tory of The Elms, Bampton, Oxfordshire.
The School for Young Ladies was run by my

father's aunts, the Misses Pembrey, in, I believe, the mid or late 1800s. Photographs of The Elms show it to be a large, handsome, stone building. The present owners of the building can furnish no clues as to its history and inquiries on my behalf to the local vicar and a search of the local church records has produced no trace of the Misses Pembrey. However, I know that my father and his brother as youngsters loathed visiting the place — "All those girls!"

This prospectus, with its mention of guineas,
