## Bampton Library

### The glass is half full – and filling!



The good news is Bampton Library will not close! This time last year the future looked bleak as Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) planned to withdraw all funding from it along with 20 others. But with the support of 'Save Oxfordshire Libraries', Bampton Parish Council and hundreds of local people it is a happier story.

However, OCC has designated Bampton Library, and nearly all its other small rural libraries, as 'Community Libraries'. This means they will not be funding them to the same extent as before. They will continue to pay the rent, and all associated building costs such as heating and lighting, and they will continue to provide and restock the books and DVD's and also maintain the computer equipment, but within 3 years they will only pay half the staffing costs.

Unfortunately OCC believe (although they have undertaken no trials to test this) that volunteers will be able (and willing) to cover 50% of our Library Manager's job, and also provide the necessary administration to make the system work.

We do not believe that such a volunteer scheme can work, especially as the job description that applicants would need to fulfil includes having good computer skills and being police checked. Although we know how much volunteering goes on in Bampton, there is a limit and it appears from the requests in the Beam that we are almost at, or even beyond, that limit.

But apart from the difficulty of finding people we did not think it would be a good move to downgrade our professional library in this way. How could a changing band of volunteers provide the continuity and level of professional service that Loraine Hall and her relief assistant, Claire Rednal provide?

If we lost this level of professionalism those library users able to vote with their petrol would quickly go to Carterton or Witney, leaving Bampton Library in a very risky position for those that do not have this choice – and we certainly do not want the risk of immediate closure to be replaced by slow decline.

At present Bampton Library is very healthy. Since Loraine became Library Manager the figures just keep rising. Official OCC figures for the quarter form last June to September show a 60% rise for Children's loans and nearly 30% rise for Adult loans. And these figures were rising well before we began our campaign. And they are even more remarkable as they buck the County trend - across Oxfordshire library usage declined in all areas by at least 2% last year.

So where does this leave us? Given the importance of the library for the village it seems the only answer is to raise the funds to pay for the missing staffing and associated costs. And we are pleased that many, including the Parish Council agree with this proposed strategy.

The way the cuts are to be introduced will help. They will come in over three financial years. In April, when the scheme will be introduced, we will need to raise  $\pounds 2,904$  for this financial year. For 2013-2014 the cost will increase to  $\pounds 5,808$ , before reaching the full annual cost of  $\pounds 8,713$  in 2014-2015. This figure will then need to be found each year.

This is a significant undertaking but we have already had offers of help from the Parish Council, and 'The Community Shop'.

### **Bampton Library**

There could be no charge for book loans but we are hoping that some individuals will be prepared to commit to providing a certain amount of money each year for this very good cause – and we should not forget how Bampton got the library building in the first place – Robert Vaizey left it in his will for the village 375 years ago!

Times are hard and we realise OCC had to save money but we are sad that they were not prepared to cut their very excessive central library costs rather than cutting the front-line services. We still do not understand, and have never received any explanation, why such costs amount to £1.58 in Staffordshire and £8.65 in Oxfordshire. But now our energy must go from the fight to the library itself. We need to show OCC that they have chosen the wrong village if they think they are going to close our library by stealth. We believe there is an opportunity to build on the support that this campaign has produced to really make a true 'Village' library in the very best sense. But help is needed! We are not asking people to volunteer to replace our library staff but Loraine and Claire hope you will join with them to provide an even more interesting library service tailored to the needs of the village. Given help, they are planning to hold an open event about once a month starting on National Libraries Day in February. We felt this was a very good time to start something new considering it is the anniversary of our highly successful 'Read In', when Bampton really said 'no' to closure. So watch out for posters around the village for other future events.

#### How can you help?

Use the library, and encourage others to join and then use the library, especially those new to the village. Join a team of people to help with occasional activities or events at the library. We are christening this team the 'Bampton Library Events Special Team' or BLEST! We promise you will not have to do library duty or grapple with the library computer system, but maybe get involved with things, like 'sticking and pasting', making a cake or serving a cup of tea. All good fun! So this is the official goodbye to 'BLAG' (Bampton Library Action Group) with many thanks to all those who joined with us in the fight - we could not have done it without you - and it is welcome to a 'BLEST' future!

#### Parliament involved at last

The good news is the announcement by the Government DCMS (Department for Culture, Media and Sport) Select Committee to hold (at last) an enquiry into library closures. This is a cross-party committee chaired by Conservative MP John Whittingdale, who will have the power to call ministers Jeremy Hunt and Ed Vaizey to give evidence as well as local authorities and library campaigners.

The terms are wide ranging as the committee is inviting written submissions and requesting views on the following areas:

- what constitutes a comprehensive and efficient library service for the 21st century
- the extent to which planned library closures are compatible with the Public Libraries & Museums Act 1964
- the impact library closures will have on local communities

the effectiveness of the secretary of state's powers of intervention under the 1964 Act.

#### **Commons Library Report**

'Save Oxfordshire Libraries' (SOL) have discovered a 2011 House of Commons Library Report. (link below) This examines the background to Library closures and draws together reports, articles and questions on the subject. For example, it was good to see that Ed Vaizey replied to a fellow MP in Parliament by saying:

"The Government are committed champions of public libraries and their value, not just in encouraging reading, but as the hub of local communities. They are the places which can be used by anyone in order to learn, read, access information or get online.

The Government continue to drive the improvement and development of public library services through the Future Libraries Programme...... will support over 30 authorities participating in the programme to \_\_\_\_\_\_

explore options that will help them to deliver the front line services communities want and need more efficiently"

The Minister's emphasis on the importance of libraries as community hubs is encouraging, however, you will remember that it was with this 'Future Libraries' programme that this whole saga started almost a year ago, as:

#### Oxfordshire with Kent: a project to develop a new long term model for library services provided in rural counties"

Unfortunately, from OCC's proposals we now know what this 'new long term model' is, and it certainly does not fit with Ed Vaizey's wider aim to 'deliver front line services communities want and need more efficiently'.

OCC's aim has been to support their massive central library costs (over 50 officers) and force people in rural communities to work unpaid if they want to retain their library - that is if they can meet the skills criteria laid down by OCC in the job description.

So not only is 'Future Libraries - OCC style' selling us down the river, but it is being done under Councillor Judith Heathcoat, who is the OCC Cabinet member for 'Safer and Stronger Communities'. Is there is a 'Yes Minister' script just waiting to be written?

OCC argue they are proposing to cut both back-office and front-line services, but they are only reducing their (already huge) central library costs by 16% whilst cutting front-line staffing in rural areas by either 33% or 66% - indeed they are even taking on another back-room officer to oversee the cuts.

You may be wondering what is happening to the libraries in Kent, OCC's partner in Future Libraries? Well, Kent CC have withdrawn from the whole Future Libraries programme and gone back to talking to their constituents. If they can do it why not OCC?

## Picturing life in West Oxfordshire

Budding photographers are being urged to take a snapshot of life in West Oxfordshire as part of a photography competition. The competition, run by the District Council's Tourism team, is hoping to attract portraits that capture life in West Oxford-shire.

This could cover a variety of themes, from wildlife to market towns, the panoramic views in the Cotswolds to a snapshot of the bustling Witney town centre.

The winning contestant will receive a beautiful canvas print of the successful image mounted onto a 30 x 20 inch art canvas (created by Blueprint Imaging Limited) and could be used in West Oxfordshire District Council's tourism publications promoting the District to tourists and visitors worldwide.

Cllr Richard Langridge, Cabinet Member for Communities, said: "Tourists who visit the area not only enjoy the stunning views and backdrop but also comment on the welcome they get from the locals.

"We are interested in what aspects of local life residents see as captivating, as it can only be beneficial in encouraging tourists to visit.

Last year the competition attracted over 117 entries and the winning entry was from Peter Young of Long Hanborough. His picture of the lake and grand bridge at Blenheim featured in the 2012 Oxfordshire Cotswolds Visitor Guide. Peter said: "I was unusually drawn to visit Blenheim on this particular day. I was taken by the brilliance of the light, and the clarity and perfection of the autumn colours.

"Walking around the lake the picture literally framed itself. I only use a simple point-and-shoot camera, and as anyone in the family will tell you, most pictures are taken on family holidays. So as you can imagine, this was rather special." Last year's winning entry



It carries out surveys in the area to asses what troubles people the most and then proceeds to do something about it. The group consists of delegated Councillors from all the local Parish Councils, (Bampton's being Dale Turner and Lee Mackie) representatives of the Youth Groups, Police and Fire Services, with West Oxfordshire Council and Safety Officers advising and assisting when necessary.


At the moment it appears that the three main concerns of the populace are Speeding Vehicles and its associated behaviour, Lighting and 'Perceived gangs of youths'. What has been done about it? Well with pressure from your local NAG group the police have been carrying out speed checks in the area and reporting back to the councils on what percentage of motorists are exceeding the limits. The offenders have been reported to the authorities. The Fire Service has been involving the local schools in being aware of the dangers on the roads. Regarding lighting the NAG group has been prodding the Council to sort it.

As for the Youth problems, it seems that Carterton Council are getting their problem sorted with the help of the RAF at Brize Norton, as many of the youngsters are from military families. With regard to Bampton's youth facilities, they are still non existent and at the moment there is little hope for them. What services are available would put over £5000.00 on to the rates. Theoretical solutions being banded about are; providing transport to either the Witney or Carterton facilities. Unless young-ster's attitudes have altered since my days, there is no way on earth that this will work. There was always a 'territorial' situation where any intruders (unless they were good at football or similar) were unwelcome!

I feel that the youngsters who can organise themselves to go to other outlying clubs do not need as much help as those who lack the confidence to be so adventurous, whereas, given local facilities they could just 'drift' in and gradually it would start to give them a purpose in life. I am aware that our local council are still considering what they can do, as they have an area reserved for a Youth Club facility within the Boxing Club area at the Old School Community Centre. What is needed is a group of young parents who are enthusiastic about the youth of Bampton to come along and give them the proverbial 'kick up the backside' to get things moving. Then together I am sure that something could be achieved. It is no good everybody sitting back waiting for something to happen. You have to make it happen.

As you know Carterton Lions incorporate Bampton in their area of care and they were very sad when their local representative, Nurse Alison Williams, moved away. Working in the Bampton area she was able to offer help whenever and wherever it was needed. So I am now the local link and have been asked to let the Lions know if anyone in Bampton is in need of help. Already the Lions have helped many people locally with the purchasing of medical aids and supporting local causes etc. If the Lions cannot help directly then through their 'networking' they will find a way around the problem. Rest assured you can contact me in strictest confidence if you or someone that you know needs help. We are very lucky in Bampton with so many organisations that offer help for those who really need it.





This well known Bampton couple held several very successful exhibitions here in the 1980s and 90s and they are now looking forward to this new show of their most recent work, especially as the gallery now has a lift installed to make life easier for everyone. Ann came to live in Bampton in the late 1960s and by the early 1970s had become a founder member of the Bampton Arts Association, a group of volunteers dedicated to the promotion of the arts; drama, literature, music, photography and fine art (drawing, painting, sculpture) in and around West Oxfordshire. It was the forerunner of what is now West Ox Arts.



Ann helped to organise many events, including painting courses, held in the upstairs room of the Town Hall, now the WOA gallery. It was on a weeklong course in 1980 that Ann met Dennis. They married and have been painting together ever since.



They are both proficient watercolourists. Wherever possible they spend their holidays painting en plein air, (that is painting outside on location). Their watercolours depict the places they love, namely the Lake District, the Cotswolds, Venice, Greece and the Lot and Dordogne valleys in France where they travelled last year. Ann and Dennis spend every morning working together in their studio at home in Bampton, completing the paintings begun on holiday. They are devoted to each other. Ann and Dennis, although both OAPs (Dennis is only 94!), are still very active and producing a great deal of work, as you will see at the exhibition. They have exhibited in shows in London including exhibitions at the Royal Watercolour Society, the Mall Galleries and the "Venice in Peril" Exhibition. 
### Spajers News


#### **Summer Outing**



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


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### **Bampton Archery Club**

The Bampton Archery club has now been in existence for over 16 years; it was one of the better kept secrets for a while but the club has been busy raising its profile. You may have seen some of us at the Donkey Derby, where we were invited by the Spajers to run a "Have a Go" session. We now have 30 senior members and thriving junior membership, currently 16 between the ages of 10 and 18.



Like most of the sports clubs of the village, Bampton Archery Club has been very fortunate in having had a grant from the Charity Shop. We used this to update our beginners' equipment, buying much needed new bows, sights, arrows and associated items. A man has been sentenced and ordered to pay £2,190 for carrying waste away without a licence and for fly-tipping it in a West Oxfordshire bridleway.

Tomasz Medrek, age 36 of Tudor Walk, Swindon, pleaded guilty at Banbury Magistrates Court on Friday 25 November to dumping a large quantity of rubbish in a bridleway off the A361, between Burford and Filkins. He had also been paid as **a** waste carrier to remove the rubbish, but was not licensed to carry out this work.

The rubbish, dumped in June 2011, included a large quantity of builders' waste from a house renovation in the village of Windrush, Gloucestershire.

Environmental Enforcement Officers working for West Oxfordshire District Council traced the rubbish back to the address in Windrush village and enquiries showed that Mr Medrek had removed all the rubbish from the site.

When interviewed, Mr Medrek admitted to both dumping the rubbish in the bridleway and not being registered with the Environment Agency as an authorised Waste Carrier.

Banbury Magistrates Court fined Mr Medrek £800 for fly tipping and a further £800 for the unauthorised carrying of waste. He was also ordered to pay £575 costs and a £15 victim's surcharge, making a total of  $\pounds 2190$ .

Cllr David Harvey, Cabinet Member for Environment, said: "This case is a reminder that only registered waste carriers can remove waste and anyone doing this illegally will be fined. Fly-tipping is also illegal, irresponsible and costly to the council. It is something we take very seriously in West Oxfordshire and we have successfully tracked down and prosecuted a number of offenders."

Every reported case of fly-tipping is investigated and this includes the use of covert surveillance at fly-tipping 'hot spots' in the district, as well as close working with Thames Valley Police, Trading Standards and the Environment Agency.

Since 2006/7 fly-tipping has reduced by more than 22%.

Anyone caught fly-tipping faces prosecution and could receive a fine up to £50,000 or maximum imprisonment of five years.

Anyone using a waste removal company should always check that they have a waste carrier licence number and this can be done by contacting the Environment Agency on 08708 506 506.

Last year alone, the Council cleared up 573 fly-tips in West Oxfordshire at a cost of  $\pounds$ 27,000.

An oil drilling team in Alaska take a flight home which then, dramatically, crash-lands in the frozen, windswept back-of-beyond. Could it get any worse for the eight survivors? I'm afraid it does - since a pack of local wolves are soon keen to reduce that number to zero. On the upside, an experienced wolf hunter (Liam Neeson), is among the survivors and he takes it upon himself to lead them a safe distance from the wolves' den, (but does he know where it is....?) This is not quite 'Horror', but intense, authentic, very human and at times harrowing - an Action Drama that had me gripped from start to finish. To counter the often torrid action, an ultimately moving backstory underpins Neeson's character, involving a wife that left him - and a poem. Beyond that, I would simply urge all but the faint-hearted to go and rent it. A fabulous, powerful film ...





### **BAMPTON ZIMBABWE PROJECT**

A big thank you to all who came to listen to Tom Benyon of Zane at St Mary's Church on December 4<sup>th</sup>. As predicted he was enthusiastic, erudite and very amusing, as well as extremely graphic about the appalling situation in Zimbabwe for both black and white communities. He is deeply grateful for all the help that comes from Bampton, and understood the cynicism that people have regarding the loss of carefully collected money going to line the wrong pockets, through corruption, but was at great pains to underline the fact that this has never happened with Zane. The money is transferred electronically from Britain to their Harare money changers who convert it into American dollars. Zane then distribute the money where needed in brown envelopes, as the banks are corrupt, and to date this has been £9,000,000 worth! Cathy Buckle, niece of the B.Z.P.s' treasurer, lives there and sends weekly newsletters to us, highlighting the horror that living in Zimbabwe is. Tom told a story from Cathy about an ex school teacher, whose pension has disappeared because of inflation, widow of a war veteran, whom she was visiting. The lady was very morose, and monosyllabic and clearly ill. Cathy eventually gave her 20\$ to help, and the lady finally admitted that her worry was that she had no underwear in which to visit the doctor. There is no aid for whites in Zimbabwe, and those left there are aged, poverty stricken, and mal nourished. They are exceptionally proud and never complain, but they have lost everything. How would they live without Zane's aid?

He was full of admiration for the 34 Zane staff, mostly women who work in black and white areas and with the old, and pointed out that where others are beaten, it does not happen to Zane staff. In the Harare slums there is huge deprivation and destitution. The Zane workers help with hygiene, education, clean water and micro-finance. There is also a club foot programme; Chris Hardy, a surgeon, goes to teach how to correct club foot, which can change a child's life. Tom pointed out that Mugabe is 86, and has prostate cancer, and that even when he goes, there is no reason to believe that anything will change. Clearly our help will be needed in the future, and the legendary generosity of the people of Bampton will continue to be essential.


A few weeks later I attended that audition. We'd been told that each audi-

I did this part of the course with that lucky egg balanced on a spoon.

To my amazement I made it until the end of the day and a few weeks later I was told I was going to Argentina to be on the show. I was over the moon. There was only one problem; I am terrified of flying.

Armed with a wacky costume, my lucky egg and a lot of valium I went to Heathrow to finally film Total Wipeout. This series was Winter Themed so it was called Winter Wipeout by the time it made it to TV but that didn't matter to me and the other amazing 19 contestants I met on the way – we were going to tackle the big red balls!



After a long journey we finally made it to the course and to say everyone was excited was an understatement. We spent the first morning filming interviews and 'stupid stuff'. If the production team told you to it you did it no matter how stupid it made you look. In my case, I cracked an egg on my forehead which later made it to national TV. After a long and very hot morning of filming we got to the part we were all waiting for; the qualifier.

## WINTER WIPEOUT—THE WELSH WAY

We were given a safety briefing but we weren't allowed a trial run. What you see on TV is the one and only run we do. There's no practicing! We aren't even allowed to watch each other. A random order is assigned and you are held in a tent until it is your turn. After your turn you wait in a different tent until everyone has been and you are told the result.

I went 13<sup>th</sup> (unlucky for some!) and was so nervous by the time I got to the start. They told us to just run at everything hard and we'd get through. They were right. After face-planting a lot of the obstacles I made it to the end in a time of 2minutes 30 which was 8<sup>th</sup> overall (this episode had the quickest times of all the episodes!) but that was good enough, I was in the next round.

Round two was the ski lift -a tall rotating podium which you have to hang on to until big red beams and fake snow make you fall off. The boys were all quietly confident they were going to beat the girls which I guess is fair enough given it involved a lot of upper body strength.



It was pretty high up and I really didn't like it. The podiums wobbled and I didn't feel particularly safe despite the helmet and body protector. I did not want to fall. People since have asked me how I stayed on and all I can say is pure determination, I didn't want to fall off because I was scared.

Miraculously, I made it into the top five. By now I had gained a lot of respect from the crew, the rest of the contestants and anyone else to see it. Nobody had expected me to get anywhere near as far as the third round given the crying blithering wreck I was at the thought of the plane. But in the third round I was and this was my round. They spun you round and you have to do the course as quickly as possible as the last person to the end is knocked out of the competition. The first time we did this I didn't even get wet and was so proud of myself. Then we had to go again. I suddenly felt the pressure to do well being the only girl left in the competition so when I crossed the line and got the biggest cheer from the crowd it was a wonderful feeling. I was going to be the only girl in the final.

Except then they showed me the final. The first obstacle was the flingy-majig – a large chair that flings the contestant into the air and they then land in the water. I was so scared I was crying (again!) but again sheer determination got me through. After all there was still  $\pounds 10,000$  on offer to me.

Unfortunately, after a lot of effort, tears, adrenaline and excitement I came third but it was an experience I would never ever give up and I would repeat in an instant. I have never had such an enjoyable time and I have met a fantastic group of friends. Since filming the show I have kept in close contact with so many of the other contestants and have made friends for life.

Coming third was a fantastic achievement for anyone but I am more proud of getting on a plane for the first time in years (albeit with the aid of pills) but for anyone scared of flying, if I can do it, so can you. This was an experience of a life time even if watching it back on TV was very surreal. If anyone gets the opportunity to take part in such a fantastic show I would tell you to do it instantly. But more importantly, if you are scared of something, face it. I did many times in the short 6 days we were away and it has made me a stronger, more positive person and in return for facing my fears I have some amazing new friends.

Our next scheduled talk will be at our AGM on Friday 2 March 2012 when the appropriately named Dr Larkman's subject will be "birds". Meetings are held in the Village Hall starting at 8:00pm. All are welcome, with attendance free for members,  $\pounds 2$  for non-members (or join at the door).

WODC's Core Strategy for the Local Development Framework is being finalised and is expected to be published for public consultation in the first half of 2012. (Go to WODC's website at www.westoxon.gov.uk/planning/ LDF.cfm for details.) We submitted consultation comments to OCC in October supporting the final published draft Core Strategy for Mineral Extraction and Waste Management.

This plan precludes the four sites in the Clanfield/Bampton area, previously put forward by land owners and gravel extraction companies. OCC aim to report on this to the Council's Cabinet on 13 March.

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


# An Aussie Adventure - Bampton


Explaining to anyone that has not been as lucky as I to be in some small way, if only for a brief amount of time a part of

the community in Bampton why I choose to spend my free time in this part of the world is not easily done, the question I constantly had to answer was "Why would you leave Australia to come here?" I never could give a definitive answer, I just told people I was on a world tour. After spending nearly 3 years dragging my suitcase around the planet with no direction or real plan as to what I was doing with life, I managed to find myself in West Oxfordshire - no friends, nowhere to live; no idea why I came here, all that was important to me was crammed into a suitcase weighing exactly 32Kgs. I had a job in Standlake and a hope that England was a far better place than how the country was portrayed back in Australia. After moving from Guangzhou, a place I called home for the best part of 2.5 years with a population in excess of 15 million people into a town with a population of not very many raises a few problems for someone who has never lived in a small community before: The biggest being losing any anonymity that I previously had, and making the adjustment to my life that embraced my new found inability to blend in with the crowd. Being an overly excited and loud Australian could potentially be one as well.



I am of the firm belief that the people make the place, and this is the basis of my love affair with Bampton. Having been an expat in numerous countries and cities since leaving Australia in March 2008, I know all too well that establishing yourself with a good network of friends that can

help you to become involved in the community in which you live is the number one priority. The people I met in Bampton gave me exactly what I wanted in a place I could easily call home; being able to walk down the street and greet people using their name, the friendly wave you give and receive from people as you drive or walk the roads surrounding



town. These are two examples of the many simple things that may seem insignificant and just part of everyday life to locals is a welcome change to a foreigner such as myself that comes from a concrete jungle with no warmth to it.

Life in Dubai couldn't be any more different, people live their lives as if they are the only person here, just a few days back I met my neighbour after 4 months of living here, and even then she wasn't interested in talking to me. I tried to engage her, make small talk; she was having none of it. The most I will get out of my neighbours is muffled thanks for holding the elevator door open for them, and then the elevator trip is spent with them staring at the floor in their best attempt to not make eye contact with any of the other passengers on the elevator – Very strange. The security guard for the building I live in talks to me, but I struggle to understand his accent, and I am pretty sure he struggles with mine, so the conversations we have usually involve him talking about cricket, and me talking about the weather.

Dubai is a city that has no soul, and unfortunately most of the people I have met so far are the same! Unlike the people I met living in West Oxfordshire, people here will not engage you unless they really have to and if they must, they are more than likely to resent you for invading their personal space.




People don't come here to build communities and integrate with others; they are here to make money. It seems cynical that I sit here in Dubai and write that, but I came here because I did not feel secure in my job, and not having a support network around me to help out in the UK should I become unemployed, I jumped ship and fled to where job security is better. If I could be guaranteed my job security back in West Oxfordshire I would be much like you sitting in front of an open fire reading this very paper; but instead I am here working in a place where the people judge you on what you drive and the contents of your wallet, not your ability to function like a normal human being.

Not everyone here is awful, but the ratio of good/bad people leans too far towards the bad, and I don't like that. Looking beyond that, Dubai is a good

place; the weather is nice, we don't pay tax, you can get everything you need here and it's relatively safe – Well except for Iran being 40 miles away, and the ongoing tough talk between them and the west.


Given an opportunity to have something stable in the Bampton area would have me back on a plane in a heartbeat, but until the job situation for someone in my line of work improves I will stay here. For 2012, all my holiday time is planned for Bampton, a plan that hasn't gone down too well with family and friends in Australia. I can't wait to get my hands dirty down at Colt House building chook sheds, building fences using only a shovel and brute strength, having my work bench eaten by horses as I try to cut wood, winning the cow milking competition at the Bampton Donkey Derby, sunny

I love the community spirit that Bampton has; it is something I had never experienced before, and something I long to be part of again sometime soon. In 28 years of living in Melbourne I never got the same sense of community that I had here, even though it was always drummed into us from as far back as I can remember but just never seemed to work. 



## Twenty seasons of Bampton Classical Opera

Bampton Classical Opera was founded in 1993 and so 2012 will, remarkably, be the company's twentieth season. Consequently we look forward to 20<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations in 2013.

Bampton Classical Opera is rather like an iceberg as far as many Bampton residents are concerned as only a small proportion of activities (the July performances in the Deanery garden and the St. Beornwald's Day Concert in the church) are immediately apparent. Everything else goes on "below the surface" throughout the year including performances at other venues, notably the prestigious Buxton Festival and London's world-famous Wigmore Hall.

Staging performances of opera to the highest standard requires an enormous effort encompassing translation, auditions, scheduling rehearsals, assembling orchestras, designing and building scenery, organising press relations and publicity, day to day administration and, above all, fundraising.

Sadly it is in the nature of opera that ticket income can never match expenses but we nevertheless maintain a policy of affordable prices.

Staging opera, even on a relatively modest scale, is still an expensive business – just one evening's performance at the Deanery costs well above  $\pounds 15,000$  and consequently we rely heavily on the support of our Friends' organisation and on donations from charitable trusts. We also have a loyal band of local volunteers, helping in all sorts of essential tasks, many of whom have been with us since the beginning.

Over the years there have many memorable and amusing incidents - some not always intentional. In 1997 when the village was marooned by flood-water, the performance of *Romeo and Juliet* went on more-or-less as scheduled – and electricity was restored to the power-cut church just as Romeo was scripted to say "Oh, God!"

One opera featured a shiny vintage 1930s Rolls Royce, and another a real dancing Dalek (helpfully provided by an Oxfordshire undertaker).


There was once an unscripted and deafening flyover of the Red Arrows - but the subsequent return flight was immediately diverted following our complaint to Brize. We are so grateful to Linda and Peter Ferstendik for their forbearance in what we have inflicted on their lovely garden over the years – it has variously been transformed into a Roman villa, a hippy commune, a mental sanatorium, a holiday caravan site, a French revolutionary prison and a seedy hotel at Trafalgar Square.

The fame of Bampton Classical Opera is such that we have attracted visitors from Europe, America and even New Zealand. The recently published *Rough Guide to the Cotswolds* includes enticing mentions about the opera; and last summer the formidable powers of Downton Abbey were forced to reschedule their planned filming when they discovered that it clashed with our rehearsals.

What do people enjoy about Bampton Classical Opera? Its excellent value and very relaxed atmosphere, certainly; the opportunity of hearing wonderful music which has sometimes remained unperformed for 200 years; the witty English translations with their tongue-tripping rhymes; the amazing chance to hear the finest young professional singers, some of whom appearing at Bampton in the past now perform at Covent Garden and have international careers. Over and over again, audience members fill in their performance questionnaire with the simple judgment: "excellent".

In 2012 we will be performing a double-bill of melodious French comic operas at the Deanery on 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> July; you'll be able to hear and enjoy every word of the zippy English translation. The delightful comic romance, *The Jealous Lover* by Grétry will be coupled with *Blaise the cobbler* by Philidor, a composer better known for his chess-playing prowess. We return to the Buxton Festival with a revival of our 2010 production of *The Marriage of Figaro*. More details of all these will be available soon. In recognition of the support gratefully received from Bampton Parish Council we offer 10 free tickets for 20<sup>th</sup> July on a first-come-first-served basis to Bampton residents who have not attended one of our performances before.

# **Bampton Village Hall**

Around two years ago the village hall committee began a programme of refurbishment in order to improve the existing facilities. The new kitchen was completed in November 2010 and this was shortly followed by the purchase of 80 new chairs. In 2011 a new night storage central heating system was installed and, now that we understand how this works, it appears to be performing well.

Plans for the immediate future (subject to the availability of sufficient funds) include interior re-decoration and possibly a new sound system (including an induction loop) which will be useful for large meetings.

A variety of societies and clubs are regular users quite apart from at least three different keep fit classes. Sadly Movies on the Move appears to be in jeopardy but we already arrange other forms of entertainment on an occasional basis and these have recently been very popular. In spite of all of this activity we still have the capacity to take on more and future potential users will find that our rates are competitive.

On the downside the hall and local residents have suffered from anti-social behaviour, vandalism and criminal damage around the Bell Lane side of the building (to put this problem into perspective, the cost of replacing broken tiles on the roof has cost over £700 in the last 18 months). It is a great shame that there are not more organised facilities for the young people of Bampton and hopefully this situation will improve in the future. In the meantime we have taken steps to make this area a much less attractive assembly point for young people and we have contingency plans for further action including closer liaison with the police if this is necessary. It is probably too much to hope that the young people concerned will read this but hopefully some of their parents will.



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

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# IN THE GARDEN

### What to do in the garden from April to August:

Well it was a strange winter which I know for a fact made gardening a bit haphazard. With lots of rain, followed by ice and frost, the ground was too waterlogged and then too frozen to do much early on. Still the veg plots are now clear and everything is ready for the upcoming growing season. Here are a few tips on what we should be aiming to do each month this summer (British weather permitting of course).

### April

Give tulip bulbs a good water when the buds start to appear to encourage larger blooms and taller stems

Start watering your patio pots little and often as they can easily dry out if we have a dry spring

Shape your hedges and give them a good mulch

Plant your sweet pea seedlings out

Plant up your hanging baskets

This is the last chance to plant summer flowering bulbs

Now is a good time to plant your zinnias, cosmos and snapdragons for cut flowers later on

# The Society for the Protection of Bampton

The Society was founded in 1993 by Lord Donoughmore. At that time Bampton was the fastest growing village in West Oxfordshire and there was a concern that if Bampton was to continue to grow at that rate many of the aspects we all associate with and love about Bampton would be lost.

Accordingly the Society has fought against planning applications involving large scale developments, including twice successfully against the development of the remaining open land to the north of New Road. That proposal will undoubtedly come back as at the recent public meeting in Witney attended by all the District Councillors to discuss the District Strategy Plan on which planning decisions will be based over the next 10+ years three people attended to talk about Bampton and two of them were the owner of those fields and his agent. The third was me.

Because of the action taken by the Society in respect of these planning matters it has been characterised as anti-development. This is too simplistic.

The principal object of the Society in its Constitution is "to maintain or improve the quality of life of those living in Bampton".

The Society is anti development that it believes is of a type or scale that is unlikely to improve the quality of life here.

The subscription is  $\pounds 2$  per adult to cover 3 years or  $\pounds 1$  for pensioners.

The Society has always done more than just be concerned with planning

Last year the Society gave grants to SPAJERS, the Bampton Classical Opera and the Community Trust. It supported AGGROW to fight the proposal to extract gravel on both sides down the Buckland Road to the Thames and either side of the road to Clanfield.

It has also sponsored a questionnaire on house insurance to those flooded in 2007, who will shortly face the end of the Government initiative requiring existing insurers to continue to insure flooded properties up to 2013.

The biggest donation made by the Society was to buy for the Village Sandford's Field ( site of the Annual Donkey Derby ) to be used by the village in perpetuity as an open recreational space.

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# Getting disabled people back in the game

Sometimes it's the small things in life that make all the difference. For Ellie, a bright young girl with spinal muscular atrophy who's eager to enjoy life, it was playing with her friends on the Nintendo Wii. She knew it was one of the few activities that she could enjoy on equal terms with her able-bodied pals, an equality that made her feel included and gave her self-confidence.



But as her disability made her progressively weaker, even the weight of the controller left her tired after just a few minutes. Her parents contacted us, and we were able to create an adapted lightweight Wii controller that she can lift easily and get herself back in the game.

Ellie is just one of the hundreds of lives that SpecialEffect has touched in its short four-year history. This dynamic Oxfordshire charity do whatever it takes to enhance the quality of life of people with disabilities by using technology, and they're making a name for themselves as *the* organisation that can help everyone play and enjoy computer games. They're changing the lives of people from all walks of life, including stroke and road traffic accident patients, individuals with life-limiting conditions and injured soldiers returning from overseas.

But they're not just doing it for the sake of fun. By giving disabled people the means to participate, they're kick-starting rehabilitation, inclusion, self-esteem and, most importantly, quality of life.

Some of the technology they're using has benefits that go way beyond gaming. Joe, a very intelligent young man whose muscular dystrophy has left him unable to speak or move his body, has had his life transformed through SpecialEffect visits and support, plus the loan of a special computer that can be controlled simply through eye movement. All he needs to do is move his eyes to be able to activate an artificial voice that can enable him to speak. Because the technology is based around a normal computer, he can also write emails, surf the web and – of course – play a huge range of computer games.



The charity's Patron is Matt Hampson, an England Under 21 rugby player who was paralysed in training. The charity helped Matt with his own technology needs and he has been an inspiring force for the charity. This includes an event called Walk4Matt that will see a team from West Oxfordshire walk with various Rugby legends the 110 miles along the Grand Union canal from Rugby to Twickenham in May in time for the Premiership Final. SpecialEffect welcome anybody with disabilities to their Charlbury-based GamesLab, the UK's first specialist computer games room, which is packed with adapted games controllers and accessible games. If the people who need help are unable to travel, they have a small team of therapists and technologists who journey the length and breadth of the UK (and sometimes beyond) to visit people who could benefit from their support.

Amazingly, all of this help is provided without charge. It's one of the core principles that Founder and Director Mick Donegan insists upon in order that SpecialEffect's services are available to anyone who needs them.

"We've seen so many times how our support paves the way for therapy, friendship and, above all, fun," he says. "The whole idea is to put people with disabilities on a level playing field with everyone else, and we'll do whatever it takes to achieve that."

Inevitably the cost of keeping their loan library, the GamesLab and the support service stocked with equipment is high. And that's before adding in the costs of running the charity itself. Although just  $\pounds$  50 will enable them to modify and loan a lightweight games controller for young people like Ellie, an eye-controlled computer can cost up to £20,000 when support is taken into account.

SpecialEffect need £750,000 each year to keep helping people like Ellie and Joe. They're always looking for more supporters, including individuals **who** might want to give a few pounds a month or businesses who would be interested in corporate involvement.

They run a busy schedule of fundraising events ranging from firewalks to marathons, and they welcome anyone interested in helping them make a truly remarkable – and fun – difference, to contact them.

# FREE MEMBERSHIP OF COUNTY OIL SCHEME

If you use oil to heat your home you will be acutely aware of how much it is costing for two reasons. Firstly, you buy it by the tank load and then watch your tank level gradually drop, and secondly oil is an expensive heating fuel. You buy oil then use it as opposed to the other way round for most other fuels. Many thousands of properties in Oxfordshire rely on oil as a heating fuel and many of those households struggle to afford the cost of oil.

To save local residents money the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) set up an oil bulk buying scheme, where oil is procured centrally at a discounted price and this discount is passed onto scheme members. With support from the Department of Health's Warm Homes Healthy People fund ORCC is able to offer free membership to their oil bulk buying scheme to 250 households who struggle to afford heating their homes with oil. If this is you or you know someone who could benefit from this scheme call ORCC on 01865 883 488.

The free membership package is part of a range of assistance available from Oxfordshire Warm Homes Healthy People. There is more help available:

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
