



BAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Flood Concerns

The following is a letter sent to The Witney Gazette by David Hawkins:

The Bampton based Flood Prevention Working Group, which was set up after the July 2007 floods and which has representatives from Aston, Brize Norton, Clanfield and Carterton Councils had a nasty surprise at its June meeting . We were surprised and very disappointed to hear from the Environment Agency representative that we could no longer expect the Agency to carry out any maintenance work on rivers or streams in a huge area to the South West of Witney. We were briefed that the Agency has 3 categories of waterways which give an indication of the degree of damage to property or danger to persons should the river or stream burst its banks. These are High consequence/ Medium consequence and Low consequence. The Agency has only sufficient funding for the maintenance of High consequence waterways. The area in question extends from Burford to just north of Lechlade, then east to Aston and then north to the south west edge of Witney and then westwards back to Burford. No waterway other than the Windrush has a "high" category. We were told that, in future, all obstructions must be cleared by the Riparian owners who are the farmers whose land abuts the river or stream. Whether the farmer would be allowed to de-silt the waterways has not been decided but is unlikely.

The working group is very concerned that the "medium" and "low" consequence waterways such as the Shillbrook or Highmoor Brook would not be monitored closely and that Riparian owners would not have the expertise or the desire to undertake such essential maintenance. The idea of village volunteer groups carrying out the work has certain attractions, but is fraught with problems such as insurance cover, lack of expertise and the risk of flooding villages down stream by increasing flow rates. We wouldn't dream of setting up village vigilante groups if Thames Valley

police reduced police numbers. Nor would we consider buying second hand dustbin lorries, should bin collection arrangements be seriously reduced. Our working group concluded that the best solution is to get the Environment Agency properly funded and staffed so that flood management is rightly in the hands of just one agency. Funny old thing, this is the main conclusion of the various major studies following the 2007 disasters. The working group will make every effort to get the EA to revise their new policy and asks all Bampton flood victims to badger the Agency into doing so.

Obviously this is a serious situation, and one which the Parish Council will work strenuously on to try and get the EA funded to do a proper job. The situation at present is unacceptable.

Emergency Response Plan: Tabletop Exercise

A tabletop exercise to test the ERP was carried out in April. It was facilitated by Caroline Martland of Oxfordshire County Council (OCC), and Bill Oddy of West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC). The Police, Fire Service and our District Councillors also attended as well as Parish Councillors. The exercise was very useful and various issues were uncovered which are being addressed and incorporated into the ERP procedures.

Mercury Close Playing Field Cllr. Anna Pitt has been successful in obtaining funding for the new play equipment, and is aiming to complete the project over the coming few

Old School Building and Bush Centre

Meetings have been held with the various stakeholders with reference to the proposed move of the Bush Club into the Youth Centre Building. The present state of play is that the Youth Services of OCC and representatives of the Bush Club are to hold meetings to see how they can integrate and share facilities in the building, and in turn this will determine if there is a

need for the building to be extended to accommodate both groups. In the meantime, OCC has approached the Parish Council about taking over the lease form the Youth Centre Management Committee when it expires in October. The approach was made since the YCMC advised OCC that it did not wish to renew the lease with OCC. OCC has obtained additional funding to upgrade the Church View site to provide multi-use facility which will provide a youth club with outreach services, a day service for older people, preventative services for elderly people, and various health, leisure, youth and community uses. This is extremely good news for Bampton and OCC is to be congratulated on its success in obtaining the extra funding for the project. Total funding available is now £900,000, although exactly how it will be allocated to the various elements of the project has not yet been decided, and will obviously be the subject of much discussion. The Parish Council's aim is to make sure that value for money is obtained and that money is not just spent for money's sake.

Station Road Chicane

Advice from OCC is still awaited as to the planned timing of the installation of the new chicane.

Buckland Road Traffic Calming

A letter has been sent to OCC Highways advising them that the Parish Council wishes to have a 7.5T Environmental Weight Limit introduced on the Buckland Road, but with access rights for local businesses. In excerpt the Parish Council letter says:

- 1. The Parish Council fully supports the introduction of a 7.5T Environmental Weight Limit on the Buckland Road from its junction with the A420 up to the mini-roundabout at the Market Square, with the proviso that there are access rights for businesses whose premises are located within the Parish of Bampton.
- 2. Farm equipment and vehicles such as tractors, including tractor-

- 3. To allow local businesses access to their premises, a permit system to be introduced which would allow vehicles exceeding the 7.5T limit to use the Buckland Road for delivery and collection purposes to businesses located within the Parish of Bampton.
- 4. The Parish Council offers to administer the Permit System on behalf of the OCC. In this sense, it is suggested that each business' application will be scrutinised for validity by the Parish Council, and on sanction, any vehicle exceeding the 7.5T limit would be required to display the permit number visibly in its cab at the front wind-
- 5. The Parish Council recognises that Thames Valley Police do not have the resources to frequently or even regularly police the weight limit zone, and accept the situation. The Parish Council believes, however, that the introduction of the weight limit will nevertheless act as a deterrent to those who would wish to use the Buckland Road for vehicles in excess of 7.5T in order to gain access to areas outside of the Parish envelope.
- 6. The Parish Council and residents of Buckland Road will monitor the zone for violations, and, if the situation warrants, will write to the owners of the transgressing HGVs advising them that a violation has occurred and requesting them to order their drivers stop using the route. The Parish Council has had good cooperation from companies in the past when they were requested not to use the Village as a through route for large vehicles. Should the situation warrant it, the Parish Council will request Thames Valley Police to stage ad hoc checks, as resources allow, with a view to deterring rogue vehicles from using the route.

The Parish Council believes that the permit system proposed would be relatively easy to implement and administer, and at the same time views that it would help to protect local businesses from having to have the large vehicles which service their premises from making long and environmentally unfriendly detours via Oxford and the A40.

To date no reply has been received from OCC although our County Councillor is pressing Highways on the issue.

Town Hall

Cllr. Millar is looking at various changes and modifications for the Town Hall, with a view to modernising the rooms and facilities. This includes the erection of a self-standing flagpole to eliminate the problems with the existing arrangement.

VERY IMPORTANT NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 22nd April, Village Hall

The following are the salient points from the various reports:

ENVIRONMENT AGENCY: OXFORD FLOOD PROTECTION

The Environment Agency advised that there were two different schemes to address the problems in the Botley area of Oxford. The first was building a channel to bypass Botley, at an estimated cost of £100Million. They then showed a map of an area where they are looking to store water in the event that further flood protection is needed. This would expand the area of the flood plain in essence around the Shifford, Cote and Chimney areas.

The EA stressed that this was work very much in progress, and they didn't expect the channel to be approved any time soon. Also, the expansion of the flood plain was probably decades away and would to a large extent depend on whether flooding frequency increased with climate change. It was noted that Bampton would not be impacted by the projects, and indeed, if the channel were to be built it would probably allow water to drain away more quickly from the area, which would perhaps lessen the flooding problems suffered by the village.

R A F BRIZE NORTON up date on Project Catara. Centralised Air Transport and Airto-Air Refuelling Assets

Following the Armed Forces Strategic Review, a number of efficiencies were identified to increase the effectiveness of our operations and to secure the long-term future of our core RAF sites. One such efficiency was to combine the Air Transport (AT) and Air Re-fuelling (AAR) fleets at a single centre of excellence. After a period of consultation and investigation, it was decided that RAF Brize Norton would be developed into the core AT and AAR station and that RAF Lyneham's aircraft assets would relocate by 2012. Following this decision, a joint team was established combining HQ Air Cmd (HQ Air) staff officers and specialist personnel from Defence Estates (DE).

Since the announcement that Lyne-

ham was to become surplus to HQ Air's requirements, the team has been refining the RAF's future plan for RAF Brize Norton and preparing for the introduction into service of new aircraft such as the Future Strategic Tanker Aircraft (FSTA) and A400M, to replace the ageing VC10, Tristar and C130K aircraft. Whilst the final plan for RAF Brize Norton has yet to be confirmed, it is certain that a concentrated period of construction will follow in preparation for the new aircraft fleets and the arrival of their Support Units from RAF Lyneham. However a word of caution...

As you would expect, rumours are rife about the scope of the CATARA project. Whilst planning and consultation remain ongoing, the level of investment and infrastructure required for the Station to fulfil its new role is yet to be finalised and even those Sections and Wings that have been identified as core to the Station's output, have yet to have their final location determined.

Likewise, Programme CATARA is responsible for providing the infrastructure solutions only, not new equipment. This remains the responsibility of the equipment Integrated Project Teams (IPTs) who will introduce new equipment and training where the requirement and funding exists. That said, where new equipment requires specialist accommodation, Programme CATARA will work alongside the equipment IPTs to ensure that new buildings are designed to efficiently incorporate the new equipment and its supporting elements

ASP (Aircraft Servicing Platform)
Twelve new and six replacement Aircraft Service Platforms (ASPs) will be constructed as part of the project to allow parking for the new A400M, FSTA Fleet and the C130Js transferred from Lyneham. The new ASP will provide the capability for onstand refuelling, de-fuelling and ground power. Phase Two and Three of the project have commenced and all work should be completed by

October this year.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT by Fred Gray Change of Chairman

The makeup of the PC has not changed but Jacky Allinson decided not to continue as Chairman at the Annual Parish Council Meeting last may, and I was asked to take on the job, which I was very pleased and honoured to do. This was Jacky's second spell as Chairman and she did an excellent job both times. Our thanks to her for her efforts as Chairman, and the continued effort she puts in to this day on the Council.

Planning Applications

The Council reviews all planning applications relevant to the Parish and sends its comments to the planners at WODC. Since April 2008 we have reviewed around 40 applications, compared to around 50 in the previous 12 months. Perhaps significantly, in these times, we have reviewed only 4 applications in the first quarter of the year, compared to 16 during the same period in 2008.

Recently we reviewed the 'Core Strategy So Far', and the 'Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment' prepared by WODC. Overall it would appear that Bampton will be protected for some time from any major housing developments, and the reply sent to WODC from Ralph Norman on the 'Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment' essentially covers all I want to say on the issue:

"With respect to the SHLAA, we agree entirely with the housing assessment for Bampton and the conclusion that only the New Road site has potential for a small development for local needs, provided the problems with flooding, sewage and infrastructure can be addressed. We also feel

that any large scale development in Carterton presents a very real risk of flooding for the downstream villages, and so flood attenuation must be the top priority in all cases."

Roads

We continue to liaise with OCC in order to improve our roads in and around the Village. One of the main issues of interest to most in the Village is the Station Road chicane. It has now been agreed with OCC that the existing chicane will be removed, and a new design installed slightly farther out of the Village. The work to install it should start soon, but to date we have not heard of a firm start date. You will be aware that an 18T weight limit was imposed on the Buckland Road when OCC had to restrict HGVs transiting Newbridge at Standlake. This weight limit was imposed on the basis of Tadpole Bridge not being strong enough for HGV traffic. Subsequent to a review the bridge was declared strong enough for HGVs and the weight limit therefore became illegal, and OCC plans to remove the sign - although for some reason they have recently installed new signs at the bridge!

The PC made representation to OCC on the issue requesting that some sort of restriction be maintained on HGVs on the Buckland Road, otherwise the road could become a rat run for them given the Newbridge problem. However, conscious of the impact such a weight limit could have on local businesses, the PC requested access rights for our local traders, farmers, etc. To date this is still in discussion, with OCC officers at the moment apparently refusing to agree to allow access rights for local businesses.

Youth Centre & Bush Club

Various discussions have taken place between the relevant parties on the move of the Bush Club to the Youth Centre. However, no firm decisions have been made, and again Don Seale has been asked to intervene, and to organise a new series of meetings to look at options.

Options looked at to date, but not in a great deal of detail, include moving the Weightlifters to a new building at the Pavilion, or moving the Bush Club to the Pavilion. In the meantime, because of some H&S issues with the Youth Centre building, the Youth

Club suspended operations in December. It is understood that a meeting is imminent between the Youth Centre Management Committee and the OCC Youth Support Services to try and iron out the H&S problems, and the PC is very keen to see the Youth Club re-start in the shortest possible time-frame.

Bampton Fire Station

Carterton keeps pushing to have its own fire station, which, if it happened, would mean the demise of either Bampton or Burford fire stations; or possibly both. The Parish Council continues to resist Carterton pressure on the issue, but clearly the availability of firemen in Bampton will be crucial in maintaining the Fire Station in the Village. Two things on our side are cost and benefit. It would cost quite a sum to build a fire station in Carterton – certainly well in excess of £1 Million it is understood; and there do not appear to be any benefits - a risk assessment carried out by the Fire Service a couple of years ago suggested this.

However, as said before, we must try and ensure that Bampton Fire Station is adequately staffed, since if it could not be sustained, we might lose it altogether.

Grass Cutting

After negotiations with OCC, the PC has taken over all of the grass cutting activities in the Parish. It is hoped that this will lead to better quality being achieved and a better looking environment.

Emergency Response Plan

The ERP was issued to all households and businesses in January. Last Saturday the PC held a Tabletop Exercise, facilitated by OCC and WODC, with the Police and Fire Service, to look at various emergency scenarios in the Village, with a view to determining if the ERP had to be modified. Various issues - none serious - were uncovered which will be the subject of an update of the Parish Council's own ERP. These included things like listing all facilities in the Village which could be used to house displaced Villagers on a temporary basis during an emergency, or to act as a C&CC if the Town Hall is out of action, callout lists, additional equipment needs such as megaphones, etc. It is believed that Bampton is the first village in West Oxfordshire to have issued an ERP.

Risk Assessment

Subsequent to obtaining risk assessment software a Risk Assessment exercise was carried out. The exercise proved useful, but unfortunately the software gave some problems when interfacing with Windows Vista. The software does however contain a lot of very good information of risk issues, legislation etc, and from that aspect the exercise was very good. However, the PC has decided that it will develop its own risk register using Excel, and this will be done during the course of this year. Thereafter regular Risk Assessment exercises will be undertaken with a view to ensuring that risks are identified, eliminated if possible, and reduced and managed if not. And that adequate insurance is maintained.

Fly Posting

The Parish Council was asked to intervene in the standoff between the opposing groups on the fly posting issue. The Parish Council was aware that fly posting is illegal, and therefore advised the groups accordingly, and further advised that it would not, and could not adjudicate on the matter. The Parish Council did give advice the those groups who wished to put up posters as to how to go about it - get agreement from the asset owner, and then from either OCC or WODC - but warned that the asset owners such as BT - would be very unlikely to agree. On this basis, the Parish Council decide to install three new notice boards at the Town Hall, and the bus stops in Broad Street and Bushey Row, and to replace the notice board at Emmies. This has been done.

Town Hall

The Town Hall is in need of repair and refurbishment. Ian Millar has identified the bits and pieces needing done – such as repair to the windows, replacing cupboards, knocking a door between the two chambers for ERP purposes, etc. Once funding has been found, the work will be carried out – probably in stages.

New Clerk to the Parish Council

Brenda Sapsford has advised the Council of her wish to retire – well semi-retire since she will remain with us to do the accounts for a while until she finally decides to call it a day.

FLOODING REPORT

Nearly 2 years on from the July 2007 floods, we have seen the final reports from WODC and the Environmental Agency. Both are good reports and clearly list all the options for flood prevention projects for the village.

What we need now – is for WODC and EA to fund the feasibility studies for the major projects that they feel will be most beneficial to Bampton and then to work out a 5 year implementation plan.

What has been achieved?

- Desilting the Shillbrook for the first time in 30 years down to the Great Brook.
- Private projects by Weald residents to value of £7k on self help basis.
- Joint project WODC/Highways/ Weald residents to construct an emergency outvent across "the Rouse" field off Primrose Lane.
- Continuation of the Bampton Flood Working Group meetings every 3 months to get updates and keep the pressure on WODC etc. Meetings attended by Brize Norton, Clanfield and Aston Parish Councils and Carterton Town Council Representatives.

LOCAL POLICE REPORT

PCSO's Sarah Holmes and Isabel Webb addressed the meeting, Isabel introducing herself, as she has recently taken over from PCSO Angela Alford. PCSO Sarah Holmes explained that covering Bampton area where now 4 PCSO's and 1 PC. They were split into 2 teams, covering shift patterns which changed every 3 weeks. This was to give the residents of Bampton and surrounding areas more police visibility. Over the last year there have been 154 incidents reported in Bampton.

PCSO Isabel Webb then explained that they had been active with the speed laser gun in Bampton. PCSO Angela Alford had been to the Buckland Road area and had issued 13 drivers with fixed penalty tickets. Bridge Street had shown 40 vehicles to be over 10% +2 speed and Broad

Street hadn't found any vehicles to be travelling over 30mph.

The speed device is put out on request of the Council when speeding complaints are made. Data is then gathered with the use of the laser guns to decide the next course of action.

RECREATION GROUND TRUST REPORT

The Charity Trustees are all members of the Parish Council and the aims of the Trust are to look after the recreational well being of the inhabitants of Bampton. The Trust owns the Recreation Ground in Pembroke Place, the Buckland Road Recreation Ground, pavilion and facilities, and Sandford's Field. The Charity has investments that provide some income and an income from the Pavilion, pitches and sports clubs that use the Buckland Road facility, but neither of these cover all the running costs each year so additionally the Parish Council gives a grant to the charity. This year that grant was £15000.

Major projects of late were the new storage shed, and the fencing put up to protect the playing fields from joy riders. Maintenance and repair work has also been carried out to the facilities to keep them in good condition. A number of people work very hard in support of this charity, particularly Alan Dunbar, Anna Pitt, and David Hawkins. However, I must mention Ray Willis the Pavilion Manager. Ray works tirelessly for the Recreation Ground, making sure it is kept in top class condition, and marketing the facilities. We would be very much worse off without his services.

And the place is very busy with archery, football, tennis, cricket, to name but a few of the activities going on.

We have also been lucky to have Pauline Smith as our DPS or licensed officer. Having Pauline also makes the Pavilion more attractive for parties as licensed bars can be arranged though her.

For the future, the Cricket Club is keen to put in a 'real wicket' so that they can join a proper league. The Trustees have given their support for this. Around £20000 needs to be raised to put in the wicket, and the Cricket Club has started fund raising. Once in, it will take around £4000 per year to maintain the wicket, but the Cricket Club is confident that they

will be able to raise the funds for this. Funding of the Recreation Ground in general is being looked at given the reduction in interest rates where the Trust has felt the effect on reduced interest income. However, the Trust at the moment is in good shape and there is confidence that, with an upturn in world finances at some stage in the future, it will continue to remain in a healthy position in the future.

Finally, vandalism remains a concern. We hope we have stopped the joy riders on the sports fields, but we continue to have problems in the car park. Occasionally parts of the facility are damaged – such as the damage to the practise wall on the new storage building - and it is just to be hoped that the hooligans that do this sort of thing will see sense, take pride in the Recreation Ground, and help to look after it. We remain in hope!

NEW MERCURY CLOSE PLAYING FIELD UPDATE

Now that Town Green status for the playing field has been rejected, the project to renew the facilities has begun. We have now received £11k of funding from West Oxfordshire District Council, grants from the Community Shop, and the Parish Council is contributing £8250 (in line with funding requirements for the WODC grant).

Application has also been made to TOE for a further £25k and a meeting to discuss the project has been held with them. They seemed to be very positive about the project.

Updated quotes for the work are to be obtained since the previous ones are over a year old, and then we await the TOE decision - which will hopefully be positive. If this proves to be the case, the whole project can be moved forward with the aim to complete it this year if at all possible.

If we don't, for any reason, get all of the money this year we plan to split the project so and do it in two stages.

BAMPTON EXHIBITION FOUNDATION by Gerald Mills

It is the responsibility of the trustees to maintain the Old Grammar School and to provide bursaries to those with educational needs.

Income is from leasing the premises to Oxfordshire County Council for the Library; £4000 per annum.

Expenditure on repairs and maintenance in 2008: £3,907.00

Bursaries awarded for educational needs: £ 350.00

Expenditure in the previous year: £22,411.70

Bursaries awarded for educational needs: £ 1,125.00

The building has now been made basically safe for use, but much more needs to done.

The scheme for repairs assuming the 1st floor is **not** in use is estimated at £46,000.00 and our Assets as at 31st December 2008 were £38,816.06 compared to £24,543.94 of the previous year. The increase in assets was mainly due to the performance of COIF investment fund before the credit crunch.

The first floor will remain out of use for the time being until the funding can be found to restore access, which will take into account the need of disabled persons. (approximately £100,000.)

This year the wall at the boundary of the property collapsed and had to be repaired at a cost of £800.00.

Last year Bampton Community Shop gave a generous grant for repairs to the upstairs windows, and this year a further grant has been made, enabling the Trust to proceed with phase 2 of the repairs, namely the windows along the left hand side of the school.

The Vesey Room is used by The Bampton Archive and Local Study Centre for exhibitions etc.

Unable to completely restore the whole building (approx £200,000) the Trustees continue to bring the building into the best possible state of repair, step by step, as finances allow.

We have a period of 3 years over which the status quo can be held, and then the Trustees will have to reconsider the options available.

BAMPTON WELFARE TRUST

History and purpose of the Trust
The Bampton Welfare Trust as we

know it today came into being on 6th November 1972. Trustees were appointed to administer and manage the eleven charities formerly known as The Bampton Consolidated Charities. The investments which now provide The Welfare Trust with an income were a result of bequests made during the 17th and 18th centuries, for the purpose of helping the poor of Bampton, Aston and Lew.

The Committee

There are 10 trustees;

1 ex-officio Trustee –The Vicar of Bampton – The Rev. David Lloyd 7 Nominative Trustees;

4 appointed by the PC of Bampton – Rosemary Colville, Matthew Perry, Janet Newman, Joan Haslam - 2 appointed by the PC of Aston – George Wiltshire, Gerald Mills - 1 appointed by the parish meeting of Lew – Mrs Ann Grinsell - 2 co-optive Trustees – Susan Phillips, Colin Rouse; Clerk – David Pullman

Distribution of Funds

The capital is invested in the COIF Charities Investment Fund and as at 31.12.08 was £115,342. Showing a decrease on the year of 25%. Income from these funds has increased by 16%.

The Trustees meet twice a year to distribute the interest which amounts to approximately £6000.00. The main distribution takes place in January/February. The Trustees meet again in June/July to make any additional payments that are required.

The main beneficiaries in January 2009 were:

Aston and Cote Primary School £500.00

Bampton Primary School £800.00

Aston and Cote Wednesday Club £150.00

Aston Parish Community Bus £200.00

Bampton Bush Club £200.00

A sum has been set aside to be determined at the summer meeting to help the Aston and Cote Playgroup with the erection of the new premises.

Since the last annual meeting £2,255.09 was spent by the Welfare Officer on 28 families or individual cases of need. A winter fuel payment was made to the elderly and chronic sick in Bampton.

The Trustees would like to thank Janet Newman for the caring and efficient way in which she carries out her duties as Welfare Officer and David Pullman for the time and trouble he takes over the financial matters and accounts.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S

REPORT

by Don Seale Finances. The Bampton Beam

July 2009

The Council Tax increase has been held down to less than 4% at 3.75%. The unfavourable grant from Central Government has made it difficult to maintain all services unchanged without larger increase in Council Tax. We have practically "lost" the £5 million invested in Iceland and the low bank rate has meant that we have seen a reduction in interest payments.. All main services are in fact unaltered, with some improvements. Our policy is to continually damp down increases in spite of poor settlements, and we do these by constantly seeking efficiencies in the way we do business, and an example of this is the Shared Services System which is saving significant amounts of money each year. We are also imposing real savings of 5% per

Health and Vulnerable People

As far as the elderly and infirm are concerned, much work is being done to improve their lives, by council policy of providing help at home rather than in residential homes. Telecare has a place to play in this by allowing people to live independently in their own homes and be looked after by the intelligent use of information systems. A new system to enlarge the direct payments scheme has been piloted in Banbury in October last year which will give those who need support a budget to handle themselves to spend as they see fit. There are many problems to overcome in this especially with those with learning difficulties that may not be able to handle such a system, but overall the system is working well and is popular.

My main theme is the need for investment in preventative services, not just for those approaching imminent old age but amongst the 40 and 50 year olds. We must change from providing care after the aging individuals' health has deteriorated to ensuring that the effects of old age are delayed so that a healthy old age is enjoyed. If we fail to do this, the balance of old age and young with the increasing number of older people compared to young, will mean that we will not be able to afford to provide the help needed if they are ill or frail, as the young will be unable to generate enough money from taxes to support them. The problem succinctly, which is a nice one to have in one respect is that the survival

rate is increasing while the fertility rate is falling. This is a potentially disastrous state of affairs in the future unless we can prevent the old becoming a burden through our inability to prepare for old age. It would be quite wrong if the longevity of people is regarded as a burden rather than a blessing.

— Road Safety and Speed Limits

This is a major problem as our roads become more congested and drivers become more frustrated. We are imposing speed limits on previously unrestricted roads (where we should remember the speed limit currently is 60mph) but many drivers ignore the limits.

The police are overstretched to impose the rules everywhere so we are left with humps, bumps and chicanes, which drivers hate, or flashing signs and speed cameras. One new try is to impose a 20mph limit in parts of Oxford. It will be interesting to see how this works and whether similar scheme can be extended to other towns and villages.

As far as the A361, which is a major road in our area, is concerned I recognise that many drivers are ignoring the speed limits and I have pressed the Council to install speed indicator devices and erect notices warning drivers that parts of the road are becoming an accident black spot and that care must be taken.

Planning and The Green Belt

County Council policy is to preserve the green belt around Oxford. I believe that once developers are let in that in time Oxford will spread to take -in Witney, Thame, Kidlington, Abingdon, Wallingford and the result will be huge conurbation similar in Milton Keynes. In their perceived need for more housing space, Oxford City wishes to "review" the Green belt policy. The County is resisting this. A worry over this is the Government intention is to supersede planning laws with a setting up of an Infrastructure Planning Commission, and a National Housing and Planning Advice Unit. These bodies will supersede local planning and may foist upon us large increases in housing numbers in the order of 46000 new houses a year.

Post Offices

The County Council regards post of-

fices as essential to the life of communities in our rural county. I am aware that the impact of the internet for correspondence, paying car tax, and TV licenses and soon have reduced the business of post offices but we are opposed to wholesale closures based purely on economic grounds and will fight to prevent any further closure. It is accepted that some rationalization must take place, for example carter ton had two post offices where one would suffice, but we regard the post offices in villages and rural communities as a service for which the Government must be prepared to afford. But we have no intention of taking on the post offices ourselves as it is beyond our means, and it is not our business or expertise. We have enough on our plate to provide the services that we



As I said previously, with my school friend, George Bishop, we were often seen on Buckland Road on our way to see George's grandmother at the old Swan Inn. call Mr & Mrs Dixey at Fishers Bridge; the Weston family, and Mr & Mrs Shepherd. Mr P Shepherd was a great character and his wife such a lovely refined lady. There was very little work in the Village in the 1930s. I did all kinds of jobs until September 1937 when I was offered a job as an errand boy at Eales & Son at the Central Stores. Twelve shillings and sixpence a week! I thought how wonderful to have a regular income. It was then I often called at Mr Dixey's to collect lettuce, cabbage, onions and other veg for the shop. Mr Dixey grew quite a variety in those days. Mrs Revnolds ran the old Post Office. At Xmas 1937 one of her postmen was retiring and she offered me the job, which I could fit in with my regular day's work - just a morning shift starting at 5am until 7.30am, which gave me an hour before starting at the shop. This also brought me in 12/6d per week. I did this for a year, but after being given a five-shilling fine at the shop I decided to call it a day. But I must say I thoroughly enjoyed it.

Dear Editor,

One of our Bampton Environmental Watch Group members has recently sent us this report:

'I love walking and really appreciate Bampton's many footpaths. However, one particular walk down the track beyond Ham Court has been interrupted 4 or 5 times on Saturday afternoons in the winter. I have walked almost to the end of the track before finding people shooting all around, and across the footpath.

They have been friendly and asked me to wait a few minutes while they finish shooting and then allowed me to follow the footpath across to the little wooden bridge.

I wondered if warning signs could be put out when people are going to shoot near a footpath, because if I had known that they were shooting there, I would have walked somewhere else.' BEWG has contacted the Footpaths Officer, and the advice is as follows:

Shooting must take place at least 50 ft. from a highway or byway where there are vehicles.

Footpaths cannot be closed.

Once shooting has started, it cannot be stopped.

There is no law governing this practice. (Amazingly).

All that can be done is for walkers and shooters to be aware of best practice and health and safety.

In conclusion, it would seem sensible for warning notices to be placed out before the shoot starts by those responsible for organizing it. Sally Proctor, Secretary, BEWG.

Bampton Bus Services

Subsequent to some complaints by residents that the buses were failing to stop on occasions when hailed, the issue was raised with the Oxfordshire County Council. To our surprise we were advised that the services were not designated as 'Hail & Ride' in the contract, the surprise being that it was always understood that the services were 'Hail & Ride', and indeed when Thames Travel ran the services they indeed were.

The Parish Council have therefore undertaken to request OCC to tender the next contract as 'Hail & Ride' and in the meantime have had a meeting with the present operator Stagecoach to discuss the issue.

Stagecoach advised that they de facto run a 'Hail & Ride' service where they advise their drivers to stop when hailed anywhere in the Village. However, Stagecoach has requested the assistance of the Villagers to ensure that the services maintain punctuality, and that they can stop in relative safety when hailed. They have requested Villagers to adhere where possible to the following:

- Use the designated bus stops where possible these are in the Market Square, Broad Street, Bushey Row, and Bridge Street close to the Horse Shoe.
- Elsewhere, try and ensure that the buses can stop with relative safety i.e. don't stop them on corners, tight bends, etc.
- Where more than one person or groups are in the same vicinity, join together so that the bus only has to stop once since this will help a lot with schedule maintenance.

Stagecoach stress that their aim is to provide an efficient, effective, and safe service, and that not picking up passengers is not financially attractive to them! So, please do try and stick to the protocol above, but if you have problems, please let me know - email: fred.gray@bamptonoxon-parishcouncil.gov.uk - and I will discuss the problem with Stagecoach.

Bampton Environmental Watch Group

In March we held our AGM. The existing officers were reelected (Chairman: Ralph Norman; Vice-chairman: Helene Grygar; Hon Treasurer: Martyn Bishop; Hon Secretary: Sally Proctor). The other members of the committee were also re-elected BEWG except we were sorry to lose Jo Lewington (who decided to stand down due to other commitments) but we were glad to wel-

come Wendy Nicholls as a new committee member. Dr Alan Cole gave an excellent illustrated talk about Antarctica. In April we held our first open meeting of the year, which was a well attended and enjoyed talk by Hannah Jones about the Oxford Local Studies Centre. Future open meetings will be a talk on bees on 31 July and a talk on the history of Oxford Castle on 30 October. Open meetings are held in the Village Hall starting at 8:00pm All are welcome, with attendance free for members, £2 for non-members.

The 18 tonne restriction on Tadpole Bridge has now been removed. It is hoped that it will soon be replaced with a 7.5 tonne environmental restriction on Buckland Road, High Street, part of Aston Road and other adjacent minor roads. The sticking point at the moment is access for local businesses. The Parish Council have put forward a proposal to the County Council for a permit scheme that would achieve this; OCC's response is awaited.

Following the initial consultations that WODC held during the latter half of 2008, it would appear that the sites put forward by developers and landowners for Bampton are in the main unacceptable. Only the Bush Club site and a small part of the New Road site are thought to hold any merit. Publication for consultation of sites across West Oxfordshire that WODC believe worthy of consideration, is

the next stage of the Local Development Framework (LDF). Information on the current status of the LDF may be found on the WODC website.

Discussions and proposals from OCC continue on the redevelopment of the Bush Club site. There is still no agreement on an acceptable solution. There is also still no news on the awaited publication by OCC of a short list of mineral extraction sites. A slightly revised position, for OCC's proposed replacement of the Station Road chicane with a single sided pinch point, was agreed a while ago, following discussions with local residents and the parish council, but its construction is now long overdue. The new pinch point will be positioned further out of Bampton than the existing chicane that it will replace. The Market Square Flower Tubs

The untimely death last year of Julian Johnson deprived the village of one of its major benefactors. Over the last few years, Julian had not only been the driving force behind the provision of the attractive flower tubs that adorn the Market Square, but had made it his job to maintain them; watering them daily, and changing the plants by season.

Easykart **British Championships** By Patrick Lay

This year I am competing in the Junior Easykart National Karting Championship. There are eight rounds at circuits all over the UK from Dorset to Norfolk and as far north as the Lake District. The Championship uses one make karts and the driver can only have one engine and limited modifications, so in turn this offers some of the closest and toughest racing in the country; as only 0.3 of a second is the difference in lap time between finishing first and twelfth.

After having successfully won the opening round in March, at Whilton Mill, Daventry, I gained a 3 point lead in the Championship. Library DVD Review

Ancient Greece... Xerxes, selfproclaimed 'God-King' of Persia is keen to rule the world. Next on his wish list is Sparta. So a messenger is dispatched there with the crowned skulls of fallen kings and the ubiquitous 'Bow down before thy God-King' sort of message. Well, the feisty and pumped up Spartan King Leonidas is having none of it, boots the messenger down a well and takes 300 of his beefcake mates to challenge the humungus Persian force in a narrow mountain pass. Expect plenty of violence, gruesomeness, decapitations, and Spartan shouting. I found the dialogue a touch clumsy and clichéd at times - but no matter, the battling is dark, stunning and the whole affair well brings alive that young schoolboy moment of reverence when he first heard about the extraordinary warring ratio at Thermopylae.

WALL.E

The latest PIXAR animation follows a rich modern catalogue from this vanguard film company, since their opening feature (and world's first full length computer animated film) Toy Story, in '95. The basic story is comically rather sharp and so for interest's sake is probably best left unrevealed. The core love element strayed a little too far into the realm of cutesy for my taste, and PIXAR humans remain comparatively disappointing, but overall (and especially for younger viewers) this is a really impressive visual treat. Mo, a small cleaning robot is notably enjoyable. As is BURN.E. the short film found in 'extras'. Both are master-classes in the art of subtle, clever and entertaining animation.

Disturbia

Essentially here is Rear Window for the modern era. 17 year old Kale (Shia Labeouf) is under 3 months house arrest and with little else to do he takes a binocular-led interest in his immediate neighbourhood, and in particular the alluring Ashley. Along with his quirky friend Ronnie, these three subsequently embark upon "operation stupid", surveillancing and investigating another neighbour who Kale suspects is a serial killer, (we're in America, by-the-way...). The confinement of plot here, (basically 'is he, or isn't he..?') means that Disturbia, without the skill of someone like Hitchcock directing, is only moderately suspenseful (and hardly the chilling fright-fest the DVD cover may have you believe). That said, the feel of this U.S. teen romance-comethriller is unusually likeable, the humour - nicely understated, and Labeouf (with shades of John Cusack in his acting form) should go on to bigger and better things...

Venus

Two old, fairly decrepit actors, one in particular with the reputation of a Lothario past (Peter O'Toole and Leslie Philips) play two old, fairly decrepit actors, one in particular with the reputation of a Lothario past (chums Maurice and Ian). The script has a suitably genuine and endearing timbre, that centres around Ian's grand niece (a sort of real life version of 'Little Britain's Vicky Pollard) brought in as a home help, and her subsequent (platonic) relationship with Maurice. Meanwhile, Ian is beside himself with her ineptitude...

I've already watched Venus twice and before too long would happily watch it again....

The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas

Set in '40s war engulfed Germany a secretive friendship develops between two eight year olds; Bruno, the naïve son of a German officer, and Shmual, a Jewish inmate of the 'work camp' to which Bruno's father has been posted. I approached this with a degree of scepticism as the premise sounded

somehow just too... unlikely. However "It is one of the most moving and remarkable films about childhood I've ever seen" printed here - is wholly justifiable. Tone, shots, character and performances (especially from Asa Butterfield and Jack Scanlon playing Bruno and Shmual) don't get much more spot-on accurate than this. Producing as fresh, honest and heartfelt a film as I've ever seen. During the end credits, reflecting on the Shmual character I suddenly found myself creased up in tears. I mean proper-not-Lassie-tears. Powerful, poignant storytelling. Brilliant. (Should 10 out of 10 be left for a 'happier' film, the sort everyone would be comfortable watching..? On this occasion I don't think so).


Atonement

'30s England... Love and the Class Divide, starring James McAvoy and Kiera Knightly. Expection here this was for a sweeping, classy affair reminiscent of a David Lean classic, that at worst might be a little slow. Things soon started to go awry, alas, with this expectation. The story unfolds in an increasingly jumpy fashion until a small series of captions: 'Five Years Later', '6 Weeks Earlier', 'Yesterday', etc. has you bouncing all over the place without discernible benefit. Secondly, decent actor though he is, McAvoy's plummy English accent just got too twitty at times, as if he was in a 'French and Saunders' pastiche. Then, to make matters worse, the DVD started jumping forward of its own accord (through being dirty). Overall conclusion: somewhat stagy and unflowing, possibly better in Italian. Brize Norton Training Flights 12th and 13th August

I am writing this to advise you that essential night training is to be carried out during the 12th and 13th August by VC10 aircraft from Brize Norton.

The training involves flying in a circuit over the airfield and surrounding areas, landing and taking off several times over a period of 3-4 hours. This training is required as part of a course to qualify new pilots and is an operational requirement. The aircraft will be operating at a height of between 1500 and 2500 ft and will only fly lower than this during approach and

The training requires darkness which will likely mean it will be carried out quite late into the night.

Because of the acknowledged noise impact of this training, each flight is carefully scrutinised and has to be authorised by the Officer in Command of Operations Wing.

We are sensitive to local opinion and in fulfilling our operational and training commitments we try to keep any disturbance to a minimum. However, Royal Air Force Brize Norton is the largest operational base in the RAF and it is inevitable that some noise from our activities will encroach into the local areas.

I do apologise in advance for any disturbance that will be experienced, but trust that the Villagers will understand the need for the training, and I hope that they are not troubled too frequently by our activities in general.

As a group with an average of 41 members coming through the doors, they have cumulatively lost nearly a tonne in weight – 932lbs or 66 stones. That is the same as 1 small car, 3 red telephone boxes or 103 domestic cats! Could you imagine them all running around the village! Four members have reached their Target weight - which was set by them and controlled by them. As a Consultant it is not my place to tell any potential

member what weight they 'should' be. It is entirely up to the individual what they feel their Personal Achievement Target is. On reaching Target they are all Lifetime Members of Slimming World - we guide them on how to stay at their Target and they can attend any group free of charge.

The numbers and facts speak for themselves but what do the Bampton members feel since beginning their journey with Slimming World? How have their lives changed? And is it something that everyone can do? I can answer whole heartedly that yes it is. Their lives are better, more improved and happy. I have the privilege of seeing my members change before my very eyes week by week and it is such a delight to witness someone's confidence grow, or see someone wearing a dress for the first time in years, or share how their family is enjoying Food Optimising without even feeling like they are on a diet! I can't think of a better way to fight back at the statistics of obesity in children than to start educating them in the home and family environment. Nicole Williams was a member who was apprehensive about the Plan

working in her lifestyle of baking and cooking homemade foods all the time. I advised her the alternative ingredients to more common ones, and to her delight, she has lost over a stone and says "as a mother of two the diet needed to fit in easily with my family and this I found very easy with Slimming World.

If I may, I would like to add a few observations and comments. One thing that has impressed me, and cannot be denied is the passion and loyalty of the representatives of each individual volunteer group. In one corner you have the Bush Club, who obviously want what is best for their members - cooking facilities, disabled toilets, a rest room with their particular heavy yet comfortable chairs along with a dining room. In another Corner you have the Youth Club that requires an area for playing games, a consulting room, a computer room as well as kitchen facilities to provide drinks. Plans have been put forward which in my opinion are brilliant, but it does mean that there will be areas to share and that is where the problems begin as you have both ends of the 'age' spectrum with their totally different attitudes to life. I do hope that a degree of tolerance will exist on both

sides so that a compromise can be reached. The Youth Service has indeed made some changes that hopefully will assist in there being a happy outcome. Added to all this, the Bampton Weightlifting Club, who have been providing by far the highest income for the old building, have got to be re-housed before anything can happen.
