Centre left & bottom: Lel Busby, my Mother (Mrs Helen Lester), and Ab Busby (taken, like the others by my Father, Albert Lester - known, in the inter-war years as 'Captain Lester'). Enjoying a summer drive to the countryside.

Centre right: John Lester (age 11 years, nine months) in the Busby's garden, the high wall of which (if still there) may help identify the house. We joined the Busby family at the local Harvest Festival service, which fixes the exact date of our 1938 visit.

The captions in quotes are from my boyhood photo album, fortunately identifying the year. There was one of Rosalie with me, among those regrettably missing from the album.

The prints were made with Hewlett Packard's own ink, which dries quickly, but I leave them out for a day to make sure they dry completely. I still have some proper straw-backed envelopes, which I used in the 60's, when I was a public relations consultant. I'll post them to you when next I go to the post office, to ensure they bear the correct postage - another burden we have to bear these days!

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
