The New Editorial Team





The Bush Club NEEDS YOU! Bush Club Report Volunteers Wanted!

The Bush Club has just celebrated 25 years of being in the old school building. We have now moved into our new building in *The Old School Community Centre*, and hopefully will make another 25 years and more.

The Bush Club has been providing a hot lunch-time meal and entertainment for the men and women over 60 and 65 years in Bampton, Aston and Clanfield for all that time, all done on a voluntary basis. And indeed it's wonderful to think that, even in this day and age with so much bureaucracy around, we can still organise and run here in Bampton a very much loved and appreciated club for the elderly.

Unfortunately, like other voluntary organisations, the Bush Club is getting rather thin on the ground in terms of volunteers. Indeed, our *volunteers* these days are becoming our *members!* So with this in mind I am hoping to recruit a few new ones!

I hope to explain in the following short paragraph what each voluntary job entails.

We are looking for a new coordinator and hope that if we are lucky to find one it will mean being in charge one morning in three, instead of one every other week, which is what we have at the present time. At the moment the co-ordinators job requires quite some commitment, but hopefully with having a third one the commitment would be much less. You do get a nice feeling of satisfaction when the members arrive and they all sit down chatting away to each other. For some of our members this is the only time they come out of their homes and see their friends.

What does it entail? As a Coordinator you will be in charge of the morning session, making sure the dinner tables are laid, coffee/tea is ready when the members arrive, collecting the dinner money and organising the transport at the end of the morning. If there is a speaker, welcoming and thanking them, and taking the members out on the day trips etc. Normal time is 8.30am to open up the building until 2pm when everyone has gone home.

General Helper

You will help get our members settled when they arrive, serve them teal coffee, and help them into the dining room if necessary.

You would also help with the raffle, wash up the cups and saucers, make the tea and generally talk and help the members as best you can. Normal time of starting is 8.45am until 1.30pm, some helpers come from 10am until 1pm. The times and how many days you can spare can be sorted out to suit you if you are interested in applying.

Washer-Upper after lunch

This job is normally from 12 noon until 12.45pm and is generally just washing up the lunch time plates, cutlery, cooking utensils used for the lunch time meal. We normally have 2 people in the kitchen for this each session.

Kitchen Helper

You would come along and help the cook with the vegetables and anything else the cook may require help with, and also help with the serving of the meal at lunch time. Normal hours are 10am until 12.45pm. Most of the time these helpers can go when they have finished their jobs and return at 11.45am to help serve the lunch. We like to provide 2 helpers at each session, unless the cook only needs 1.

Cooks

The job of the cook is to provide a cooked lunch for 30 - 40 members once or twice a term - a term is around three months. Most cooks provide both the main course and pudding, but some only cook the main course and another will provide the pudding.

There is a budget for the cost of ingredients which is quite generous, and

Patrick Strainge provides us with our meat. Normal hours for a cook are approximately 10am until 12.45pm. If you are a cook we provide you with 2 helpers, unless you specify anything different to cater for your needs. We have no specific way of organising the cooks in what they do; but as long as someone is on the rota to cook that day its fine.

Helene Grygar is in charge of the cook's rota and would be more than delighted to hear from anyone who would be interested. Please contact Helene on Tel: 01993 851697.

Volunteer Drivers


This job entails fetching our members from their homes and taking them to the Bush Club, and/or returning them to their homes at the end of the session. Again we are very flexible on how many times you would like to do it, from weekly to once a month, in the mornings or afternoons. Normal times for this is 9.45am until 10am and 1.45pm until 2pm.

Unfortunately, most of our members who need transport need a front seat and do usually have a walker or walking stick.

David Rose is in charge of the rota and would once again be more than delighted to hear from anyone who would be interested. Please contact David on **Tel: 01993 850214**.

All these voluntary jobs can be staffed by either a male or female; we would just love to hear from anyone here in Bampton or surrounding villages who would like to help.

I hope that after reading this article you now know what volunteering at the Bush Club entails and it has not turned you off! 




The Old School Community Centre......Open for Business!

The project to convert the old school/youth centre building, to provide accommodation for the three main users, namely, Bampton Weightlifting Club, The Youth Club, and The Bush Club, was completed on time - in July - and within budget. There aren't too may projects which can claim that!

The Weightlifters and the Bush Club have now moved in, along with other organisations which used to hire either the original building or the Bush Club building, and while it is not known whether the Youth Club will eventually start activities in the Centre - there is apparently a lack of funding available from Oxfordshire County Council - the Bampton-based, Windrush Valley Amateur Boxing Club, have leased part of the facility, moving from Carterton and setting up shop in their home village..

Activities at Rosebank Care Home

Let me start by introducing myself. My name is Mandie Oliver and I am the Activities Co-ordinator at Rosebank Care Home.

My role is to share with the other staff in meeting various social and psychological needs of residents in a way that respects the dignity of each individual.

It is essential that I promote independence, stimulate participation and give a sense of purpose and wellbeing through a variety of activities.

My role involves getting to know each resident and understanding their personal likes and dislikes along with identifying personal interests. It is also essential for me to build up a good relationship with the relatives of our residents so that I can ensure that their interests are met with to the best of my ability.

Since joining the team of staff and residents at Rosebank, back in June 2010, I have organised and planned functions, craft activities, outings, tea parties, in-house games and a variety of entertainment. Each month I produce a monthly calendar of activities which clearly shows what activities are scheduled. When preparing this, I do so with the input of our residents. Every 6-8 weeks I hold a residents meeting which allows each resident to voice their thoughts, views, ideas about past and forthcoming activities. It is essential that the activities planned build a sense of excitement and self-worth as well as a sense of personal satisfaction, achievement and fulfilment.

To help produce such a varied and stimulating calendar we have the support from both Bampton's Pre-School children and Primary School children, who visit Rosebank 3-4 times a year. Over the past year we have seen some excellent performances from the children, and a favourite one in particular

was a visit from the Primary School Year 6 children who talked about Remembrance Day to our residents. Our residents love to hear the children sing and play instruments and the children are always so well behaved. I personally feel it is so important to involve the young in such an environment, as to my delight it is clear to see that both the young and old mixed together gain so much from each other. A big thank you goes to all the children who have visited Rosebank in the past, and to those who will visit us in the future, we offer you a warm welcome and appreciate your time.

Over the past year we have been on several group outings.

In June 2010 we visited Cotswold Wildlife Park for the day and had a wonderful time. In December we went to the theatre at Chipping Norton to see the Christmas pantomime.

In April 2011 we spent the afternoon cruising down the river on a wonderful fully adapted riverboat enjoying the sights of the river, complemented with tea and cakes (see photo below), and then also in April 2011 we took a visit to Farmer Gows near Abingdon to feed the lambs and see the new born chicks.

One of our newest additions to outings is regular shopping trips into Witney. Residents enjoyed a visit in August to Marks and Spencer's, ending as always with afternoon tea and cakes.

Future group outings planned for this year are a trip to Stow Arboretum at the end of October and again a visit to the theatre at Chipping Norton in December.

As well as group outings, residents are taken out regularly either individually or in pairs. You may have seen me walking around Bampton enjoying the beauty of your village. A particular favourite walk is down past the church.

I find that whilst out and about the people of Bampton are very cheery and always have time to say hello; this really does mean a lot to the residents and helps them to actually feel part of the community.

Please may I say thank you to those villagers who made us so welcome at the Talbot – it is lovely to know we are always welcome.



Residents given opportunity to recycle even more in West Oxfordshire

West Oxfordshire District Council is giving residents the chance to recycle even more plastics from the end of September. Householders are already able to recycle a range of plastics, including bottles and containers, as part of their weekly black box household recycling collections.

From September 26, they can also put out the following 'fly-away' plastics:

- carrier bags
- polythene
- small clear food packaging
- cling film
- bubblewrap
- compost bags

All that residents need to do is put their 'fly-away' plastics into a secured plastic bag (carrier bag or similar) inside their black recycling box.

Separating these materials from other plastics and items will prevent them from being able to blow around on bin day and help speed up collection times, as well as making it easier for the items to be sorted for reprocessing.

As well as 'fly-aways', residents can continue to recycle other types of plastics including bottles, tubs, pots and food trays. These can be left loose in their black recycling boxes ideally placed in the same box as tin cans.

A wide range of other items can also be recycled as part of weekly black box collections, including paper and cardboard, tins and cans, newspapers and magazines, glass, textiles and shoes. A full list of items that can and cannot be recycled is available at www.westoxon.gov.uk/recyclingA-Z. The collection of 'fly-aways' is being run initially for a 3 month period. After this period the scheme will be evaluated and if it has proved successful will be continued on a permanent basis.

Residents using communal bins will be informed separately about how they can recycle flyaway plastics.







Thatch has probably been used to cover roofs in Europe since at least the Neolithic period, and in the UK, thatch was essentially the only roofing material available to the majority of the population, until the late 1800s. The exploitation of Welsh slate





which began around 1820, and the arrival of canals and railways meant, however, that other materials became readily available, and gradually the number of thatched properties declined and thatched roofs became a mark of poverty. Thatch has become much more popular in the UK over the past 30 years, partly due to the rinterest in preserving historic buildings, but it is also arguably now a symbol of wealth if anything. 

Bampton Environmental Watch Group

There seems to have been an outbreak of speakeritis this year. Our talk scheduled for April had to be cancelled at the last minute when

we discovered that our speaker had confused his dates and was in Northumberland. Then, for our July meeting, Helene had to hurriedly find another speaker when the arranged speaker pulled out, only to then be let down by the replacement, but she came up trumps with a last minute successful replacement—Lawrence Bee gave us an excellent talk on the work of the Woodland Trust. Now we have just found that our October speaker has apparently double booked himself for our agreed date, but at least he was able to offer some alternative dates which allowed us to rearrange his talk one day earlier when the Village Hall luckily happened to be free (I hope nothing else happens to this talk between now and the new date of Wednesday 26 October). Our next scheduled talk will be at our AGM on Friday 2 March 2012 when the appropriately named Dr Larkman's subject will be "birds". Meetings are held in the Village Hall starting at 8:00pm. All are welcome, with attendance free for members, £2 for non-members (or join at the door).

Work on the alterations to the old school (youth centre) are now complete; pity(!) about the carbuncle on the front and the lack of on-site parking.

Although consultations on the draft Core Strategy for WODC's Local Development Framework (LDF) completed in July, changes in planning policies by Central Government have meant that WODC have now put back publication by at least 12 months to later in 2012. (Go to WODC's website at www.westoxon.gov.uk/planning/LDF.cfm for details.)

OCC have published for consultation (closing date 31 October) their plans for Mineral Extraction and Waste Management. This contains good

news for us—the supporting documentation states: "Clanfield/Bampton: All four nominated sites in this area are precluded on the grounds of the archaeological and historic landscape assessment and distance from markets. This area is therefore unlikely to make a strategic contribution to sand and gravel supply during the plan

period." (NB The plan period runs through to 2030.)





change of some air traffic routes was raised. We were assured that all movements and aircraft noise are kept to the minimum needed in order to provide 24/7 operational status. With the nights drawing in there is the probability of less late night/early morning engine noise, as training flights can be done earlier. Night flying is needed because planes can only fly into Afghanistan under cover of darkness, and so movements have to be tracked back from these hours. With newer aircraft coming into service, engine noise should be less from 2013.

We next looked around a Tristar. Most of the aircraft was very like a commercial plane but with a forward section adapted to provide facilities for medical care during the flight and swift transfer to the Selly Oak Hospital, if needed. A salutary reminder. While no aircraft spotter myself - I prefer steam locomotives - the wide variety of commercial and military planes on the parking area was inter-

Library DVD Reviews

THE BLIND SIDE

Set in Memphis, this is the story of 'Big Mike' (a homeless 17-year-old gentle giant) who is generously taken in by a well-to-do family - and then becomes a successful American football player. (It turns out he's a natural in the position of 'left guard' whose role is to protect the quarterback's blind side...) Two key elements save the film from lapsing into sentimental tosh; it's a true story, and Sandra Bullock's Oscar winning portrayal of Leigh Anne Tuohy - the forthright housewife who instigates Big Mike's change of fortune.

Also, relatively little time is spent on the football action, which may have been a bore for some. This deservedly gives the characters greater emphasis, in particular the relationship between Mike and his new 'family'. A fairly generous coat of Hollywood feel-good whitewash has been applied, for sure, but this remains an appealing watch (and Sandra Bullock is excellent...)

THE OTHER GUYS

It's said that American cinema hasn't produced a classic comedy since 1979. (Actually, I was just making that up. But really, has anything come close to topping Airplane, since..?) 15 minutes into The Other Guys, however, and I thought I was going to have a nosebleed from laughing too madly...

Macho mayhem in the NYPD, comic egos, guns blazing and Will Ferrell (playing the goofy, straight guy which he is sublimely good at). Unfortunately, despite some additional nice touches (from Mark Wahlberg in particular), about an hour of gradual comedy let-down then transpired. Steve Coogan, as the embezzling bad guy, (a crowbarred in plotline) was disappointing; the back story of Will Ferrell's character simply doesn't work; and then the writer/director resorts to (the usual) puerile stuff for laughs. Sigh.

But for its opening promise, where the 'tuna vs a lion' debate, and one of the funniest death scenes in cinema history had me rolling off my beanbag in hysterics... that's got to be worth an

extra two points... Chick rating: 3 Lads' rating: 7


My biggest disappointment is that

bureaucracy that is killing farming but never a day goes by without fresh cases being brought to my attention. Take the harmless piece of machinery known as a fertiliser spreader. It usually takes the form of a simple bin on the back of a tractor that holds approximately one ton of fertiliser; underneath is a spinning disc with a trap door to control the rate of flow for spreading. Very similar to the Council Road Salting Lorries, very straight forward and simple to use, yet the government has a great interest in these machines. These machines have to be government tested annually and certified with a

record kept of all the fertiliser that has been applied and where. I am told that the government is concerned that the fertiliser is being spread evenly and the correct amount on an acreage basis. (Sorry I should have used the metric expression Hectare!) Why should the government concerned about such things? After a lifetime spent in the farming community I can assure everyone that farmers are too tight to waste an expensive com-

modity like artificial fertiliser. I think that the whole thing is more to do with the Civil Service looking after itself than the even spread of manure! Jobs for the boys!

All this poses a question, should I be certified by the Government? Don't answer that yet! Last week my grandson wanted me to plant an acre of grass seed for him. I have sold all my grass seed applicators so thank goodness that my father taught me to sow the old fashion way like they did in Biblical times, a bucket of seed under one arm and working to a rhythm of one step – one hand full of grain cov-



there aren't any Youth Club uptakes on the facility. ering one yard to my right and four yards to my left; they didn't have metres in those days! I proceeded to apply the exact amount of seed to the acre. What I want to know now is, if I apply fertiliser to my grandson's land using the same method, will I be chased annually by an army of Civil Servants wishing to measure the size of my hands and my speed of travel along the ground?

We are now approaching winter and judging by the amount of berries on the trees I think that we could be in for another hard winter. The forecasters are saying that it could set in as early as this month - which to me is normal! One of the worst jobs to be done by hand many years ago was harvesting the kale for the cows to eat. The kale would grow to five or six feet tall, and during October, armed with an old fashioned Billhook, we would chop the stems down at about two inches from the ground, making all the ice and snow falling down our necks, we would then have to load it by hand and haul it back to the farm to feed the animals. Another problem in those days of October frosts was that farmers could not afford antifreeze for their tractor radiators as they held over ten gallons of water, so if a frost was likely, they drained the radiators out the night before. Sometimes though there would be a slip up when a frost was thought unlikely and the next day the tractor engine would be a total 'write off' with the frost splitting the engine in half. It was a hard life wasn't it! How ever did we survive?

GROWING OLD---THE BIG ISSUE

The Dilnot Proposals

As we live longer, many will become frail and in need of help, but this fact is something many of us set aside to think about later, often too late.

The current situation is that if your health deteriorates and your need for care is assessed as "substantial" you may be eligible to receive County Council assistance with your care needs. You would then receive what is calculated to be an appropriate amount of help. In other words, if you can no longer cope with basic needs you may get help from the County Council if you qualify under a set of "eligibility criteria".

Nowadays the cost of your needs, including residential care, would be assessed and a sum of money allocated for you to buy the help you need.

Sounds good so far but here is the big snag. If you have capital (which includes the value of your house) of more than £23,500, before you get the Council money you will be expected to pay for all the help you need until your money runs out.

Care is very expensive and frequently all the assets are spent quite quickly and only then will the Council step in with money.

But there is hope. Under the recommendations of the recently published Dilnot Committee Report the capital sum you can hold before you have to pay for your help is raised to £100,000.

Furthermore, when you have spent about a third of your assets (up to

between £25,000 and £50,000) your care is then provided free of charge and paid for by Central Government. This money could be repaid to the Government after your death. If, for example, you own a house and have other capital assets which are left in your will, the Government could take out the appropriate sum spent on you up to the limit described above, and the rest, is left to whoever you have decided are beneficiaries.

In addition to the amount you have to pay for social care if you go into a care home, is your "board and lodging", and this is assessed as about £7000 to £10000 a year which is roughly equivalent to the State Pension, which you would have spent if you lived at home.

Opponents to the Dilnot Report say that;-

The cost to Government, assessed as between £1.5 billion and £2billion a year, is more than the country can afford especially during a financial crisis...

The very rich would benefit disproportionately, and those of us who are not rich should accept the present system and be ready to spend whatever assets we have accrued on our care, if that becomes necessary.

There is no reason why young people, who are often themselves well off, should benefit from their parent's legacy.

Supporters of the Scheme say that:-

The removal of worry to people as they approach old age is a significant social step forward which is worth the cost

There would be a reduced pressure and cost to the NHS by very old people who are not currently being properly looked after.

There would be a significant reduction of pressure and stress on carers, many of whom are approaching old age and frailty themselves.

Insurance against the cost of old age would be possible as Insurers would be able to calculate a known financial risk, currently not possible.




The team work out of Carterton Police Station and is split into two teams, with Police Officers and Police Community Support Officers working side by side.
