













## **ARTHUR DIXEY**

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Arthur Dixey knew Mr. Bennett of Ilmington well. Sam was a respected businessman and was always known as Mr. Bennett. He used to come over to the Elephant, send a note to Mr. Dixey and Arthur would go and dance for pints. Not that the locals left much by the time he had finished jigging! (The drinking habits of the time could make an article of their own).

men. In those days the Whitmonday tour started very early at Weald Farm and by the time that they had worked their way past all the cider and homemade wine at the cottages (long since demolished) on Weald Lane to the Elephant and Castle at the beginning of Bampton, the fiddler was the only one non-dancer able to stay sober. (There were some years in which the fiddler was unable to complete the day and others in which the dancing stopped because the men started fighting, having collided with each other in the dances!). In 1897 Mr. Butler walked around a corner, caught the neck of his fiddle behind a drain-pipe, broke his fiddle and walked away saying "Thank God!" He never played for the morris again, already being in dispute with the team over sharing certain monies given for the fiddler. At this catastrophe Jinky ran all the way home and back again for his home made fiddle to keep the day going and thus started his 60 years reign as maestro of Bampton.

Mr. Dixey was also present when Cecil Sharp came over one September by special arrangement to have the side dance for him in the Malt House where they usually practised. Dixey cycled over from Oxford where he was working as a diver's assistant for the Thames Conservancy Board recovering objects lost in the river. Afterwards Cecil Sharp brought them drinks at the Talbot Hotel, the only inn suitable for what by then was a national figure, but the men had to drink in the harness room as tradespeople, let alone labourers, were not encouraged to use the bars! On the way back to Oxford Mr. Dixey was dazzled by the headlights of vehicles leaving St. Giles Fair and he rode into a deep ditch.

In 1912 Arthur was the first of the Bampton men, picked out because of the standard of his dancing, to be invited by Mary Neal to come up to London to teach the dances to the Esperance Club. He had

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always been considered within the village and by visitors to be the best dancer of his generation, a reputation of which he was very proud. He later came up with the team to dance at the Globe Theatre, of which occasion Rev. George Chambers, then curate at Thaxted, said, "they were all drunk, but it was wonderful morris." Soon afterwards Mr. Dixey emigrated to Canada and from there fought with a Canadian regiment in World War I. He returned to Bampton following the war after his first wife died and he married again, this time into the Wells family. But he never danced again.

Mr. Dixey was a typical hard-working, ambitious Cotswoldsman. As a youth he worked on the new locks and river improvements on the neighbouring stretch of the Thames while renting a field in which he grew beans and other vegetables. Like many men in the area he had a spell in the South Wales coalfields where Englishmen were welcomed as hardworking and sober and a man could earn as much in a double shift as a carter could in a week at Bampton.



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

Watching are Roy Shergold in Naval uniform and George Dafter (fool). Roy Shergold, in naval uniform, had come home on leave that very morning and was pressed into dancing before the morning was out because one of the dancers had already consumed too much alcohol.

MO87C6 - Morris dancing at Little Place in 1946. Ted Dixey is in the centre of the picture nearest the camera (both hankies up) and Jingy Wells is on fiddle (William Nathan Wells).

Arthur Dixey & children - This is Arthur Dixey and his children. Arthur was a Morris dancer at least as early as 1898 and his son Ted became a dancer too. Left to right the children are :- Laurence, Perce, Derek, father Arthur, Ted and Ruth.

Thomas took this picture in 1897 but it was not Thomas Carter's first visit to Bampton, he had previously been in Bampton in 1894.
