New Bus Operator

The new contract for the Bampton bus services 18 and 19 will start in December. While we have been active in trying to get the services improved – e.g. we have requested evening services and a higher day frequency on the service 19 – the services as provided at present look like they will be maintained 'as is' with some minor adjustments.

The following is what we have been advised so far:

Service 18

CHANGE OF OPERATOR (RH TRANSPORT)

Hourly peak/off-peak service continues, but service pattern via Northmoor and Bablockhythe has been revised to broadly two-hourly throughout the day.

New journey at 1505 from Oxford.

Connections with service 19 at Bampton remain to enable travel to/from Witney and Carterton. The intention is that only the 1605 journey from Oxford will require interchange at Aston.

Service 18A (single afternoon round to/from Witney) withdrawn.

Service 19

CHANGE OF OPERATOR (RH TRANSPORT)

NEW morning and afternoon shopping journeys between Brighthampton and Witney.

Hourly peak/off-peak service continues.

0805 journey from Witney to Carterton withdrawn due to very poor usage.

Both services will use low-floor buses.

Further details on actual time-tables are awaited.

Bampton Post Office

The project to move the Post Office to the main chamber of the Town Hall has progressed to the stage where planning consent has been obtained, a lease agreement is close to being signed as the 'Beam' goes to press, and quotes for various modifications which need to be made internally to accommodate the Post Office, have been received. Work is expected to start shortly, with the present plan for the Post Office to be up and running in the Town Hall on 30th December.

It cannot be stressed enough, how close Bampton was to losing its Post Office, and for the future, it is of the utmost importance that we all make good use of it, so that it can continue to serve the Community for years to come.

Please do come along and make it a memorable Village event.



BAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Clerk should be the first point of contact for Council business.

Old School Building and Bush Centre

The planning application has been approved, and the project now awaits listed building consent.

Construction is scheduled to start in January, although could be brought forward if the listed building consent is granted earlier than expected. Completion is scheduled for September 2011.

Buckland Road 7.5T Environmental Weight Limit

The Weight Limit is now active. The Parish Council has sent a letter to the Oxfordshire County Council, quoting the Minutes of Meeting of the OCC's Transport Decisions Committee which stated that: 'Mr Howell confirmed that the Order if introduced would be a permanent measure and that there could be further dialogue regarding introduction of a permit system.' (Beam Italics). On this basis, the Parish Council requested opening up a dialogue with OCC with a view to introducing an exemption/permit system for Bampton businesses negatively affected by the Weight Limit.

Town Hall

The project to move the Post Office to the main chamber of the Town Hall has made good progress, with lease negations completed, and quotes being obtained for modifications works. Planning consent has also been granted. It is hoped that, all going well, the Post Office could be in its new premises by 30th December. See front page for more information.

Mercury Court Playing Field Project

The project is essentially complete.

Emergency Response Plan (ERP)

Representatives from Bampton Sur-

gery, Cottsway and Rosebank Care Home attended the session along with Parish Councillors and District Councillors. The session was run by Caroline Martland of OCC and bill Oddy of WODC. Good lessons were learned from the exercise which will be used to update the ERP.

Council & Recreation Ground Charity Standing Orders

The Council Standing Orders were updated and approved. New Standing Orders by which the Trustees will oversee the running of the Charity were developed and approved.

Roads & Wish List

The bi-annual 'walk around' was conducted by Cllr R Smith, Cllr Gray and Paul Wilson of OCC, highways, and the 'Wish List was updated. The road along Bowling Green Close has been repaired, but is reported to be lifting

by the telephone box again.

The Council was advised that, due to changes in OCC, Paul Wilson would no longer be dealing with our area, and that we would shortly be advised who our contact would be in the future – likely a Mr Ian Clarke. Cllr Smith will follow up by inviting Mr Clarke to undertake a walk around of Bampton.

AGGROW Funding

Following a 'straw poll' at the Annual Parish Meeting, the Parish Council agreed to donate £1000 to AGGROW (Gravel Extraction Lobby Group) to help with funding, contingent on the decision of the OCC cabinet at its meeting in October.

Proposed Minor Alteration to Parking – Broad Street

A letter was received from OCC on 1st July 2010. It was in reply to a request by the Council to eliminate the parking restrictions on Broad Street. The proposal will remove the 4-hour parking in the lay-by on the west side of Broad Street, leaving this road without any parking restrictions.

Gravel Extraction

The Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) Working Group looking at gravel extraction has concluded in its report, which will go before the OCC Cabinet on 19th October – i.e. after 'The Beam' has been sent for printing – the following: 'The County Council's preferred spatial strategy for mineral working should be: (a) Sand and gravel – based on option 1: concentrate extraction at existing areas of working: Lower Windrush Valley; Eynsham / Cassington / Yarnton; Radley; Sutton Courtenay; and Caversham; this would provide clarity in the short to medium term, but the ability of these areas to provide for the medium to longer term should be assessed in light of the work to determine local need; and flexibility may be needed to consider new areas in the longer term;

- (b) Soft sand working in three existing areas: south east of Faringdon; Tubney / Marcham / Hinton Waldrist; and Duns Tew;
- (c) Crushed rock working in three existing areas: north of Bicester to the east of the River Cherwell; south of the A40 near Burford; and south east of Faringdon.'

This means that the options (Options 2 and 3 in the report) where the Bampton/Clanfield areas were included for future gravel extraction will not, at least for some years, be considered.

But in essence there could still be a danger from gravel extraction in this area after this time.

However, our County Councillor, Don Seale, has advised The Parish Council that he is trying to have the Bampton/Clanfield areas totally eliminated from future consideration, because he feels that there are certain fundamentals about the Bampton/Clanfield areas which swayed the Working Group against proposing them in this report, but which, he feels, will be equally valid in the future as they are today; and that the areas should therefore be removed totally from the gravel extraction RADAR! Let us hope he can convince those that need to be convinced! But it is good news for Bampton and Clanfield – at least for now!

Bampton Exhibition Foundation and the Bampton Welfare

Trust

At the Annual Parish Meeting on April 24, and subsequently in the Bampton Beam there were no reports for the Bampton Exhibition Foundation and the Bampton Welfare Trust. On the basis of better late than never, here they are:

Bampton Exhibition Foundation.

The income of the Bampton Exhibition Foundation comes from the rent from OCC for the use of the building to house the library. The Foundation's first responsibility is to maintain the Old Grammar School Building, and secondly to assist those under 25 in the parish with study, educational travel etc. In the last three years we have given bursaries to seven young people, totalling £2765, and have carried out significant work on the building, including:

In 2007, replacing a rotten lintel over the SW window, securing roof members, and making good the upper floor In 2008, repairing the wall to the garden in two places

In 2008 and 2009, making good the windows to the upper floor

In 2009, replacing the valley gutters with new lead and making good the Stonesfield slates.

In all we have spent nearly £32000, offset by very welcome donations of £5000 from the Bampton Community Shop, over three years. This expenditure has more than halved our reserves.

Bampton Welfare Trust.

In 2009 the Welfare Trust distributed £6230, including £2150 to schools, playgroups and other organisations, assistance with heating costs for 17 parishioners, and a further £3000 help for other families and individuals who had real need.

Susan Phillips retired as Chairman, after fifteen years as a trustee. At a farewell lunch the Trustees thanked her for her wonderful service to the Trust.

Dr Matthew Perry has accepted the position of Chairman.

Bampton Emergency Response Plan 2010 Update

The first Emergency Response Plan (ERP) for Bampton was issued in January 2009. Some minor changes have occurred since then - for instance there are some new Parish Councillors on the Parish Council - and the Plan has therefore been updated to reflect these changes.

It is not intended to re-issue the Plan to all households and businesses, since the changes are minor and do not affect the integrity of the first edition.

However, for residents who have mislaid the first edition, and for new arrivals in Bampton, a copy of this update can be obtained, free of charge, from the Clerk to the Parish Council.

The ERP, which was developed by the Parish Council, is designed to provide a framework to try and ensure an effective and robust approach to managing a major incident that may threaten the safety and welfare of the community.

In an emergency situation the responsibility for emergency response lies with the Emergency Services (ES), Oxfordshire Council (OCC), West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC).

However, it is recognised that help from these organisations may not be immediately available, and hence the need to develop the Village's own self-help plan to cater for such circumstances.

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

pressure, frustration, commitment, success and surprises though, have made me decide that this year has been my best season yet.

My first success happened before I even stepped foot in my kart back in March, as I had been awarded £400 from West Oxfordshire District Council. This had come about as I was se-


lected as a "Higher Achiever for Sport" in the District, with the money being granted to help me progress in the 2010 season.

A huge surprise hit me only a few days later when I arrived back from school, as I had found that a letter addressed from the House of Commons was lying on my door mat. Both slightly confused, excited and if I'm honest – a tiny bit scared, I opened the envelope to find that Mr David Cam-

eron had written to me with his congratulations for winning the UK Junior Championship, going on to explain that it was an inspiring victory and sending his best wishes for the 2010 season. I am most grateful for Mr Cameron spending some of his time in what was a very busy period for him to write to me, but also for Fenella and Fred Gray to publish my article. here in the Bampton Beam in the first place.

Now, I thought to myself, I really do have to make this my best season yet! The opening Round of the Easykart UK Senior Lights Championship was at Ellough Park in Norfolk, back in March. Thirty seven drivers were entered for the Senior Lights class, of which I managed to qualify 4th for the Qualifying Heat. The Qualifying Heat is a ten minute race + 1 lap, from where I would get my first taste of racing against much older drivers. I managed to finish 3rd in this and to the amazement of my dad and mechanic, I went on to win the 15 lap Pre-Final. I was the youngest driver on the grid and one of the least inexperienced. As I sat on pole position on the grid for the Final, I recall feeling a bit nervous, because all I had said to everyone all day was that I had nothing to lose - but surprisingly, I now did. The 20 lap Final commenced and I managed to hold onto the lead at the start. I was

constantly defending in prime overtaking spots and told myself to never look round once as this would just pressurise me. For the last five laps, I was under incredible scrutiny from the chain of four karts behind me and it felt as though as I was a little kid again, running away from my parents, because I had taken one too many cookies. The pressure was released though, as I crossed the line to take the opening round victory and re write

the history books for Easykart. Not only was I the first driver from the Junior class to win a UK round in the Senior class, but I was also the youngest ever driver to do so.

After having walked away from Round 1 with the Championship lead, I returned home to find that a few weeks later I had been announced as a "Driver to Watch" in UK Karting, My name had appeared against some of the best kart drivers in International Karting, but even more surprising was that I had been described to be just as good as them. I was in the best position possible to win the Championship, the Prime Minister had written to me and I was now the first ever Easykart driver to be announced as a "Driver to Watch." Things couldn't get better, so instead they got worse. Round two was at Teesside in Middlesbrough, where I was left with handling and performance problems

throughout the whole of race day on Sunday. April showers had lived up to their name early on, but the track dried out for Qualifying – where I was left in 14th place for the Qualifying Heat. My luck didn't seem to get any better, as I moved up to 9th in the Heat, but slipped back to 11th in the Pre Final and Final. This result had cost me serious points and luckily I only got demoted to second in the Championship. Round 2 is a weekend

that I want to forget, but a sign that I want to win is that I can't forget it. Clay Pigeon in Dorset held Round 3 of the Championship, upon which would be my second victory of the season. Qualifying finishing 5th and then 2nd in the Pre Final abled me make a clean sweep of the Final to take my second win of three races in the Champion-

ship. I had retaken the lead, but Round 4 was to prove tricky. It wasn't that England had lost a match during the weekend that dampened my spirits, but that the freak wet conditions in the Final had meant I lost the lead of the Championship. Starting on the front row of the grid, my decision to go to intermediate tyres was short lived, as the rain bucketed down during the race - resulting in a possible win turning to a devastating eighth place.

The second half of my season was action packed. Four UK Championship rounds remained, with also the European Championship in Poland up for grabs. Whilton Mill near Daventry hosted Round 5, which lead to me maintaining my Championship position despite a terrifying experience. I was starting 6th for the Final, but a huge accident on the opening lap lead to my kart suffering damage and my-

self worried. For the first time in karting I had felt scared. Due to the carnage the race had to be restarted and I went on to finish less than a second behind the leader in 5th, despite visible damage to my kart.

After Round 5 in July, I headed out towards Poland on a 1800 mile round trip to the European Championships near Stary Kisielin. Pretty much every country in Europe was represented with the bulk of the drivers coming from Italy, Czech Republic and Poland. The location was amazing, with the sweeping corners surrounded within a forest. The echoing of karts could be heard miles into the forest and when I cycled deep into the forest one afternoon it felt as though I was a child again, imagining Narnia in my wardrobe. The feelings from the surroundings seemed to help me though, as I was doing well. I managed to qualify 2nd, finish Heat one 2nd and Heat two 3rd. This resulted in me starting the European Grand Final in 2nd place. I held onto second place for the opening laps, until I eventually slipped to 3rd. I finished the 29 lap race in 3rd place, making me 3rd in Europe for 2010.

I would come home with another 3rd place trophy after Round 6 at Rowrah, Cumbria. I had qualified 9th, finished 6th in the Heat and 4th in the Pre Final. Despite battling for 3rd early on in the Final, I was the fastest person on the circuit and quickly caught 2nd place. A mistake however cost me vital time and it wasn't until the end of the race that I had re-caught 2nd place. It was too late and down to my own fault, but at least I had set the fastest lap of the race. Round 7 was also at Rowrah and the conditions remained dry. I qualified 7th and made my way up to 2nd in the Heat. A poor start in the Pre Final however meant I finished 3rd, but unfortunately I struggled in the Final to finish 5th overall. The string of results from Rowrah had meant my Championship position dropped from second to fourth, with only one Round remaining.

The final Round of the Championship was at Forest Edge in Hampshire during September. This race also proved to be my final karting race as I was retiring due to my GCSE's and work the following year. I wanted to go out

the best way I could, by winning the race and salvaging what I could from the Championship.

I seemed to be losing my touch with Qualifying and came in 11th fastest. A few adjustments to the kart though and after finishing 7th in the Heat and 3rd in the Pre Final, I was in the prime position to win the Final - on the inside for the first corner. I used this to my advantage and squeezed through to take 2nd place, slotting into the lead only a couple of corners later. I was back in front leading a race, something which I hadn't done for a few months. I managed to keep it together though and despite frantically waving at the marshals to wake up and warn a back marker I was approaching fast, I crossed the line in my final karting race in 1st place. My efforts had handed me 2nd in the UK Championship and automatic qualification to represent Team UK in the World Championships in Italy. I am however not participating in the World Championships due to school and also the slight problem that I don't have a kart anymore, as we sold it after the race! Competing at the front end of Senior's

hasn't been easy this season, but I have still managed to secure the results I have. I however wouldn't have done so without the help of my dad, who has put a lot of time, effort and passion into this season and also the karting I have done before. I therefore want to thank him for everything he has done regarding my karting, as without him I wouldn't have been able to find what I really enjoy – let alone achieve all the success that we have.

A lot of people have asked what I will be doing in 2011 regarding motorsport and the honest answer is that I'm not very sure. Although I would love to move into car racing, I fear that the limitation of sponsor's won't enable me to do so. I have therefore taken the choice to sit out for 2011 and concentrate on my GCSE's, after which I will review the situation come September next year. Who knows, by going on the surprises I have had this season, maybe I will be racing again before too long!

CLANFIELD & BAMPTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

the Rev. David Lloyd has kindly agreed to give the society a talk on the history of St Mary's Church, the oldest surviving building in Bampton, and it will be held in the Church on March 15th 2011 at 7.30pm.



NHS Oxfordshire is calling on people in the county who have something to say about their community to become part of Oxfordshire Voice.

Do you want the opportunity to regularly comment where it can make a real difference to your area?

Oxfordshire Voice is a citizen's panel made up of Oxfordshire residents who have volunteered to give up some of their time to answer four questionnaires a year created in partnership between NHS Oxfordshire and Oxfordshire County Council.

The panel is carefully recruited to be representative of the population of Oxfordshire but there are some areas where we need to recruit more people these include:

- people, particularly men, aged 16 to 34
- people in full time work
- people who live in the area covered by Cherwell District Council
- people who live in the area covered by Oxford City Council
- people from Black and other minority ethnic groups living in Oxfordshire.

You can have your say on line or by post — whichever you prefer. You could be invited to take part in other activities like online discussion forums or group discussions if this is something you are interested in.

Previous topics the panel have answered questions on include: where people think the council and NHS should save money and what the priorities should be, alcohol and drinking patterns, whether the police and other public services are successfully dealing with crime and anti-social behaviour and people's experiences of local health services and transport issues.

What the panel says is used by the Council and NHS to help develop services and change the way things are done.

For example, one set of results asked for more support for pregnant women as a result NHS Oxfordshire developed a service for new mums just out of hospital with their babies, to provide breastfeeding support.

Feedback about transport issues has been used in the council's transport plan.

West Ox Arts is an association of artists and art enthusiasts, many of whom take part in exhibitions alongside artists invited from the wider region. Sara Withers beautiful jewellery is made from beads selected from all corners of the world, designed to be eye catching yet easy to wear.

Ceramics by Robin Walden

Robin's work is wheel-based, he works with a variety of clays, especially a dark iron-rich clay from Devon, and a smoother stoneware from France. His simple lines and elemental designs are enhanced by woodash-based glazes, which with their deep colours and varied surfaces add significantly to the life of the object.

Wooden items by Richard Shock

We sell a range of wooden bowls, platters, and candlesticks made by Richard Shock. Richard uses both native British hardwoods and selected imported species from around the world. His quality pieces combine good technical turning techniques

with careful attention to design to enhance the inherent beauty of the figure and grain. His pieces are usually finished with tung oil followed by a buffering stage, ending in a carnauba wax, which is food safe. Richard tries to ensure that all the wood he uses comes from sustainable forestry practice.

The Carterton, Bampton and Burford Neighbourhood Police Team would like to update you with how anti social behaviour is being tackled in Bampton.

We received reports of drug issues in Pembroke Place and by liaising with partner agencies we obtained two drugs warrants which produced positive results. In conjunction with Cottsway Housing the main perpetrators were moved from the area.

PCSO Isabel Webb regularly visits the area to engage with residents and has received positive feedback since, with many saying it is a much quieter and more pleasant place to live.

Please don't hesitate to ring us, you are not wasting our time and no information is too insignificant, it may just be the last piece we need. Community information is vital.

Congratulations to David Radband

on being 'Mentioned in Dispatches'

The Citation reads:

During the period from June to September PTE Radband operated with the Welsh Guards. He and his section were at the forefront of nearly every patrol. This was during the height of the Helmand summer, a summer which proved the most lethal to ISAF troops to date. The pressure was relentless, nearly every day he was involved in contacts and IED strikes and was often found leading from the front when clearing compounds and fighting through insurgent positions.

Many times he took the initiative by following up on enemy ambushes with complete disregard for his personal safety. He maintained his resolve despite direct threats of capture, and threats to his life from insurgents. The brutal reality of IED's and the deaths and injuries sustained by his fellow soldiers only strengthened his resolve and he continued to take the battle to the insurgents day after day without falter. On 27th August 2009 Pte Radband and his section were involved in a patrol when they came under heavy contact from a compound which resulted in the death of an officer. Making the decision to assist the friendly forces who had been fixed, Pte Radband and his section pushed forwards to a position where they could engage the enemy. Seeing that momentum needed to be gained, he saw an opportunity to clear through the position. Following a relentless barrage of suppressing fire from his section, he made the decision to fight through, leading his section Pte Radband cleared the enemy position and thus reducing the possibility of further deaths or casualties. His professionalism, stoical attitude and numerous acts of bravery were recognised and highly regarded by CO Welsh Guards.

Pte Radband's demeanor was always self-depreciating; there are many separate incidents that could be cited but what should be recognized is his persistent bravery and selfless-commitment for an extended period of time. His actions should be publicly recognized and commended as an example to us all.

The Village Hall Management Committee provided £3,000 from its own funds.

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Winter Recipe Autumn sausage stew with celeriac and kale

Courtesy Riverford Home Delivery

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil 500g pork sausages

100g bacon, cut into lardons

2 onions, sliced

1/2 celeriac, diced into 2cm pieces

2 garlic cloves, crushed

sprig of thyme and a bay leaf

1 tablespoon tomato purée

100 ml red wine

300 ml chicken/meat stock

dash of Worcester sauce

2 dessert spoons Dijon mustard

400g kale, stripped from stalks and shredded

200g cooked white beans

Method

Shallow fry the sausages and lardons in oil for 5 minutes. Remove the sausages.

Add onions and cook for 10 minutes. Turn up the heat and add the celeriac, stirring frequently to stop the onions from burning.

Add the garlic, herbs and purée and stir well for 2 minutes. Deglaze with red wine, add stock, Worcester sauce and mustard.

Bring the contents of the pan to a simmer, return the sausages, cover and cook for about 20 minutes.

Add the kale to the pan and wilt for 10 minutes before mixing with the rest of the braise. Add white beans, season and cook for a further 5 minutes.

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Bampton Environmental Watch Group

In July we had a most successful meeting when Tim Healey gave a talk on 'The History of the Green Man'. This attracted one

of our largest audiences including visitors from outside the village. When you read this report we will have had our final meeting of the year. There are no more meetings after this until our AGM on 3 March, when Martin Way will give a talk on the Cotswold Wool Trade and Shepherding. Open meetings are held in the Village Hall starting at 8:00pm. All are welcome, with attendance free for members, £2 for non-members (or join at the door).

Bampton's 7.5T environmental weight limit is finally in place, but there are still problems associated with obtaining some form of permit system for local businesses. An OCC officer is denying any question of a permit system, in direct contradiction of the minuted decision to allow future discussion.

In July OCC at last submitted their plans for alterations to the old school (youth centre) to allow the incorporation the Bush Club and move the weight lifters to an extension to be built on the front, but with totally inadequate parking for only six cars. At the beginning of October they gave themselves planning permission to go ahead, but at the time of writing they are still awaiting listed building consent.

It appears that the threat of gravel extraction that has been hanging over us is moving away, at least for the time being. OCC have been considering for some time three options for future extraction of sand and gravel. Option 1 involved just existing sites, while options 2 and 3 incorporated new sites, both including a vast tract along the Thames from Radcot, which would have dire consequences for Bampton and other local villages. The Cabinet meeting on 19 October is now likely to confirm the recommendation before it, to adopt Option 1 as its preferred approach in the short/medium

term. This will be subject to further consultation.

The consultation for WODC's Preferred Approach document for their Local Development Framework (LDF) Core Strategy closed in March. The outcome from this is awaited, but will be affected by changes to the planning system that are gradually being announced by our new coalition government. (Go to WODC's website at www.westoxon.gov.uk/planning/CoreStrategy.cfm for details.)

Change of use to Post Office and associated internal and external alterations have been granted for the middle room of the Town Hall.

First off, this is nothing like the Errol Flyn version. This time round the 'merry men' are predominantly a bunch of coughing adolescents, and the final battle takes place on a beach. Robin, played by Russell Crowe at one point says, "I don't know where I'm from or where I have been." His accent would seem to suggest he's been all over the place, as it pingpongs around the British Isles (sometimes within the same sentence) with bewildering dexterity. He even briefly sounds like one of the Beatles. Anyway, the evocation of medieval Britain is terrific, the supporting cast are all fairly decent and the action is certainly not dull. I had trouble getting into some of the narrative subtleties but was pleased to find the soundtrack hadn't been hijacked by someone like Bryan Adams...



The Committee would like to wish all our members a very Happy Christmas and a Healthy New Year.



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

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



HISTORIC ROOF RESTORATION NOW COMPLETE

Short history of St. Mary The Virgin, Bampton

The church of St. Mary The Virgin is a Grade I listed building and stands proudly and prominently at the heart of the community of Bampton. The present church dates largely from 1153 onwards, though evidence exists of a Saxon minster on the site prior to the Norman Conquest. Originally associated with St. Beornwald, the church was later dedicated to St. Mary and St. John The Baptist, perhaps indicating that there were in fact two adjacent churches on the same site. The church has undergone two major remodellings: the first in 1270 when the soaring spire was added along with the side aisles; the second between 1867 and 1870 when St. Mary's was "restored" and the roof changed to its present stone slate-clad form, involving the removal of the clerestory windows which had been a feature of the Early English church.

Rain had rotted the lath and plaster and started to rot one of the main beams



What was the problem?

Following extensive work in the 1990s including new lighting, power circuits and the installation of a kitchen and WC, the 5-yearly inspection of 2003 revealed that the roofs of both the Nave and Chancel were in a perilous state. For some time stone slates had been slipping, held in place only by their own weight, resulting in water getting into the ceiling of the Nave and plaster encouraging the disintegrate and fall. Not only did damp cause problems with the plasterwork and timbers, but the slates themselves were gradually deteriorating with seasonal freezethaw action particularly affecting the northern sun-starved slopes.

Our architect's reports were subsequently supported by those of

English Heritage architect in 2007 by which time consideration had to be given to whether the roof was safe to allow access around the building and also within. With the church and community unable to raise enough funds in time to replace the whole roof at once, English Heritage supported a two phase approach which deemed the Nave more urgent. By the time work commenced on the Chancel roof in 2010, the condition had significantly worsened, with many more stone slates requiring replacement compared to the Nave, proving what might have been had action not been taken.

Getting started

Under the guidance of our architect Andrew Townsend of Faringdon, a project team was selected for the work. It was essential to select professionals with experience of historic buildings. Initially investigations were undertaken by stone and slate consultants from Caernarfon in North Wales, structural engineers, general contractors and roofers. An early concern was the presence of bats and since bat species are protected, it had to be determined whether or not they were roosting within the church, with appropriate monitoring remaining in place throughout the whole project. Extra concerns surrounded the Chancel work, since underground drainage had to be improved and this involved an archaeological investigation and the revelation of an old well within the churchyard.

The main contractors for the Nave work were W.G. Carter, whilst Wards were responsible for the Chancel phase, although the actual roofers, Everest, remained for both phases – a skilled job requiring the correct placing of the slates with largest at the bottom of the slopes and the smallest at the top. New slates have been interspersed with the old to stunning effect, and the bats – should they return – now have a new home.

Inside the church, patches of plaster had fallen off revealing the lath and plaster

The Nave - Phase 1 - Main problems

The cost of the nave work was approximately £220,000 and involved a significant amount of work inside as well as out. Unlike the boarded ceiling in the chancel, the Nave has a plaster ceiling. Some of the issues included the following:

A large temporary roof structure was erected to protect the workforce and church through cold wet winter months. The scaffolding had to be fixed over the lead covered aisle roofs, which in turn were protected by thick plywood sheets screwed down.


A suspected bat roost within the void under the ridge tiles had to be carefully examined. This required a bat licence and careful monitoring.. No bat roost was found, but the new roof incorporates space for bats to colonise.



Where there had been gaps between the tiles, water had damaged some minor timbers, but had also compromised some areas of the plaster ceiling causing lumps of plaster to fall within the Nave – not a good place to sit at the time! All defective lath and plaster was replaced, and the whole ceiling checked thoroughly and redecorated.

Generally the condition of the Nave structure was found to be in very good order. A membrane has now been placed under the tiles (with stainless steel replacing the original green oak pegs) to help keep the roof watertight.

This Phase started in March 2009 and was completed in about 6 months. There was a slight reduction in the overall cost in the end due to fewer slates needing replacement.





The cost of the Chancel work was approximately £190,000 but unlike the Nave has been mostly restricted to the exterior. Additional work outside the scope of the roof project was in progress at the same time, the most significant of which is the work to masonry within the tower and the restoration of the exterior frieze of the Horde Chapel. Various issues included the following:


Some of the structural timbers within the Chancel roof structure were found to be rotten and were replaced.

More chancel tiles had to be replaced than experienced on the Nave. Up to 50% could not be re-used and this increased the costs from earlier estimates. Some of the replacements were in short supply and alternative quarries had to be investigated (most came from the Brockhill Quarry at Naunton between Stow and Cheltenham.

The Chancel drainage was also an issue and new soak-aways have been constructed to accommodate rainwater.

Since there are many archaeologically sensitive areas around the Chancel and the building structure had to be protected, designing a suitable scaffolding structure proved very complex and delayed the start of the Phase by a few weeks. This Phase started in February 2010 and completed in July 2010.

The total cost of the repairs to the Nave and Chancel Roofs was £410,000. In addition to the large number of donations from local people and those further afield, we received some £115,000 from a wide variety of events arranged by the Fund Committee members. These proved to be highly enjoyable for our community and included:

A Raise The Roof Auction of Promises, a Clay Pigeon Shoot, a number of Concerts held in the Church, a talk by a famous local politician, an 'Antiques Road Show' held on a glorious summer's afternoon and a Barn Dance held in Church.



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OUT OF WORK FARMER - TURNED AGRICULTURAL CORRESPONDENT

Sometimes when our Editor tells me that it is 'that time again' meaning that the deadline for publication is fast approaching, I start to panic as to what I am going to write about. No problems with this issue, I have got lots of stories to tell about the things that have been happening with the different 'hats' that I enjoy wearing. As my 'brief' from the Editor is to write about farming in our Community, I suppose that I had better start off wearing my 'cowman's hat', be-

fore rambling off on to other things. It is with great sadness that I report on the last farm in Bampton producing milk will cease to do so next year. Mr Simon Collins will be selling the dairy section of his farm next spring. There are so many people in Bampton that have had connections with this

that have had connections with this herd, so many families that have had relatives involved in its care and upkeep over the last sixty seven years. It

was in this herd way back in 1945, aged 8 that I was encouraged by my father; who at the time was the farm manager, to hand-milk my first cow; her name was Perpetual, and I remember that she had to have her legs tied together to stop her kicking.

In those days, before Artificial Insemination, when bulls were used and nature was allowed to take its course, there was still a need for genetic improvement. Great thought went into the choice of bulls to improve the blood lines of the herd, I remem-

ber two extremely good bulls that Mr Collins Snr. bought especially for that purpose. One was called Edgerely Barrecas, and the other Elmwood Epicure, which came from the famous Elmwood herd at Black Bourton. Both were extremely dangerous and both had on occasions broke loose to cause mayhem around the farm. What fantastically dangerous fun it was watching my father and the farm staff trying to catch a bull who did not want to be kept in captivity away from his ladies; mind you when I became a teenager with very strict parents I could empathise with the bulls! Things got so dangerous for the handlers that a special pen was built, whereby the bull was put in a special cage when his ladies came to visit him and could be controlled from outside without the need for any human being put at risk. I am so glad that my parents did not resort to such measures for me!

I learned so much from my time at Weald Farm, which was where the herd was based at the time. I learnt that Italian prisoners of war were so very lazy and that was probably why they were first to be captured. With the German prisoners of war, I learnt

from my father that if you made the effort to learn their language, it was possible to make great friends with them. We had two of them billeted in the tin roofed outhouse that is still standing there today, and they were so kind to me and my siblings, making

slippers and toys for us. At peak times like harvest there would always be a daily lorry load of German POWs to help out with the increased work load; these were all under armed escort, which was usually one British soldier with a tin hat, armed with a .303 rifle and ten rounds of ammunition to guard twenty POWs. Oh yes there were 'cut backs' even in those days! After the Germans, came the 'Displaced Persons'. These were mainly people from Czechoslovakia, Poland etc. and were involved in building the first corn drier for Mr Collins. I think my father found these much more difficult to work with. They also came by the 'lorry load' but they were all under strict control and accounted for. The Government of today could learn so much from the Government of those days on the con-

Like many youngsters from Bampton it was on this farm that I drove my first tractor and had my first paid work, all at the age of eight! My first job was threading the wires back through on the stationary baler. Health and Safety? No we learnt common

sense; if I dared to put my hand in the wrong place it would have been chopped off, so I didn't do it! Simple as that. Child Labour? Never, at sixpence an hour for an eight hour day, I was on big money and able to save up to buy the things that I wanted. Even eight year olds had needs in those days. Just a shame that I spent too much of it at Bampton Fair.

Moving on and wearing my 'International Twinning Hat'! As you know, in the past we have been able to have some Dutch marching bands perform here and many groups from Bampton have been to Holland, including

Morris Dancers, Weight Lifters, Barn Dance Bands, Folk Dancers and now the Bampton British Legion's Standard and Bearer have graced the streets of the University City of Leiden. The Oxford - Leiden Twinning Association tried to take a group of

the Royal British Legion to honour the Dutch Remembrance Day on 4th May this year, but were beaten by a lack of hosts This grieved members of the Band that visited Bampton a few years ago, so much so, that they decided to make amends by inviting members of the Oxfordshire RBL to help them celebrate the 65 years of liberation. They paid all the expenses of the group; five in number, to go from Gatwick to Leiden, stay in a good hotel, then take part in a big parade with some of Europe's top marching bands including Amigo who performed for us at the Shirt Race. Members of the group report of having a fantastic but tiring time. The whole thing took just over thirty hours! Oxford - Leiden - Oxford. We were hoping that Gary Gummer, Bampton's official Standard Bearer could have made the trip, but rather than let us down he persuaded John Grout to do the honours for Bampton. So thank you John for parading Bampton's Standard at such an auspicious occasion.

Next is the 'Hat' of NAG - the Neighbourhood Action Group. This is a group of people who care for what is going right and wrong in the community. It is able to put pressure on all local Government Offices. Be it speeding, noise, fly tipping, irresponsible behaviour; you name it they will try to help. Not by jumping on things from a great height, but by finding solutions to the problems. All our local Councils have representatives on the Committee so they are able to share solutions and info. Bampton Council representatives are Dale Turner and Lee Mackie. Got a problem? Have a chat to them.

With my Carterton Lion's hat on, have you got some one living with you, or you know of someone who is on regular medication? Have they/you got a 'Message in a Bottle' in the Fridge? No? Then maybe you should contact our secretary Maddy Radburn on 01993 772241. These Bottles contain all the necessary information of what medication the patient is taking and what they are allergic to. With a green cross warning sticker, stuck on the back of the door; these are supplied with the pack, and the paramedics are trained to go straight to the patient's fridge to check out all the

vital information that is contained in the bottle. This can save time and lives. Maddy would love to hear from you. Throughout the country, there are hundreds of thousands of these bottles being put to good use, so do not miss out.

Talking of health matters, as some of you know, I recently suffered a mild stroke and one thing that has been brought home to me, is the need for everyone to be aware of that advert that is seen on the television so much lately, referring to strokes. It is called F.A.S.T. Please take notice of it, because one day it could be YOU!! F = Face, has it gone lopsided or feels numb? A = Arms. Sitting or standing, can the patient hold both arms out in front of them, then closing their eyes maintain this position? S = Speech, can they talk coherently? T= Telephone. If the patient is struggling with any of the aforementioned problems, then telephone 999 for an Ambulance! Don't mess about with trying to contact the doctor or surgery. Time is of the essence, the paramedics will soon sort out if you need to go to hospital or not. If the hospital can treat you within the first three hours of having a stroke, long term damage can be avoided.

What happened to me? Well as a senior citizen I found the need, as one does, to get out of bed in the night. Straight away I was acting as if I was drunk, so being a teetotaller, I thought 'this can't be right' and flopped back onto the bed fearing that I had suffered a stroke. So I did all the checks. Face - feels no worse than normal. Arms - Lying on the Bed, I twirled my arms around and I must admit that they were very 'wonky'. Of course I should have been sitting up to do the test! Speech - I did not want to worry my wife, so I spoke to the dog who was sharing my bed with me and he seemed to understand what I was saying, so I went back to sleep. How stupid was that? I have been so lucky, I have been left with minor problems down my right side and have a little difficulty with running, but it could have been so much worse.

I have been involved with the new plans for the Old School Building which is going to provide a new home for the Youth, Weightlifting and Bush Clubs, for nearly two years now and for most of that time have been made aware by the authorities that are controlling the purse strings, that it must be up and running by September 2011 or we do not get the money. But these same authorities have been dragging their feet in getting things moving. I have a dreadful fear that with all the hours that many Bampton Volunteers have put into this project, it will have all been in vain. I hope that I shall be proved wrong.

But back to the farming! There has been a lot written in the press recently about 'Cloned Cattle' in this Country. Whilst accepting the need to genetically enhance the progeny of our herds so that we can produce better quality food from fewer animals, I do feel that this is a step too far and totally unnecessary. From a Health and Safety point of view, the public have nothing to fear. I had to smile at one correspondent in a national newspaper; he referred to the public drinking milk from these calves! Just shows how much he knew about the subject. Calves don't give milk till they become cows and have had a baby calf themselves!

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WHAT IS THE BAMPTON ZIMBABWE PROJECT?

In 2003 a group was formed of people who thought that a fortunate place like Bampton might be willing and able to offer help to people on another continent who were not so fortunate. Since that time interest in and support for the Project has grown steadily.

However there remain some who have never heard of it, and some who disagree with the concept. A commonly given reason for refusing to support is the fear that financial aid sent to impoverished countries may be high-jacked by unscrupulous governments or individuals. It is for that reason that we would like to explain how we are trying to help the people of Zimbabwe.

The money we raise by our activities is distributed three ways. 1) to SOS Children's Villages to help with their work in caring for orphaned and abandoned children in Bulawayo, offering them an education and training in ways which will help them to become self-sufficient. 2) We also contribute to World Vision, through which we have been sponsoring a boy called Patrick who lives in Hurungwe in the north of the country. Both of these organisations work world-wide, but in addition we send the greater part of the funds we raise to a registered charity called Zane - Zimbabwe A National Emergency. This organisation, founded by Tom Benyon in 2002, was set up to care for pensioners who, having made provision for the future, found their income destroyed by hyper-inflation, leaving them destitute. Many of these people had served with the Allies in World War II or were their widows. Zane works with all the Services charities and the Royal Ex-Services League. Zane also helps a palliative care clinic which cares mainly for widows and orphans and HIV/Aids sufferers, both black and This clinic also helps set up projects such as candle-making, the production of clothes and school uniforms, and making and repairing shoes, thus helping people towards self-sufficiency. Zane is a small but tightly run organisation. There is a very small base in this country, and funds are taken to South Africa where

they are converted into dollars to buy supplies and medicines to take into Zimbabwe. There they are handed directly to the doctors and nurses who are engaged in humanitarian work. Zane's proud boast is that in the eight years they have been operating no money has ever been lost through corruption.

We are well acquainted with Tom Benyon and Robert Beckinsale, both of whom live in Oxfordshire. We have also met some of the nurses who work in Zimbabwe and who have visited the UK to describe their activities. We feel quite confident that the funds we raise go to the people who need them most. In 2008 we sent £4,742 to Zimbabwe; in 2009 the figure was £4,224; so far in 2010 we have sent £5,065.

As a final point we would like to draw attention to the fact that we are a registered charity – and also that our stated aims include the fostering of community spirit in Bampton. We are a truly local charity!

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
