

BAMPTON WAR MEMORIAL.

DEDICATION SERVICE.

Simplicity was the keynote of this ceremony, but it's very simplicity had the effect of emphasizing it's impressiveness. Nothing had been rehearsed, yet everything passed off as evenly as though much careful preparation had been bestowed. Glorious sunshine, fine monument in it's splendid position, the hearty service and the earnest words of the speakers, all these together will long remain in the memory of those present, who must have numbered considerably over 1000, At about 2 o'clock the ringers commenced a muffled peal, which was rung at intervals before the service and continued for some time afterwards. Some 20 minutes previous to the ceremony people began to assemble, then came the school children, who were soon followed by the children from the Training School at Aston, and these were formed up together on the raised ground behind the Monument. Punctually at 3 o'clock the Vicar, the members of the Committee, and the two speakers took up their positions at the base of the Memorial. The service was impressively read by the Vicar. Just before the end the stone containing the names of the fallen was unveiled by Major the Hon.E.Forester. who in a few well chosen words expressed the great honour he felt in being asked to perform the act. Then followed the Last Post, splendidly rendered by two buglers of the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry, who, through the courtesy of the Officer in charge of the Depot, Cowley Barracks, were detailed to sound this beautiful of all the bugle calls of the British Army. After the service short addresses were given by Col; Hamersley and Col. Rhys Williams. M.P., the gist of whose remarks was a testimony to the splendid devotion to duty shown by those to whom the memorial is dedicated, and a conviction that their example would be followed should the Country ever again stand in need of sacrifice. Many wreaths were placed at the foot of the monument by relatives and friends of the fallen. The flag on the Town Hall was at half-mast during the day. The memorial is octagonal, cut from durable white stone, and is 17½ ft in height. It was erected by M/s Knolleys of Oxford. On the cap, facing east, is the figure of St George, in the front of the memorial bears the following inscription- " To the Glory of God and in Memory of Bampton Men who died for their Country in the Great War 1914 - 1918. On the other seven faces are 48 names-





Dear Mr Ackerman,

I have been in correspondence with your colleague, Mr C A Maxon, Town Clerk of Witney, about war memorials, and he lets me that you have kindly offered to let me know what documents etc you may have about Bampton memorial.

I am researching into the designing and building of Chester City war memorial (1920-22). This was designed by Thomas Rayson, who also designed the Witney memorial. Rayson commissioned Alex Miller, of Chipping Campden, to do the sculpture work on the Chester memorial and he also got MRV to do the sculpture work for him elsewhere. I know that your Bampton memorial has carvings done by Miller, including a St George and the

dragon, which also appears on his Chester
memorial. It would be very interesting to
compare the two and if you can give me
any help with details of the Bampton
carving etc I shall be most grateful.
I also wonder who designed the Bampton
memorial? Rayson does not claim it
as one of his, in lists he produced, but
I believe that he did design others,
apart from his acknowledged designs at
Oxford, Chester, Witney, Woodstock, Cogges
and Stanton St John.

If your archives have anything
to throw light on the instruction to
the architect and sculptor, date of
work etc I should greatly appreciate
knowing of it and I shall be grateful
for any help you may be able to give

Mrs Sarah Wearne of Bampton has very kindly agreed that her account of the history of the Bampton War Memorial published in Vol 3. No 1 of the Bampton Beam in April 1988 may be reproduced here.

Our War Memorial; a brief history.
That we may live in freedom.

Seventy years ago this November at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, the First World War came to an end. During the 4 years of the war over 266 men from Bampton served in the army and 50 men were killed.. From William Wheeler, the first man in Bampton to die, who was killed on September 14th 1914, within 6 weeks of the outbreak of war to Arthur George Martin who died of pneumonia whilst on active service within 8 days of the end of the war.

The first men killed-William Wheeler, Thomas Wells and Sidney Clark- were professional soldiers. They were all members of the British Expeditionary Force, who left for France immediately after the declaration of war on 4th August 1914. Sidney Clark was wounded in France and brought back to a military hospital in Birmingham, where he died on 28th May 1915. His body was returned to his parent's cottage at Fisher's Bridge, and he was buried with full military honours in Bampton on 2nd June. The funeral cortege headed by 12 soldiers with reversed rifles followed the flag draped coffin to the church. Every house on the route had its blinds drawn, all the flags in the town were flown at half mast. The church itself was crowded with people from all walks of life, from his wounded comrades at the Clanfield Red Cross Hospital to F.D.Hunt, the owner of Bampton Manor. Sidney Clark's grave, with it's military headstone , can be seen in the burial ground.

Volunteers.

But the war did not only involve the regular army. From the outbreak of war until conscription was introduced in January 1916, there was a constant demand for volunteers. The recruiting sergeant made frequent trips to the town and by January 1915, Bampton had produced 100 recruits. Men like Daniel Skinner, a journeyman baker living in Bridge Street who was killed in September 1917.

Isaac Widdows, a dealer living in Sandfords with his wife and baby daughter, was killed on Saint George's Day in 1917. Isaac's brother-in-law, Thomas Gillett, was killed the following year on 1st August.

The war produced many double tragedies for Bampton families. George and Hugo Jackson were both sons of the Rev. J.Jackson, Vicar of Lew who lived at what is now Churchgate House. They were both killed on the same day, 28th April 1917, in the same place, at Arleux, near Vimy, in France. Hugo Jackson had been married by special licence in Bampton Church only a year earlier on March 20th, 1916, to a Canadian girl, Emma Pawlett. George and William Poole, another set of brothers were also killed on the same day, September 25th 1915. Thomas and John Wells, James and Charles Cripps whose father, George, was a blacksmith, and Walter and Alfred Lay were more brothers killed in the war. By a strange coincidence 3 boys had been baptised in the Church one Sunday in 1889, 25th August- George Poole, Sidney Clark and William Smith, and all 3 of them lost their lives in the war.

Whilst most of the men from Bampton were killed in France, some fought and died in other theatres of war. William Morton served in the Royal Navy and went down with Lord Kitchener on HMS Hampshire on 5th June 1916 , during the Battle of Jutland. Half a world away Robert Nesbit whose parents lived at Lower Haddon Farm, was killed

at Basra in Mesopotamia. His body was never found and his name is recorded on the Memorial to the Missing at Port Tewfik on the Suez Canal. J.H.Early died of wounds in German East Africa in February 1916.

These young men all had their lives before them but were killed in the performance of their duty. In the words of the Scroll of Commemoration presented to the next of kin of all those who died whilst on active service, they "left all that was dear to them, endured hardness, faced danger and finally passed out of the sight of men by the path of duty and self sacrifice, giving up their own lives that others might live in freedom. Let those who come after see to it that his name be not forgotten."

We are "those who come after" and it was in order that we should not forget the human cost of war, as well as the honour of those who died, that the war memorial in the Market Square was built. It cost £350, which would be over £8,000- today and the money was raised by the people of Bampton. After the second World War 7 more names were added to the memorial. Once again local men had been called upon to give their lives for their country. Many of these men from both wars have families and friends still in Bampton to whom their memory is still very precious.

DETAILS OF WAR GRAVES IN BAMPTON CEMETERY.

The War Graves Commission's records show that there are six war graves in Bampton. 4 of these are with standard head stones and two are in family plots.

G.10624. Pte. S. Clark Royal Fusiliers, 28.5.1915 age 25 years.
Ord Seaman. A.G.Martin H.M.S. ' Pembroke ' 3.11.1918

M. 205395. George Frederick Bayliss. R.A.S.C. 25.3.1918. age 38 years
Not a Bampton man but married a girl from Bampton.

The above three graves are together on the far side of the cemetery.

149 Gnr, R.Lay, Royal Garrison Artillery. 13.9.1918. age 34 years.
This grave with standard head stone is by a dead tree in the middle of the cemetery.

There are two more graves of men killed and buried in their family plots.

Lt. John Sholto Douglas, 50th Canadians wounded Amiens and died 30.11.1918 aged 23.

He lies in his grandfather's double grave, Charles Irvine Douglas Douglas' parents lived in Brandon, Manitoba. Two dis-similar crosses on the same plot about $5\frac{1}{2}$ ft high, in the S.E. corner besides a tall cupressus tree.

Harold Edward Busby. P/O. R.A.F.V.R. died 7.11.1942 34 years.

He lies in the family plot, a double grave with two similar head stones about 3 ft high in N.E. corner.
