Following an Art Exhibi-tion staged by Alvescot Col-lege in Bampton Town Hall Exhibiin December 1972, a number of local people felt that this

could be the beginning lively enterprise. With the approval of Bampton Parish council they formed the West Oxfordshire Arts Centre with the idea of pre-senting exhibitions of paintsculpture, pottery children's work; run films, lectures, photographic sessions and displays of organised village crafts involving both amateur and professional talent from

Hall, Bampton.

chairman was particularly pleased to discover how well dispersed membership had already become, as there were members present from many the smaller neighbouring lages such as Holwell, stwell, Swinbrook, Standvillages Westwell, Swinbroo lake and Hardwick.

works by 14 invited artists from the local area and from London. A considerable number of paintings were sold on the open night, and the ex-hibition appeared to have been received with enthusi-asm from people of all ages as a variety of styles was represented.

Arts society hall lease renewed

The renewing of the lease for the upper chamber of the Town Hall to the West Oxford rice Arts Association wa iscussed at Bampton parisn council meeting on Wednesday.

No objections were heard for the continuation of the lease which expires in December 1976, but it was agreed that during the next three-year period of the new lease the rent should be reviewed annually to take into account possible rate increases.

Members heard that following a report that part of the north stone wall in the cemetery was damaged the chairman and vice-chairman councillors Mr L. Hughes-Owens and S. J. Pickard had investigated the complaint and had found that there were in fact several small holes.

The meeting agreed that estimates for repair to the damage should be obtained.

There was some discussion about the untidy appearance in the centre of the town due largely to the condition of the old central garage.

It was agreed to write to the conservation committee and ask if something could be done to improve the situation.

The first exhibition has been planned to run until June 18 and on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday the Town Hall will be opened for viewing between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. whilst on Wednesdays it will be closed all day and opened in the evening between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m. There is no charge for admission.

THE WEST Oxfordshire Arts Association continues to thrive, and its third exhibition of paintings at the Bampton Art Centre opens on Saturday, July 21, and will run until August 24.

It will be of works by invited members of the Association, and admission is

free.

The literary panel — with assistance from the music panel — had a successful launching last week with poetry reading by Dan McNabb, of Combe, with guitar accompaniment by

Ray Buley.

Dan McNabb read a selection from the works of Robert Frost, D. H. Lawrence, Dylan Thomas and Sir John Betjeman, but it was his own poems which particularly delighted the audience of about 50 people. Two fively dialogue poems in pure Oxfordshire dialect described village football and cricket matches.

The evening was introduced by Andrew Osmond, the novelist, who gave advance notice of a prose and poetry competition, open to all, which is being organised by the literary panel, details of which are to be announced shortly.
