EMMA CARRUTHERS reports

Do you think that the British athletes should go to the Moscow Olympics ? We sent a survey around Bampton to see what people's opinions were. Forty four people were approached. The result was very interesting as sixteen out of seventeen under twenty-fives thought that they should go whereas fifteen out of nineteen under fifties thought that they should not go. The people over fifty were equally divided, four opposed and four for them going.

Twice as many people thought that the teams should be allowed to make their own decision to go or not as those who thought the government should decide for them.

Three quarters of the people think that the government should give finatial help to the athletes. Forty think the government should not take away their passports to stop the players going while only four think they should. The idea of moving the games to another place seems to be a good solution in the view of the majority.

If the games were boycotted only seven people think it would cause Russia to withdraw her troops from Afghanistan, though fifteen think it would stop her invading any other country.

The survey shows if nothing else that the older members of the community think more of the political aspect opposed to the sporting one, whereas the younger members of the cummunity think more of the sporting

In this survey seventeen were under twenty-five years, nineteen were under fifty, while eight were over fifty.

I also thought the masks from Queens Dyke school were very striking and they draw the eye the moment you enter the room.





This first graph is on how much television people watch. Girls up to the age of 16 watch comparatively less television, but in the middle age bracket, (20-65) the women seem to watch more. This can be accounted for by the fact that the men are usually out at work and the housewives watch "Pebble Mill at One", and so on at lunch time. The lines meet up at the retirement age when they are both at home and watch together and also when they reach the age of about 65 the amount of television watched shoots up. This is because thay do not have much else to do generally.

In the second graph the first age bracket (0-13) only has two columns. This is because young people tend to only prefer funny programmes as well as their children's viewing.




Eggs are of importance in the diet because they contain two important vitamins A and D . An egg also contains calcium which is needed for strong bone and iron in blood.

Eggs should at all times be stored at

a cool temperature of about 50F to 55F. If stored at a high temperature the water will evaporate and carbon dioxde will escape through the shell and the air space at the rounded end of the egg enlarges.

Eggs are needed in creaming cake mixtur -es as they hold air and support thus giving a light cake . Eggs are needed to thicken sauces and custards by means of coagulation . Eggs bind foods together eg Meat Loaf.



OR HOW THE BODY FIGHTS INFECTIONS by Martin Landray

When a germ finds its way into the body through a break in the skin a series of defensive systems are used.

First plasma leaks into the tissue letting the proteins out. These proteins attach themselves to the germ making the germ non-toxic. The plasma causes a distinctive swelling. This swelling is(i) hot (ii) red (iii) painfull. This is due to bigger blood vessels and the swelling. After a while white blood cells wrap themselves around the germa and devour it. The white blood cells break down the germ and use it to reinforce themselves. The proteins are keapt so that that particular type of germ can not be had

eg Chickenpox is rarely had twice.

The plasma leaks continually at the site of the infection. It is continually being drained away by a series of tubes called the Lymphatic System. These tubes take the plasma to the # 81 nearest Lymph Gland. Here is a fort = 5 ress of white cells. These cells devour any germs but let the plasma through. The plasma passes through one gland only.. It then goes to a centralltube. The tube takes the plasma to a big blood vessel in the nekk. This blood vessel is a vein and takes the plasma to the heart where the plasma mixes with the blood.







JUMPED ONTO THE SHIP




Child's View of Flying








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
POTTERY

Clay is dug up from the earth and it has been used for thousands of years to make pots and bowls and lots of other things. In the Olden days they made coil pots and after smoothing down the coils they left it to dry. Then they made a bonfire and put the pots on top. After it was burned they got them off and they were done.

Today most of the pottery is made in Stoke-on-Trent because most of the clay is found there. Different types of pottery are made earthenware and bone china.

When they make pots today first they weigh the clay and roll it into a ball then they shape the clay on a wheel, this is called throwing the clay. Next they let it dry just a little bit and turn the pot upside down and shape the foot. After this they let it dry completely and then sponge it to smooth any rough edges. Then they put it into a kiln which is very hot and bakes the clay like biscuits after this has cooled the pots are dipped in glaze and put back into the kiln and fired to a very high temperature after they have cooled again the pots are ready.

CLARINET

In the clarinet family there are three types of clarinet. The B clarinet, the most popular, the E clarinet and the Bass. The Bass clarinet is pitched much lower than the others. Another type which is very rarely heard is the Basset horn which is a variety of Temor Clarinet. The clarinet was origonally made of wood but now they can be made of ebonite which most people prefer as when a wood instrument gets too cold or too hot it is difficult to produce a good sound. In the clarinet family the vibration, which produces the sound is that of a single reed (a piece of reed cut to shape) as no improvement on the natural product has yet been invented. The single reed is placed against the mouthpiece and by blowing you can produce the smooth liquid tone of the

The clarinet is a good instrument to take up if you have played the recorder previously. Once you have accomplished how to make the sound previous recorder players will find that the fingering is easier to do. Even if you have not played any instrument before the clarinet is very nice to play.
