

Nina Carroll Bampton Arts Centre

The present exhibition being presented by the West Oxfordshire Arts Association at the Bampton Arts Centre — until next Friday — is devoted to pen and wash drawings of local subjects by Nina Carroll.

Nina Carroll studied part-time at the Cheltenham School of Art and the Ruskin School, Oxford. She has exhibited her work extensively including showing at the Royal Academy.

In addition to her landscape work and architectural impressions she is a portrait painter and she designed and executed the Rereedos at Stoke Albany, in Leicestershire.

All her water-colour work shows her realisation that this medium if it is to make its most effective impact, needs to be kept fluid in the handling.

One can sense this quality in picture after picture at Bampton except those painted in a more deliberately stylised fashion.

The looseness of treatment can be seen in, for instance the "Oxford In Rain" subject and in "Fuschsia" and "Lavender Square."

In all these pictures there is good use of tone, either warm, or cooler. Pictures such as these give the artist an opportunity of achieving the texturally soft effects in which she delights.

A considerable number of the pictures on show are of Cogges, especially interiors of the building. In some

of these the treatment of the arching wooden beams reveals the strength of wilss Carroll's draughtsmanship.

Other interiors at Cogges, notably those of a bedroom and the Red Room, show us a warmth of colour that can also be found in the "Junior Tractor" and which are far removed from the sometimes over-sharp greens of some exterior subjects.

In contrast work such as her "Bampton Alley Way" and "Snow-drops" and "Corn" the artist hints at breadth of technical scope.

The Bampton subject, in low-keyed colour, which is expertly placed in the picture is notable for a keenly used perspective in the composition and very sensitive use of the paper and especially its differing densities of absorption of the wash.

In both the "Snowdrops" and "Corn" subjects, the stylisation to which I have already referred occurs. The first has a refreshing simplicity and clarity in its composition as though it were a conscious design, and "Corn" makes radiant use of blue-faintly-green-tinged and golden tone employed in effective harmony.
