The District Council recently turned down an application to build 15 large houses on Station Road Bampton but there are now further housing plans for the villages in this area to which we must respond before any firm decisions are taken.

Oxfordshire is beginning to make some moves towards meeting the housing needs of the twenty - first century. In a "vision document" the County Council has proposed an increase of 4,050 in its rural housing stock by the year 2011. Even if a good proportion of this increase is borne by Witney and Carterton, as has been suggested, it is bound to have serious implications for villages such as Bampton, where services are already stretched: the Primary School full, the Health Centre at capacity and the sewage system almost over-burdened.

Of course additional housing is needed here, in particular, bungalows for retired folk looking to "downsize" and some further subsidised housing (but as this often comes as part of a larger package it could be problematic). The target for Bampton, as part of Oxfordshire's structure plan, may lie somewhere between 51 and 85 new houses by 2011. Alternatively, if the negotiations at District Council level are not sensitively and fairly handled, larger villages like this one may have to accept several times this number. How many of us would welcome another large estate on the outskirts?

Although no specific site for any such new development has yet been identified and no firm plans have been drawn up, this issue will certainly not go away. Once more details emerge as to how Oxfordshire intends to fulfil its "vision", residents of Bampton will have to ensure that their views are not ignored.

THE LIBRARY Needs Your Help!

Bampton is one of 30 libraries on a possible closure list put forward by the County Council. Only we can ensure Bampton is one of those saved.

Consultation questionnaires are now available in the library to give users and potential users of the service a chance to express their views. These documents have to be returned to the Museums Arts Libraries and Leisure Committee of the Council by 24th December. The results will then be collated and reported to their meeting on 27th January 1998.




FRIENDS OF ST MARY'S BAMPTON

The Friends of St. Mary's was set up in 1994 to help preserve the fabric of the church for future generations. It is a Grade 1 listed building and dates back to the 11th century. It is a very important part of Bampton's history and architecture. Having carried out major repairs to the spire in 1995 with the invaluable help of the PCC there is now approximately £45,000 in the account including a recently approved £3,000 grant from West Oxfordshire District Council towards the urgent repairs to the West and Norman doorways. We should hear before the end of the year whether we have been successful in out Lottery bid from the Heritage Fund. If we do get a grant, we can claim further support from Lambeth Palace and The Historic Churches Preservation Trust.

The Parish Council's major investigation into traffic was displayed for public view in September. In addition to reports and technical data, a series of drawings showed a proposed traffic calming scheme.

The aims of the exhibition were to highlight the traffic problem, to present a detailed investigation going back twelve months and to publicise the opportunities for a scheme. Visitors overwhelmingly praised and supported both the consultative process and the scheme itself.

Following this, public comments were reviewed by a traffic committee. Minor adjustments were made and consideration was given to a small number of suggestions which may require expensive fund-

Details in Parish Council minutes in the Library and Post Office.

Some background

For many years residents have asked what can be done about traffic in this area. Roads are the responsibility of the County Council, so there is little that Parish Councils can do. Bampton does not qualify for any help because we do not meet the criteria for accidents, traffic, or level of urgency.

Bampton sits between two (of three) nearby routes over the River Thames and suffers especially from traffic growth and expansion of nearby towns and villages. The A4095 passes through us and we are used as a short cut for the A420 and the A40. We have already had road improvements, which have undermined its character and raised speeds.

As this was only a 'self-help' investigation, we approached local Parishes, emergency services and others for there advice and support. Apparently their is no ready answer on how to investigate traffic calming,. We therefore decided on an indetions pendent survey in stages.

In February P.C. Leathe, an experienced traffic policeman came to take the first survey. He covered everything from driver behaviour to various calming measures which might be applicable. Our thanks go to PC Leather for his excellent help and

In April the County Highway Authority took their survey. The Area Road Engineer broadly agreed with the Police survey and offered further suggestions and explained County Councils options: no funding, but free help and advice.

The Scheme

Following this advice and County Highways procedure we appointed Messrs. PCS Associates to look at lowering speeds along the affected routes, which, in turn would create a traffic management plan. PCS survey the area and found our roads presented a unique challenge. They designed an affordable scheme consisting of the very latest measures but carefully minimizing

adverse effects on village appear-A11 ance. these schemes can amended easilv and inexpensively if need the arises.

The Future Our scheme has been submitted to the County Highways Department with detailed addifor Weald ap-

proach and several adjustments elsewhere. We still have the problem of heavy lorries and others rat-running through the village and we need to investigate the traffic scheme in New Road again (hopefully in 1998). A separate traffic survey is planned with wide terms of reference with the aim of providing much needed independent views of ALL the issues of traffic, but this will be in the hands of the new incoming Parish Council next Spring.

Our thanks go to Bampton residents and others for attending the exhibition, for supporting the proposals and giving suggestions for future developments. Thanks also to the Police - who are operating speed radar on certain roads - to County Highways personnel for their guidance and Messrs. PCS Associates. Finally, thank you for driving slowly and carefully through Bampton and remember -

Slow down and you will also slow the vehicles behind you.

BAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



RETIREMENT FOR JIM

It is with much regret that we announce the resignation of Mr Jim Gascoigne for health reasons. Jim served on the Council for 14 years and his words of wisdom will be sorely missed. The Parish Council greatly appreciate his contribution over the years.

COUNTY COUNCIL CUTS

The rate cap on the county budget threatens the Library and the Youth Club although we are being assured the Fire Station is safe for the present. The Parish Council will do all it can to keep these facilities and will advise of any planned action.

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT - Station Road.

Despite Council's numerous objections this is being taken to appeal. We will continue to object to the plans and keep the public informed.

RECREATION GROUND PAVILION

Planning permission is granted and Fire and Building regulations satisfied. The working group has also consulted the police on security. Steady progress is being made towards getting funding. The main application is for a Lottery grant of £200,000 which is essential for building to start in Spring. We also hope for help from the district council, the Forestry Commission and the Football Association.

AIRCRAFT NOISE FROM BRIZE NORTON

The Parish Council wrote to the station commander following numerous complaints. A reply stated the RAF position that noise has not increased but if anything has dropped in recent years. The main cause of this noise pollution is the antiquated VC10 which will remain in service for some years. Could the Ministry of Defence consider early replacement with the quieter 757 or 767? If you wish to

DOG FOULING

The district council agrees to supply dog fouling bins in Sandfords Field and elsewhere and to be responsible for emptying them. The Parish Council urges dog owners to please act responsibly and use these bins to help keep the village clean and tidy.

BRIDGE STREET

After pressure on the county council the railings are repaired. The Parish is also pressing for the pavements to be improved throughout the village.

POLICE LIAISON

Inspector Paul Hayles from Thames Valley Police told the meeting on October 2nd crime in the Bampton area has fallen significantly in the last two years. He emphasised the importance of all crime being reported for a true picture to emerge. There is currently a drive to recruit Special Constables. The Regional Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator, Maddy Tarplee also attended. See page 9 for details.

The refuse skips provided by the council outside the Town Hall and elsewhere on a rota are for "Bulky Household Waste" ONLY, and not for commercial use. 



OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL STRUCTURE PLAN 1996 - 2011

The bad news, announced last month, is that Witney has been asked to have an additional 1000 houses during this period making a new total of 2,700. In the rural areas of West Oxfordshire the number remains at 4,050 new houses and has not been reduced as we had requested. All this despite the fact that there is no money to improve the A40 to Oxford where most people work. No additional houses were proposed for Oxford City! The County is continuing to concentrate on houses in Bicester, Banbury, Didcot and Witney. All except Witney have rail communications! Witney cannot grow much more without destroying its character.

PLANNING APPEALS

West Oxfordshire District Council has refused planning permission for further developments in North Leigh, Bampton and Minster Lovell as it wishes to concentrate development at the moment in Carterton and Witney in order to spare the rural villages. The developers in North Leigh and Bampton have lodged appeals against this decision and dates have been set for the hearings. No doubt the Minster

Lovell developer will also appeal. If you feel strongly on these developments please make your views known through your Parish Council who can give you the correct address to which to write.

DISTRICT COUNCIL BUDGETS 98/99

Next month the Council will begin to plan its budget for next year. With the demand for extra leisure and sporting facilities, a growing interest in better recycling, and the fact that both WODC and Parishes are having to take on so many of the services previously provided by the County Council it is likely that our Council Tax will rise again next year.

YOUTH CLUB UNDER THREAT


In the Budget for 1998/99 the County Council is proposing to cut the Youth Service. This will either mean the loss of 21 Youth Workers or the closure of all County owned Youth Centres including Bampton. This is a disgraceful proposal. The grants for maintaining and running Youth Centres have been slashed by over half in the past few years. Youth Centres are not only used by Youth Clubs but also by Scouts, Guides and Brownies and the closure of these would be a devastating blow for all who work with the young. The Parish Council through the Parish Rate already funds one of the Club's two weekly evening sessions. 





"POSH SPICE" THE FOOD PAGE

More seasonal fare - one meat and one fish - that would be excellent for Boxing Day or a New Year Celebration. They involve a 'preserving' element, which means need to be started in advance; but are deliciously spicy and, as they are eaten cold, provide a refreshing alternative to the traditional christmas fayre.

SPICED BEEF

There are a number of versions of this recipe doing the rounds at this time of year; this came from "The Spectator" a number of years ago. The marinating process takes at least eleven days, but do not let this put you off - we have been known to do the rounds of seasonal family visiting accompanied by a joint of beef sitting in the boot of the car. You will also need saltpetre, which you can get from the chemist, but you might get some raised eyebrows as it is also an ingredient in some explosive mixtures. It is, however, excellent and well worth the extra effort. Ingredients are given for a large joint, but they can be scaled down (or indeed up) if you wish.

5-6lb joint silverside, in a long shape, without fat

3oz light brown sugar 1/2oz saltpetre 4oz sea/rock salt 1/2oz allspice berries 1oz black peppercorns 1oz juniper berries



Rub beef with sugar and leave for two days in a glazed stoneware bowl.

Crush together the spices, saltpetre and salt; rub the beef with this mixture thoroughly each day for at least 9 days. Gradually the beef produces its own aromatic liquid. Keep it covered in a cool place. Before cooking wipe off any spices adhering to the beef and put into a snugly fitting casserole dish. Pour in 1/2 pint water, cover with two or three layers of foil and its lid to prevent juices evaporating. Bake at Gas 1/290 F/145 C (not on the stove top) for five hours.

Remove from the oven and leave to cool, pouring off any excess fat before it sets. Wrap in foil and leave under a weight until the next day. Eat at room temperature.

GRAVAD LAX

This is a delicious alternative to smoked salmon. Slice thinly and serve with brown bread and mustard sauce.

1 salmon, filleted and de-boned, skin on

- 3 tblspns sugar
- 1- 1/2 tblspns salt
- 1 bunch fresh dill
- brandy, olive oil, pepper

It one of them skin-side down on a boar

Smear the sides of the salmon with olive oil. Put one of them skin-side down on a board. Mix the sugar and salt and pack the mixture in a layer on the flesh side of the fillet. Sprinkle with a little brandy and cover with chopped dill. Follow this with a generous grinding of salt. Put the second side of salmon on top of the first, skin side up (so that you have a salmon 'sandwich' with a sugar and dill filling). Wrap tightly in foil, put it in a large tray (with a lip to catch any liquid) and leave under a weight for four hours. Turn over, re-weight and leave a further four hours. Refrigerate. It will be ready after 12hrs marinating.

"BABY SPICE" CHRISTMAS RECIPES CHILDREN CAN MAKE

Peppermint Creams

I small egg white 200-300g (1/2-3/4lb) icing sugar A few drops of oil of peppermint or peppermint essence Food colours - pink, green Sweet cutters

Place the egg white in a mixing bowl, whisk until frothy, and add a few drops of peppermint flavouring.

Work in icing sugar to make a stiff mixture.

Add a few drops of food colouring (be very careful to how much you use). A pale pink and green is ideal.

Using clean hands knead to a smooth dough, working in more icing sugar if required.

Roll out, cut into shapes with the sweet cutters. Alternatively, shape into little balls and press out with a fork. Place on sheet of waxed paper, and leave in warm dry place for 24 hours. Store in a airtight tin.

Christmas Tree

300g (12oz) ready-made shortcrust pastry (or you can make your own)
300g (12oz) mincemeat
Water (to seal the edges)
Flour for rolling
Egg for glazing
Icing:
100g (4oz) icing sugar
4 x 5ml tspns cold water

Glacé cherries

Roll out the pastry into two oblongs. Place one on a flat baking sheet, spread the mincemeat over pastry in the shape of a triangle. Brush around the edges with water. Place second piece of pastry over the top. Cut around in the shape of a christmas tree.

From remaining pastry cut small shapes to decorate the tree, also cut a stem and flower pot. Glaze with beaten egg.

Bake 30-35 minutes on Gas 6/400 /200 C. When it pastry is cold the tree can be further decorated with glacé icing and glace cherries.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor.

As a Trustee of the controlling Charity I would like to comment on recent coverage concerning development of Buckland Road Recreation ground.

Readers are perhaps unaware that the pavilion/landscaping project will now cost £304,000. Building costs have risen by a surprise £60,000. This imposes an unexpected further drain of several thousand pounds from charity assets allocating all reserves on call. The 'public consultation' found only 155 village votes in support of this scheme, even before the true costs were known, so why does it go ahead.

A further twist is the intention to use it as a West Oxfordshire sports facility; something confirmed only recently. The organisers already encourage users to come from outside Bampton because the Charity 'needs' this income to pay its way. Now WODC is refusing sports grants elsewhere on the basis that West Oxfordshire residents must use Buckland Road.

Almost certainly, all these things could have unhappy consequences for Bampton and the Charity Trustees are even being asked to guarantee some borrowings personally because the project is so large.

While recognising the excellent efforts of hard working Bampton sports clubs, some Trustees believe it would be more appropriate to create something smaller. Does Bampton want or need a large serviced sports facility, such as those already open for business in Witney, Faringdon and others nearby?


Dear Auntie Beam,
