Bampton Library is going from strength to strength as we try different ways of reaching out to as many people as possible in Bampton and the surrounding villages.

Books in a Box:

We have started three Books in a Box schemes. The idea here is to get books out to people who may not be able to get to the library. Villagers attending the Bush Club can now borrow books from their Books in a Box scheme. A regular box also goes to the Rosebank care home and this service has been a hit with the residents there. Mandie Oliver, the manager at Rosebank, says "This scheme is working very well and is giving residents the opportunity to view and read a variety of books'. Families with young children who go to the Willows Children's Centre in Bampton have really appreciated their Books in a Box. These children are our future readers who we hope will become library users.



All of this works well because Loraine our Library Manager uses her expertise to select the right books for these different groups. So, many thanks to Loraine for helping to make Books in a Box such a success.

Talks at the library

In 2013 we are aiming to have 3 or 4 talks at the library, again aiming to bring in new people, usually on a Thursday evening. The first of these at the end of January was a talk on Bonsai by Paul Bowerbank of the Swindon Bonsai Society at the end of January.






February will see us celebrating Pan-cake day and Valentines day along with preparing for spring time.

Phone / email/speak to any one of the committee to put your name down and we will arrange a briefing meeting the week before the race.

On Saturday May 25th from 6:30 pm The Great Original Shirt Race will once again be run through the village streets. We are all proud that this wonderful event is still going strong, and is so well supported. To help us run it smoothly, and to keep everyone safe please may we remind you Young competitors should only be supported by one adult, our route involves some narrow lanes. Spectators are asked to keep pushchairs on the pavement, not on the road for the same reason.

Rosemary Lane, the Market Square, parts of the High St, Bridge St and Church View will be closed to traffic for up to 45 minutes while the races take place. Please remind friends and neighbours of this. Car Parking will not be possible near the start on the High St, in the Market Square or Rosemary Lane from 5pm on the night. If this causes a real difficulty, please get in touch with us and we will see what we can do to help. Competitors must drink their drinks at every stage and keep the glasses to produce at the finish. Only those with a complete set will be deemed to have completed the course. Our stewards are there to ensure no unsportsmanlike behaviour takes over from natural competitiveness. 

Rouse's Ramblings - 1

At long last we have good news about the Bampton Youth Club. After many months of struggling to get out of the mire where local government had left us by withdrawing funds from the Youth Service, we can now shout from the roof tops "Bampton has a Youth Club. It's up and running."

What Bampton has got that no Government can take away, is an abundance of very keen and able young Volunteers.

They have Roger Snow as their Chairman with Sarah Constable as Vice-Chair. Ann Setch is keeping a close eye on the finances with Samantha Wileman taking on the role of Secretary. These days it is compulsory to have a Safety Officer and that role has been taken on by Amanda Townsend. Along with three fantastic assistants Isobel Goves, Sammy Hancock and Emma Clark they have a perfect team. What they need now is our help and encouragement. The long standing Bampton Youth Centre Management Committee has been very helpful and constructive in financing the volunteers training courses so that they will comply with Government guidelines in relation to Health and Safety. They have also helped provide for the basic needs of the Club and I am sure that if the Club continues to prove itself that they will listen sympathetically to any more requests for help.

I am hoping that in time the youngsters will write their own news items for the Bampton Beam, it will be a challenge for them to tell us all how they can play a part in our wonderful community, they can tell us all about their successes and needs in their language. That way we can all pull together to help them succeed in running their club, the way that they want it, thus making a club that they will be proud of.

Why am I not surprised to hear that the Supermarkets have been fobbing us off with Horse Meat in our Beef Burgers? They will do anything to cut corners if it is in their financial interest. I have always advocated in the Beam that if you insist on buying British you will get the best, or better still go to your local Butcher, it might be a little dearer but it will be from animals that have been well cared for in conditions that you would like your pets to be kept in. I would go as far to say 'pampered'. What's more in all my years in this locality I have never seen the 'side of a horse' in any Butchers Store Cupboard or in our local Abattoirs. Sides of Beef bred from local Farmers by the hundred. So be safe. BUY LOCAL!! I am not a bit surprised that it has been going on, as eating horse meat on the Continent is more the norm than what I have heard described as a 'delicacy'. When I first went to Holland with the Bampton Weightlifters in 1963 it was on every menu in all the Dutch Restaurants. You just had to look out for the word 'paard' then avoid it like the plague. I do not think that it was because of the shortage of food during the war that made them eat it, I think that it has always been part of their diet.

Rouse's Ramblings - 2

Aren't we strange about what we eat? Up until the 1950's our families thrived on Rabbit meat. It was an integral part of our diet and could be found in abundance in the fields around Bampton, yet once the Myxomatosis hit, there was no way that I could eat Rabbit ever again.

Talking of food, did you know that here in the UK British Pig Farmers through their adherence to animal welfare are at a disadvantage to the rest of Europe? Farrowing Crates have been banned by the EEC yet only Britain is abiding by the rules. As always the Farmers in Europe are ignoring the rules as it is not in their financial interest.

A Farrowing Crate is basically a pen where at Farrowing time the Sow is placed in it to protect the babies that hopefully will be coming along. The 'down side' to them is that the Sow for the duration of her farrowing and about a week after cannot turn around. She can stand up, lie down, eat, drink and do all that she has to do in a nice warm environment. Immediately outside the crate is a nice warm arc lamp where her little babies can escape to, avoiding the dangers of their mother thrashing about as the next offspring comes into the world. It is also a safe haven for them as their Mother stands up and lays down which is always a dangerous manoeuvre for little pigs that have just been born. How do I know all this? Well I used to keep my sows in crates at farrowing time.

There was a story going around Bampton in the 1950's before crates came into being, where a Pig Farmer had a Sow that had given birth to 20 piglets. Now this mother had only 12 teats to feed her babies so the Farmer got rid of 8piglets to enable the 12 that he was left with to have a good chance of survival. During the following night the sow laid on the 12 and killed the lot! That is why I had installed a 'Baby Alarm' from the Pig Crate to my Bedside Table. If I heard piglet screams in the night I would be out there like a shot. I know that it was not very romantic for a newly wedded couple, but that is what farming is all about, perhaps that is why we only had two children!

I know that I should practice what I preach but sometimes even the best laid plans can go awry.

Mary and I have just lost one of our Dogs that had been with us for some fifteen years, he was a 'rescue' dog and had given us a lot of good times. So we thought that we would do the same again and give a rescue dog a good home. My word what a minefield that turned out to be. Rescue Centres were absolutely impossible to deal with, an issue that many people that we have spoken to since have experienced. So onto the internet we turned and what a fantastic choice we found there.

Rouse's Ramblings - 3

Seeing a lovely little dog on the Battersea Dogs Home site we made inquiries and found the staff very helpful until they started to tell us about the criteria that we must meet to have the Dog. First question, do you already have a dog? Yes. Do any dogs visit you on a regular basis? Yes our daughter's two dogs, Daily. Any more dogs visit? Yes our son's two dogs once a week. Right they said, could you bring all five dogs to the Battersea Dogs Home to meet up with the dog to see how they get on!! Can you imagine taking five dogs that have never ever been out of their environment here in the countryside being trundled up to London? So we gave that a miss and went back to the internet where Mary spotted a lovely Dog in the South East. The Rescue Organisation concerned was very thorough in their checks. Our establishment was thoroughly inspected and Mary and I interrogated to make sure that we were up to the job of adopting a new dog and I am pleased to say that we were accepted. So everything was set for us to meet up with Millie at the South Mimms service station. The shock news was that the dog was coming from Romania! Everything was perfectly handled and above board, we are very pleased with our 'bundle of fun' but why was it made almost impossible for us to adopt an English rescue Dog? Forcing ourselves and many others like us to resort to importing rescue dogs.

A sting in the tail to this doggy story is that we were asked to be at the service station at least an hour before the van arrived, making allowances for any delays we could be there for up to two hours. The van arrived with up to twenty dogs on board, all waiting to meet their new adoptive owners, the security was very strict making sure that all the new owners had a means of positive identification before the passports and paperwork was handed over. This all took quite sometime, now, somebody had mentioned that there was a two hour waiting limit at this service station, but in our excitement we never noticed any signs, what is more we were parked right in the furthest extremities of the car park, where with a bit of luck nobody would ever see us, we certainly never saw any parking officials with 'clip boards'; and I was watching out for them, so I thought that we had got away with it. But no, modern technology is miles ahead of this retired Farmer. One week later I received a letter that included a picture of my car with all the relevant times and fining me £60.00!! On top of that, as I wanted to pay up and be finished with it I found that even to pay by Debit Card they were going to Charge me £2.95 'handling charge'! They can have an old fashioned Cheque. In my role as President of Carterton Lions I had the lovely task of presenting a Cheque of £250.00 to the Bampton Primary School for use with their Outside Staging Project. I was overawed by the big 'Thank-you' card that was presented to me by one of the pupils on behalf the school. That is certainly one for the Lions Archives.

Rouse's Ramblings - 4

What an 'eye opening' experience my visit was. When you compare my days at Bampton School way back in 1943 to what it is now. The freedom that we enjoyed of going wherever we wanted within the confines of the school rules, compared with the 'locked doors' syndrome of today. It reminded me of the times that I used to take the Bampton Weightlifters to Aylesbury Young Offenders Prison for competitions! The wardens would open a door to let us in to one section, then lock that door before opening the next one to let us through to the next section. I understand why they need to do it in this modern age to protect the children, but that doesn't stop me from feeling very sad about it. As part of the Jubilee celebrations the Lions have invited all local Parish Councils to plant a Tree in celebration of the event. The Lions providing the Tree and planting it with the councils just telling us what kind of tree they would like



and where they would like it planted. You would not believe some of the problems we've had. One council wanted a tree and metal protection fencing that would have come to over £1000.00. Definitely a case of 'he who expects much, receiveth nothing'!! **Burford** involved their Primary School children in the planting ceremony which was most enjoyable, Shilton, Alvescot,

Clanfield and Brize Norton have agreed sites and trees which will all have been planted by the time that you have read this.

Bampton? Well they have told us what they want and approximately where they would like it planted but to try and get it finalised is a different matter, we have been waiting over two months now, so I have gone right to the top and had a word with the Jackie Allinson whom I can trust to sort it out for us. So hopefully when I come to record my next lot of Ramblings, there will be a Chestnut tree somewhere in the region of the Cemetery!





LESLIE THOMAS KING (10th March 1927 - 5th October 2012)

Les was born in Coventry in 1927 to Gertrude and William King; a brother to Bill, Mary, Terry and Roselyn. He attended King Henry VIII Grammar School, passing his School Certificate in six subjects, two with credits. At school he was keen on sports particularly football, cricket and rugby. He left school during wartime, and trained as a pilot in the Fleet Air Arm, learning to fly Tiger Moths; but the war ended before he saw active service. He got a job as a landscape gardener with a company preparing sports fields and his first job was building a bowling green at Shipton-under-Wychwood. One Saturday evening he went to the Butchers Arms in the village for a drink and saw a girl playing the piano, his first meeting with Stella. They got talking and he escorted Stella and her friend to a dance at the Beaconsfield Hall. Stella said she was not too keen at first, but when she danced with him she was smitten. They were, and continued to be, brilliant dancers. The next week Stella took a cup of tea from her Aunty Mabel's to the bowling green for him and the rest is history!

LESLIE THOMAS KING 10th March 1927 – 5th October 2012

Les worked for Jaguar cars, before starting a haulage firm with his brother Bill. He always remembers one contract delivering rabbits to a butcher in Warwickshire! At weekends he drove the lorry down to see Stella. They were married in 1949 (inset) and moved to Coventry where they both worked in the car industry. They moved to Bampton in 1960 to be near Stella's mum and dad who owned a building firm and a hardware store next to the New Inn, now called the Morris Clown and they opened Kings of Bampton across the road.

They'd never owned or run a shop before so came as raw recruits to the job and had to learn on the hoof. When Les and Stella turned up here to move into their new shop, they found their solicitor had made a mistake about the date and they had come a month too soon. So, Stella and the budgie moved in with her parents, Dolly and Eric Stroud, in their Hardware Store across the road and Les had to stay elsewhere, because there just wasn't space for him as well. When they eventually moved in, they found the contents of the upstairs were very much a store of everything that had and hadn't sold over decades. It was a hilarious Aladdin's cave which gave them many, many laughs and it took them a long time, and a lot of hard work to get it all cleared out, and the upstairs made into a comfortable home.

LESLIE THOMAS KING (10th March 1927 – 5th October 2012)

The items on sale gradually settled to those of a drapers plus ladies and gents clothing, footwear, carpets and line and they made a great success of it. They also tried offering made to measure suits which were beautifully made. were done after the shop closed. Hoppy Smith who lived in the caravan on the left as you go out of Bampton towards Brize Norton, had one suit made. When he went to London he went to a Jewish tailor and asked if he could make him a madeto-measure suit with the same quality material and if so, how much it would cost. The answer was, yes, he could, and the price quoted was three times more than he'd paid in Bampton, so Hoppy immediately ordered another one from Les & Stella!



They worked non-stop for their first 5 years in the shop, never once having a holiday, and Les in particular became very run down. Dr. Bullen realised he wasn't going to be able to persuade Les and Stella to go away on holiday so prescribed Guinness and oysters. When Les told his friend Paul Bovington, who owned the wet fish shop across the road, Paul said if Les got the Guinness then he'd supply the oysters. Les loathed oysters but along with Paul, he dutifully consumed them along with the Guinness, twice a week and eventually felt much better.

About 10 years after they bought their shop on the High Street, they sold up and went to live in Kenilworth for a couple of years, where they bought a dilapidated house, turned it into a wonderful home, sold it ... and came back to Bampton where they bought the Wheat Sheaf pub and turned it into the Post Office. Les and Stella worked as postmaster and postmistress for 10 ½ years. The Standard, Times and Echo for April 24th 1981 marked their retirement by saying, "Both Mr and Mrs King have endeared themselves to all users of the post office, having been extremely helpful and cheerful at all times. Les in particular is well-known for his sense of humour and quizzical quips."



When Les and Stella finally retired from the post office they converted the barn that stood right behind it into a home; doing much of the work themselves, and (with big smiles), called it "King's Court". The newspaper article quoted earlier went on to say, "Les is a keen gardener and he is hoping to devote more time to his gardening activities." He was particularly fond of growing dahlias. From there they moved to Minster Lovell; but Bampton called them back yet again and they bought a house in The Pieces which was to be their final home.

Les remained utterly bereft at the loss of his beloved Stella in 2009 right to the end of his life. All of Les's family are so grateful to his friends and wonderful neighbours, for all their help and care. Les was a loving brother and Uncle and devoted husband.





My name is Andy Lloyd when I left school at 18, I'd done pretty well, and was destined for university, the only problem was it wasn't really what I wanted to do. That's when I saw an article in 'The Beam' saying that Bampton Fire Station was looking to recruit new fire-fighters.

At this point, I feel I should describe my 18 year-old self; I was what you might call a "nerd" at school; head boy, Harry Potter look-alike, last to be picked on the sports team, in fact I was the least likely person to become a fire-fighter!

This did not put me off though and my preconceptions about the Fire Service fell away almost immediately, and I quickly realised that they were all just normal men and women with families and some with children, working hard, and working together to help each-other and their community. I was welcomed with open arms and given an application form and so began my journey, I became a retained fire-fighter at Bampton Fire Station in 2004.

Above all incidents and events during my time in the Fire Service there are two that stick out the most for me, the first were the devastating floods of 2007 and something as awful as that and of that magnitude is, thankfully a rare occurrence.




Additional information about the artists for the editors:


