Golden shrubs

To celebrate its golden jubilee Bampton Women's Institute bought three Golden Eleagnus shrubs for a grass bed in Cheapside to brighten the centre of the parish. The planting ceremony took place last Wednesday. The president Mrs A. Taylor, the vice-president Mrs R. Gerring and committee member Mrs G. Eeles planted in holes previously prepared by Mr J. Eeles, the husband of another member. Mr Rouse added boarded protection to the young plants to save them from the wind and dogs.

So far, all the evidence that the children at Bampton school had collected had only given them a patchy picture of what life was like in their village. But when they started to look at Victorian Bampton, there was suddenly masses of evidence. The first photographs were taken in the village around the middle of the 19th century. What evidence can you get from old photographs?

Describe some of the things that have changed in Bampton Square. The old photograph was taken exactly a hundred years before the other one. What kind of vehicle would have made the tracks in the road? How has the road surface changed? What signs are there connected with motoring in the new photograph? The street in the old photograph seems very still, empty and silent. What kind of things clutter up our streets and pavements today, which make them much busier places?

I will always remember my early homesteading days some eight miles northeast of Hughenden on Section 2-42-7. I left England when I was 18 to join my brothers, Jim and Fred, who were working in Manitoba. I arrived there in October, 1910 and then the three of us came west together and filed on our homesteads. We stayed with a neighbour, Bert Thomas and his wife, who we called "Mammy" Thomas, until our 12'by16' shack was built. After building our shack, buying a cookstove, heater and some household utensils we just had enough money left to pay for the food we needed for the coming winter. We melted snow for drinking water it tasted good after we acquired a taste for it.

In the spring of 1911 Jim and Fred worked out to earn a little more money. I helped Harry Groves for awhile. He lived a mile north of Hughenden. It was here I drove oxen for the first time and earned enough to buy a walking plough. While at Groves' I experienced my first prairie fire and I can still remember how thirsty we got fighting it. We drank water from the sloughs, wrigglers and all. And were mighty glad to get it! After leaving Harry's I stayed at Bert Thomas' cutting brush and digging stones before breaking the sod. We bought one horse and hitching it with Thomas' three we broke a few acres for Bert and then in turn borrowed his three and so turned the first few acres of sod on our homesteads.

In 1915 my brother Jim married Teena Chapman of Camrose whom he met when he was working for her Dad. The same year Fred enlisted in the First World War, fought overseas and was disabled and discharged in 1917. When he came back he and I built a home on his quarter section where we lived until we left the district for B. C. Fred was never well after his war years and in 1919 was stricken with sleeping sickness and spent months in hospital. I don't know how I would have managed alone had it not been for my good neighbours. They organized a bee and my crop was among the first planted that year.

I'll never forget and I'll never regret my early homestead years. My brothers and I were some of the last to homestead in our district so had quite a few bachelor neighbours. We used to go to Mammy Thomas' for a good meal. The bachelor neighbours I remember best are J. A. MacGregor (Mac), Johnny and Cyril Young and Harold Kennedy. No one had much money so if we had a job to do that couldn't be done alone we helped each other; dollars and cents never entered into our minds. I think this was one of the best things about homesteading; we were neighbours in the true sense of the word.

For the first few years our taxes were just two dollars per quarter section but we had no roads -- just prairie trails. Conditions soon changed, the Huamha Municipality was formed, people with families moved in and our school was built. It was named Pansy. Some people said we built it more for a place to dance than for a school. We spent many a happy time there with neighbours and friends. It has now been sold and used for some other purpose.

One by one the bachelors got married, gone were those first early days, but we still had good times afterwards. Helen Christenson from Wetaskiwin came to teach at Pansy school in 1923 and we were married in 1924. When we returned from our honeymoon at Lloydminster the neighbours descended on us that first evening en masse and gave us a chivaree that neither my wife nor I will ever forget. What a noise, pounding pans, banging drums and yelling at the tops of their voices. Helen was almost scared. The ladies brought a lovely lunch and everyone had a wonderful time.

We lived on our homestead with my brother Fred until November, 1938 when we moved to Lulu Island, B. C., leaving behind us the most neighbourly, friendly folk that anyone could ever wish for. Many of them have passed on now, but I will always cherish my memories of those good old days. Some of the old timers I will always remember are the Allan, Stubbs, McNeil, Tate, Reason, Thompson, Erickson, Rotaas and Cowan families.
