fire Station off New Road.

This view shows those dwellings built in Cotswold colour reconstructed stone, a form of concrete block. They are perhaps more successful in appearance than the brick elevations of the other dwellings mixed in with them.

Tree and shrub planting is beginning to be effective, in softening the hardness of new materials of angular design. Note the complete absence of chimneys. The result is a monotonous ridge line where the buildings meet the sky.

GARDENING LIFE

Two things have happened to me in the last 5 years. Firstly I have become green, secondly I have become a grandparent. The end result is that I no longer use any poisons around my garden and the dust

gathered packets on the shelf of the garden shed must be removed out of the way of curious little' fingers and away from the temptation to use just a few slug pellets after a much loved chrysanthe-

mum has been nibbled to a bare stalk. Having become "green" I worried about these poisons becoming part of a land-fill site and ending up in the water system if I put them in the dustbin. It took me 5 phone calls to find out what to do. I pass on the knowledge to would-be "green" readers:-

Make a list of the things you want to dispose of, mine included slug pellets (I now go out with a torch late at night and catch the brutes), aphid poison (it doesn't actually make any difference to my roses that a few aphids have feasted there for a bit) and spray against black spot (climbing Iceberg which is prone to black spot gets fairly defoliated every year, but is still smothered in flowers and comes up strong as ever each year).

Having made your list, you telephone the Oxfordshire County Department for Advice on Hazardous Waste. Sue Douglas Tel: 01865 815796 will tell you which of the products on your list need special attention. A FREE collection for domestic users is available

I have hung onto wasp killer by the way. If there is a green way of dealing with a wasp nest in a thatched roof I would be interested. But there is nothing more neurosiscreating than listening to the quiet munching of wasps in the roof slowly changing good thatch into paper.

There is nothing you can sprinkle onto a mole to make it turn tail and leave. I have been invaded from the adjacent field and suddenly overnight it seemed there were NO mole hills in the field and the surface of my garden was inscribed with shallow runs which unearthed plants and left others root damaged and gasping for water.

What to do?

I have tried tolerance (in line with the best greenies) but it failed me when they reached my vegetable patch and I saw all my onions lying sideways. I have run

round stamping on all visible mole runs. They don't care. I have pushed mothballs down all visible holes. I think they

enjoy them. They are supposed not to like Euphorbia (spurges). Mine have been pushing through a very thick patch undeterred. Dor Thomson swears by mole vibrators, a battery powered noise that is supposed to send them running. Roy Shergold says he tried them and the moles gathered round to listen. Another old gardener puts plastic bottles up-turned on the top of canes stuck in the ground. These are suppose to rattle and work like a cheap version of the vibrator. The cure for moles is obvious!!!! Funny things have happened to the fruit crop this year. The apple trees, usually so bowed down with fruit, smothered with blossom in the spring, bear 3 apples, I suppose the frost got the rest. THE COTSWOLD WARDENS

Some of the most beautiful countryside in England is to be found in the Cotswolds, with many attractive towns and villages from Burford 3 to Broadway, Charlbury to %



Cheltenham, and Chipping Sodbury to Chipping Camden.

The region was designated as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty in 1966 and extended in 1991. At 790 square miles, it is the largest of 41 such areas in England and Wales. Like the National Parks, they are regarded as nationally important landscapes, protected from major developments by local authorities who also fund essential management work and countryside services. They are helped in turn by the Countryside Commission, who offer grant-aid and advice.

There are over 200 Voluntary Wardens in the AONB whose work includes conservation schemes such as tree planting, hedgelaying, dry stone-walling, erecting stiles and way-marks, and restoration of features of archaeological interest like sheepwashes and monuments. They also patrol and maintain footpaths and bridleways and devise and lead free guided walks for the public. These walks vary in length from 4 to 11 miles and are conducted throughout the year, week days and week-ends, so there is usually something for everyone in the two programmes which run from April - September and October - March. The shorter walks are usually followed by an optional pub meal. Walk leaders interpret items of interest along the way so the walks are relaxed and informal and anyone coming on their own soon feels they are among friends. The longer walks are usually done with a lunch-time pub stop but some prefer to picnic.



SPRING HIGHLIGHTS

SWORDFISH, TUNA AND SHARK

Steaks of these splendid fish are readily available from most supermarkets these days, and represent, for us at least, the ultimate treat in fish cookery (turbot is a far finer fish,but it is comparatively rare and hugely expensive). They are available pre-frozen at very reasonable prices, but if you are lucky you can catch the so-called air freighted steaks, which are more expensive but vastly superior in texture and flavour. The following recipes are for swordfish and tuna, but shark steaks can be cooked the same way.

However you cook them, these steaks will benefit from marinading for a minimum of half an hour in a a mixture of olive oil, lemon or lime juice, and salt and pepper. This simple but tasty marinade will be absorbed by the fish and result in a subtle flavour. The best way to cook the steaks is on a ridged cast-iron grill pan (which gives it nice scorch marks), under a conventional grill or on a barbecue. They only need a couple of minutes on each side. The following suggestions are simple but extremely tasty - more complicated recipes usually involve making delicious accompanying sauces (such as anchovies with wild mushrooms), but for lazy summer time cooking I think it's best to keep it simple.

SWORDFISH WITH MOZZARELLA AND MINT


I read this in one of the broadsheets a few years ago, but can't remember who the author

Per person, you will need:

1 swordfish steak. 1 tablespoon olive oil,

1 tablespoon lemon juice mint leaves

a couple of slices of mozzarella cheese, salt and pepper.



TUNA WITH MANGO SALSA

My husband made this recipe up recently. 1 tuna steak per person 1 nice yellow tomato 1/2 red onion 1/2 mango juice of 1/2 -1 lime fresh thyme olive oil

Marinade tuna in oil and lime juice, with seasoning, as described above. Finely chop onion and mango. Deseed and chop tomato. Add the leaves of a few thyme sprigs. Mix in lime juice and enough olive oil to cover - at least a couple of tablespoons, and season. Leave for at least half an hour for the flavours to mingle.

Cook the fish - a ridged grill or barbecue is best - and serve with the salsa.

Hiang's Special Recipe

Hiang, of Chinese descent, was born and brought up in Sarawak, East Malaysia, part of Borneo Island. She comes from a family of enthusiatic and accomplished cooks, and has happy childhood memories of her parents entertaining friends at sumptuous banquets.

Hiang and her family are moving from Bampton to Cheltenham All those who have been attending the cooking classes, will no doubt miss her.

Hiang's special own recipe made 15 years ago for members of the International Wine and Food Society

Avan Kichup Lim (spiced chicken)

6 drumsticks (boned)

oil for deep frying

1 small onion (chopped small)

1 piece of chicken fillet (chopped in small pieces or minced)

3ozs/75g mushroom (chopped small)

1/2 teaspoon corn flour

1/2 teaspoon ground coriander

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

2 medium chopped onions and garlic (place in electric blender together with 1 tablespoon oil to make paste)

4 tablespoons cooking oil

3 tablespoons water or chicken stock

1/4 teaspoon lemon grass powder

1 tablespoon ground roasted peanut

2 teaspoon tomato paste

1 teaspoon sugar

1/2 teaspoon red chilli powder

Juice of 1 medium lemon

Fish sauce/salt and pepper to taste.

Mix the chicken fillet, onions, mushrooms, ground coriander, cornflour. Add fish sauce/salt and pepper to taste. Stuff mixture into each drum stick. Deep fry till crispy - set aside in baking dish.

Heat the 4 tablespoons cooking oil. Fry the onion garlic paste till slightly brown. Add the peanut, turmeric, tomato paste, chilli, lemon grass, nutmeg, sugar, salt and pepper. Lastly add the water and lemon juice. Stir fry until spiced mixture is

Pour spiced mixture over the drumsticks and bake in pre-heated oven for 10-15 minutes. Mark 5/190C.

When ready garnish with chopped spring onion and fresh coriander. Serve with rice and stir fried vegetables or with sliced cucumber and crisp lettuce leaves.

The Morris Clown by Jonathan Phillips


