



My sculptures and drawings are a celebration of life. They are inspired by the dynamic tensions in balance and movement in human and animal forms.

A winner of many public sculpture commissions, Jill Tweed makes sculptures that fall neatly into two categories: public commissions and gallery pieces.

Her public commissions tend to be commemorative sculptures, narrated historical or industrial subjects, large, bold bronzes loosely sculpted with a strong physical presence.

The gallery pieces, which are sensitive studies of dogs, horses, and acrobats, are inspired by the dynamic tensions in balance and movement in human and animal forms. Her sensuous and lively sculpted surfaces have expressive movement and simplicity of form and are infused with the empathy she feels for the animals and people she portrays.

Her influences range from early Cycladic carvings and Italian Stele figures to Rosso, Rodin, Marino Marini, Giacometti, and Germaine Richter.

She manages to capture the critical point of balance with a wonderful sense of vitality and pent-up energy.


