YES! THE MOSIAC'S COMING TO TOWN

On 15 October 2001, £9,450, the bulk of the money needed for the completion of the Bampton Millennium Mosaic, was awarded to West Ox Arts by the Regional Arts Lottery Pro-

gramme.West Ox Arts initiated the idea of a pavement mosaic to celebrate Bampton in the year of the millennium 1999, and as well as pursuing this idea through the labyrinth of lottery application forms, contributing £1,000 towards it. Parish Bampton Council is also contributing £1,000, as well as having had the site re-paved. With the new notice board

and the seat round the tree, the whole area now looks so much smarter, and when the mosaic is installed next May, this will add the finishing touch to an area we can all be very proud of. Bampton people, including Bampton School, the Youth Club and the Bush Club, have all had the chance to take part in the creation of the mosaic, and those who attended Ros Wates' work-

shops in 2000 enjoyed the opportunity to find out about this art-form, and to work with a very knowledgeable artist.

West Ox Arts was allowed to keep the



remains of grants from phase I (from West Oxfordshire District Council) and phase II (from Awards for All). West Oxfordshire District Council has agreed to keep the mosaic clean, and

Oxfordshire County Council will insure and maintain the site. All this backup helped to persuade Southern Arts that this was a worthwhile project, and West Ox Arts will take future responsibility for the surveillance of the site.

The volunteers forming the Millennium Mosaic Project Committee are Ernest Rosengard (chairman), Ailsa Matheson (minute secretary), Angie Bell and Sally Proctor, with much help and advice from Hannah

Cervenka, W.O.D.C. Arts Development Officer.

This committee has found an artist, persuaded the various authorities, effected the project and dealt with the paperwork - have you **any** idea how much time and effort those last four words imply? Ernest knows only too well!!

All this has been done with the good-will of the West Ox Arts Management Committee, so that Bampton can have a piece of modern art in a centre site, to complement its historical beauty.

Ros will be holding 'drop-in sessions' in the Middle Room at the Town Hall on Tuesday 19th February, from 2–4.3pm., and 7-9pm and on Wednesday 20th February from 10am-12.30pm and 2-4.30pm. When you will be able to help make the actual mosaic!!

The mosiac will be unveiled on the Queen's Golden Jubilee Celebrations on Tuesday 4th June at 12 noon.

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Saving our Services

In the past two years Bampton has lost the Market Square Garage, Health Matters, Chennells - hairdresser, The Paper Shop, Taylor Associates - Financial Services. New 2 You closed in the summer but happily this has been taken over by Outerwear from Alvescot, a welcome addition to our dwindling number of shops. The Flower Mill is sadly the latest departure. How can we prevent more closures apart from the Parish Council's 'Use it or Lose it' campaign? The loss of the Jubilee Pub has certainly had a detrimental effect on the commercialheart of Bampton.

After nearly eight years on the District Council I have become convinced that building more and more houses has little or no effect on keeping services - although many more low-cost houses for local people are desperately needed here. The large housing developments which were built in the 70s & 80s did nothing to halt the closure of shops. The real answer lies in providing more jobs in Bampton which will keep local people here during the day and possibly bring in others to make use of such facilities as the Bank, the Post Office, shops and pubs.

Bampton is the largest village in West Oxfordshire which does not have a light industrial estate or Business Park. Should one be built to provide local jobs? Many people now run businesses from home and might like a small unit in a local business park as their business expands. There may be others in Bampton who would like to start up a business if premises were available. Do please let me know if you fit these categories.

In a survey recently West Oxfordshire

to advertise these? There is a great shortage of beds for visitors wanting to stay here and self-catering accommodation is much in demand. Bampton is an ideal place to stay on holiday for all age groups as it is within easy reach of so many tourist attractions -Oxford, Cheltenham, Bath, the Cotswolds and even London (thanks to excellent coach service from Oxford) - without being in any way a tourist trap. More first class accommodation would encourage visitors who would spend money in local shops and help keep the facilities for residents as well. Those who already have selfcatering cottages or B&B can testify to the number of enquiries they have and how many potential bookings have to be turned down. Farmers wanting to diversify and others with spare room might well be interested in

this type of business venture. The Tourism Officer at West Oxfordshire District Council would be happy to give advice.

I am convinced that providing jobs here and encouraging low-key tourism could be the answer to saving our services. As District Councillor I would be very interested to hear from anyone who has views on this subject and ideas for reversing the trend of shop/business closure. Golden Jubilee Plans

A very successful meeting took place to start planning Village celebrations for the Golden Jubilee on Tuesday 4th June next year. Most Bampton organisations were represented and the many suggestions included a special peel of bells to start the celebrations, a combined church service. 'Pub Lunches' at our five inns, traditional sports afternoon at the Recreation Field, early evening street parties in safe areas (organised on a self-help basis), and finally a grand barn dance in the Market Square. Additionally, prizes will be given to the bestdecorated private house and commercial building. More details later.

Bampton to Oxford Bus Service

Thames Travel has been again awarded to contract to continue their very good service between Bampton and Oxford. We will be encouraging them to put copies of the timetables at each of their pick-up points.

Please use this service or we may lose it!

West Oxfordshire Local Plan 2011

The Parish Council was pleased to note that the first draft of the local plan concentrates new housing developments in Witney, Carterton, Chipping Norton, and Woodstock, in order to meet the requirement of 6,750 new homes in the West Oxfordshire area before 2011.

Only infilling, or rounding-off would be allowed in Bampton, and there would be no outward expansion beyond the existing built-up areas. With nearly 30 new dwellings being built at the moment, we are already providing our share of the target.

Litter

Although a lot of your rates goes on the collection of litter from pavements

and footpaths, we seem to be fighting a losing battle if children continue to throw paper and cans all over the Village. Parents, please encourage your offspring to use the litter bins. Dog owners, please continue to use the dog bins — several owners of late have forgotten to do so.

Booster Packs for Mobile Phones

Orange approached the Parish Council earlier this year to ask whether we would allow them to put up 2 booster packs on the Town Hall to improve reception for mobile phones in the village. They offered a rent of some £2000 per year which would have helped to reduce the Parish rates. The Council were assured by Orange that the packs which, would be about the size of a burglar alarm, would be very low powered and the radiation, even if you could get close to them, would be no more than a 100w bulb next to your bedside. We agreed to proceed up to the planning stage but we also sought advice from an independent advisor. He agreed that although the power was indeed low, the long-term effects of such radiation were uncertain. At this point, and after listening to the concerns of several residents, the project has been dropped.

Changes on the Allotments

A committee has recently been formed from amongst the allotment holders to co-ordinate requests to the Parish Council for improvements to this valuable facility.

Marion Dowding, who is the Councillor responsible for allotments, chaired the initial meeting to set up the new arrangements, and she has been given £250 to fund a number of self-help projects at the site.

Wish List for RecreationField

The Council produced a 'wish list' of small projects that we hoped to complete in 2001 to improve the Recreation Ground even further. By careful management of the small budget, we have now introduced car park lighting, the complete repainting of the multisport, the relining of the tennis courts and the construction of 2 cricket practice nets. The resurfacing of the main entrance to the carpark, which suffered flood damage last winter, is underway. Market Square Mosaic

The Council congratulates WOA on getting lottery funding to enable them to proceed with the Bampton Mosaic, which will be positioned next to the circular seat in the Market Square. Work will start, we understand, in late spring.

LETTERS and E-MAILS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor

I have lived in Bampton all of my life, along with my parents, brother and sister. Most of my other relatives live in and around Bampton. Both my sets of grandparents and great grandparents lived in Bampton. Yet I have had to move out of the Village when I married, because there appears to be no support for young couples in Bampton who are trying to find somewhere to live.

In my quest to find accommodation other than with my parents I spoke to Mr Philips in January 2000 to see if he could help in any way. After checking our position on the council waiting list, Mr Philips told us that we were at the bottom of the list because we were a married couple, and I was not pregnant. I wonder if I was single and pregnant would I be higher up the

I married my fiancée in November 2000 in Bampton - a happy occasion attended by all of my local relatives as well as many other local people. We have a small 1-bedroom flat in Witney next to a bus stop. At first we thought the bus stop would be an advantage but it soon turned out not to be as the buses run all night. People who use the stop late at night are often noisy and use abusive language; and some seem to think it is fun to bang loudly on its sides and roof.

For this and other reasons, my husband and I decided that we would try and move back to my 'home' village of Bampton. However things were not that easy, house prices in Bampton are high and we could not get a mortgage big enough to allow us to buy even a small 1-bedroom flat.

In August 2001, The Bampton Beam published an article about new houses to be built behind the fire station for local people with local connections to the village. It said 'for further information contact Mr Philips', so I eagerly contacted Mr Philips and was told, "Go to the local council and show a keen interest and contact the people responsible for building the houses." After many trips down to the council offices on Church Green I

have almost given up hope. because each time I go to the housing department and enquire about new houses being built in Bampton, I

am told by the lady behind the counter "I don't know", and am handed some forms to fill in and update in case my circumstances have changed.

I also contacted the West Oxfordshire Citizens Housing Association who are building the houses. They were more helpful, and the lady at the end of the phone advised us to try for a part buy part rent house as we had a better chance of getting one of these houses than a flat from the council's social housing stock. I was sent forms from the West Oxfordshire Housing Association, which I filled in and sent back along with a letter asking for more information, as it became available. In less than a week I had received a reply telling me my information had been received and I had been added to their waiting lists and further details would be sent as they became avail-

To date, both my husband and I have filled in the same sets of forms for the local council over half a dozen times. yet not once have we received a reply from them to tell us that our information has been received, or any advice on the possibilities for a house in Bampton. We are still no further forward than when we first applied to the council in August 1999, and no one in the council seems willing or able to help us.

However, I'm sure the Oxford Library will be able to provide you with the titles of further books which may help. Hope this helps, and good luck with the hunting! 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


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Read On ...

A Challenge for the First Years of a

New Millennium

West Oxfordshire Citizen Advocacy (CITAD) is a registered charity giving support to citizen advocates throughout the district. A citizen advocate is someone who acts and speaks up on behalf of another person who, for one reason or another, is unable to do it for themselves. Those who cannot express their own needs and wishes may find themselves disregarded and not given the respect and consideration which the rest of us enjoy.

CITAD has worked for four years in West Oxfordshire and, with a continuation grant from the National Lottery, we are now set fair to expand our work in both short and long-term citizen advocacy into this new millennium.

How can you help?

You could become a volunteer citizen advocate. This involves regular meetings with a 'partner', initially to get to know that person sufficiently well to be able to represent them effectively in short or long term contexts as appropriate. Then to hear their concerns,

and speak up on their behalf and to help them obtain their basic rights as a member of society.

No prior qualifications are needed. All volunteer advocates are given initial preparation and information followed by ongoing support at all times from the CITAD co-ordinators.

An advocate can have a major impact on the quality of life of a person who up to now has been unable to express him or herself adequately and may even have been unaware that they have the right to make choices which most of us take for granted.

If we cannot speak up for ourselves others may think we have nothing to say. There are very many potential advocacy partners living in West Oxfordshire. At the start of this millennium you could bring real help and support to such a person. Witness Service Oxford Magistrates' Court

The Witness Service is part of Victim Support Oxfordshire, which is a charity set up to support victims of crime and their families in the community. The Witness Service has been set up to compliment the highly successful and important work of Victim Support. Research has shown that people who are supported whilst giving evidence are more likely to be able to cope with the experience and therefore give their evidence more effectively. It can often be a very daunting and sometimes frightening experience to attend court to give evidence and the Oxfordshire Magistrates' Court Witness Service aims to help witnesses, victims, their family and friends by providing a free and confidential service. We can arrange pre-trial visits to court and explain who sits where, where to stand when giving evidence, who to contact when entering the court building, and give more practical help with things like filling in claim forms and offering support once the trial has finished.

The Service is now in the process of recruiting volunteers to enable the service to be offered to all Magistrates Court in Oxfordshire. Volunteers are being sought from all sectors of the community. Training and support is given to ensure the service is carried out to a very high standard. Bampton Environmental Watch Group

The most significant news on the environmental front is the notification by West Oxfordshire District Council of the First Deposit Draft Review Local Plan 2011, for which comments were due by November 2nd. The Parish Council, BEWG, and The Society for the Protection of Bampton all supported it, particularly the fact that, contrary to previous local plans, Bampton has not been designated as an area for increased housing development. This is very fortunate recognition of the fact that the Village has already made a substantial contribution towards meeting the government target for increased housing in Oxfordshire. The next stage of the process will be the publication of comments on the draft plan, some of which may express opposition, particularly to the omission of Bampton from housing development.

More immediately, BEWG has been involved in some major planning issues, the most significant being the redevelopment of Moss Rose Cottage in the Buckland Road, which was a complex planning venture, with some unfortunate misunderstanding of the real situation. Now that it has been resolved, it should be clarified for 'Beam' readers, for the benefit of the developer, as well as for opponents of the scheme. The facts are these. An application was made for planning permission to replace an existing lean-to kitchen and garage, with a two-storey extension to front and side elevations, and the construction of a new detached double garage. BEWG and the Parish Council objected to this plan, and Ralph Norma, as Parish Councillor, met with the developer to explain the objections. As a result, an amended application was submitted and approved. When the work started on the building, the fabric of the cottage was revealed to be very fragile, and the developer felt it necessary to demolish the entire building, which he did while applying for retrospective planning permission to cover the change of plan. Retrospective planning permission is used when the situation demands it, the risk to the developer being that it may not be granted, and the structure would have to be taken down. In this case, retrospective planning permission was given, with the result being a virtually new building in lieu of an improved version of the original cottage. There was considerable criticism of this venture, but the developer was within his legal rights, and the Planning Department of the West Oxfordshire District Council supported his action. A less difficult problem was the proposal to build two residential units behind Home Farm in High Street, which evoked strong opposition because of its envisaged impact on Lavender Place flats. An amended application for one residential unit was approved, but the property changed hands, and the new owner altered his plans from a single residential unit, to the erection of a first-floor extension, and two, twostorey ancillary buildings, to house a double garage, swimming pool, plant room, play room, and covered area. There were also internal and external alterations to the east (front)

elevation of the house. All these were approved, on the understanding that the access gate to the property would be moved to reduce the intrusion into the area of lavender Place flats. We understand that the owner has met with the residents of the flats and made it clear that he does not want his proposed changes to be detrimental to his neighbours.

Finally, a happy outcome to an unpopular development. The application for the gravel extraction on the Lechlade Road, near Grafton – described at length in the August issue of the 'Beam' – has been withdrawn because of such strong opposition from a number of significant bodies and individuals – inter alia West Oxfordshire District Council, the Parish Councils of Bampton and Clanfield, BEWG, The Society for the Protection of Bampton, and a very large number of individual letters from residents of all of the communities likely to be adversely affected by the proposal.

Another environmental plus is the designation of The Cottage, Church Street, as a Grade II listed building. The open meeting in July, hosted by Jean Saunders, who gave a riveting, if very depressing, account of local GM crop trials, explaining all too lucidly the wide damage these specialised agricultural ventures wreak upon the natural environment, and describing the strong business interests that underlie, or back up, these experiments. Jean is a magnificent speaker and will be returning to an open meeting in 2002 to give her alternative environmental message – namely recycling rubbish

A different, but very interesting subject, was Julia Stubbs' lecture on otters and their re-emergence in the countryside. Our next talk will be after the AGM when Ray Borrett - a doughty BEWG member - will enlighten us all on footpaths. This valuable service goes on apace with useful information on footpath damage or misuse being provided by BEWG footpath walkers and members, and sometimes the population at large. These complaints or observations are passed to the Field Officer of Oxfordshire County Council and gratifyingly most of them are promptly investigated. It is heartening for the doughty walkers, braving the weather, to know that their efforts are appreciated, and serve a valuable purpose.

On November 24th BEWG hosted a Book Bash in the WOA gallery to celebrate four publications by BEWG authors – two were mentioned in the August issue of the 'Beam'. These relate to Bampton, being Bampton Folklore by John Blair, and Bampton, The Way it Was by Freda Bradley. Though the authors' approach their theme from different perspectives, both deal with the social history of Bampton, and complement each other quite remarkably. In addition to BEWG members, representatives of the groups mentioned in John Blair's book – namely The Mummers, Morris men, and Garlands - Ruth Shergold - were also invited, plus friends on both sides who had given specific help in producing the books, family members, and owners of the shops who had marketed the books. Also in evidence were books by other BEWG officers, Expanding the Girths, by Ralph and Ann Norman, Chairman and Secretary of BEWG respectively see the WOA page for further information. Finally, we have a very useful book by our Treasurer, Ray Proctor, entitled Managerial Accounting for Business Decisions. Although its title does not suggest high relevance to the environment, we all know that to preserve a good one always costs money!

BIKE PATH UP-DATE

As the Beam was going to press, we received the very disappointing news that we have NOT been awarded a grant from the Sport England Lottery. This is the only source of large scale funding available to us and although the group submitted a huge application in July, the size of the Yellow Pages, the decision went against us. This is a massive disappointment because the application was the culmination of three years work of fundraising and surveys and lobbying.

The reasons given for the refusal were as follows-:

- 1. Our proposed bike path would not have linked up with any existing bike path or any planned for the near future (we knew that; we merely wanted to be able cycle in safety away from Bampton's main roads and on to safer quieter roads in the vicinity).
- 2. Our proposed bike path might be seen as doing the work proposed by Oxfordshire County Council's Agenda 21 proposals (OCC is considering a route to Carterton but this is currently at least 3 vears away from even being assessed).
- 3. Because we received advice from Sustrans, the national bike path organisation, this may have used millennium money, which disqualifies us from receiving lottery
- 4. Bampton does not contain sufficient of Sport Lottery "target groups"; i.e. we do not have sufficient racial minorities, though we do have a proportion of the poor and needy, and women and girls (another "target group") would make up 50% of the users.

The Bike Path Group is now deciding what to do next. Unfortunately if we cannot finish our proposed bike path within the next two years we lose some of the grants we struggled to earn. The group is meeting after this issue of the 'Beam' goes to press, but in the next issue we will tell you what are future plans are in the face of this set-back.







Youth Club

The Youth Centre is, once again, facing financial problems that threaten its long-term future. Early last year we were able to report that Oxfordshire County Council had agreed to recommence limited funding so that, with rental income, and the generous support of the 250 Club, we were just

able to cover the basic outgoings of rent (to the same County Council), rates, electricity etc. Payments from the County Council were again suspended at the beginning of this year. and after months of uncertainty we have now been told that we shall receive only a little over half of last year's amount. On top of this, the District Council has reviewed the rebate that we receive on the rates, which has substantially increased our costs in this area. Despite all the rhetoric from on high, our impression is that the provision of services for the young people of Bampton does not command a high priority within the County Council and its officers.

On the positive side, the Youth Centre building has now been scheduled as a Listed Building and should, in theory, be protected against demolition or serious alteration. This was due to tireless work on the part of Tony and Liz Page - who are near neighbours of the Centre.

Until recently, the Youth Club was thriving but the regrettable departure of the leader for the younger people on Tuesday evening meetings and sickness of the Thursday evening leader have resulted in a period when neither group has been operating. We are now assured that a new leader has been appointed for Tuesday evenings, and hope that a full service will be resumed well before the end of the year. Anyone able to offer help as an organiser, or who is interested in joining as a member, should contact either Gary Gummer Tel: 851913 or Jo Melling at Carterton Allandale Centre Tel: 842416. There is, unfortunately, no news of the Scout Group recommencing activities. The problem still appears to be one of leaders, and anyone who can help in this respect should contact Phil Roberts (851267). Finally, a reminder that the Centre is a splendid place for social functions with good facilities, an attractive atmosphere and more than adequate parking space. The Centre has always been popular for wedding receptions,

Bampton 150 Years Ago

In the 1851 National Census the number of people in Bampton and Weald over the age of 15 was 1684 not much less than we have today which is 2000 on the electoral roll. Over 50% were employed in agriculture.

There were 19 stonemasons 15 Carpenters, 12 boot-makers, Coopers, glove Maker & chimney sweep. There were 27 farms. Ham court employed 27 workers and Haddon 32. 80 girls worked as servants in houses in the Parish. Bampton had 10 Public Houses in 1851 but a lot of the landlords had several jobs to earn their living. Mr Tom Spurrett, landlord of the Elephant & Castle was the town's only coal merchant and also kept a grocers shop. Even in 1851 more than one half of householders and their spouses were born outside the parish. By 1861 the population had grown to 1713 and then fell to 1167 by 1901. This was due to migration to the industrial midlands and to the colonies mainly Canada.

The above information has been taken from 'The Bampton we have Lost' by J.L. Hughes-Owens. With the kind permission of his family The Friends of St. Mary's are hoping to reprint the book. At present enquiries are being made to see whether it would be a financially viable proposition.


Looking back through previous issues of 'The Beam' it appears that my attitude is similar to the chap who became a Monk and joined a Monastery. He was allowed to speak to the Holy Father just once a year. After the first year he was invited to say his piece; he complained that his

room was too cold. The next year when invited to speak he complained about the food being terrible. The next year when the time came around for him to speak again he said, "I'm leaving". With that the Holy Father said "Thank Goodness for that, you've done nothing but moan since you've been here!" So I am going to do my best to stop moaning, but it will be hard, as Government Officials really know how to make life difficult for the Farmers.

What did you make of those scientists who were studying Sheep Brains for B.S.E., and together with the Government came to the conclusion that the whole of the UK's flock

of sheep would have to be slaughtered! Then after four years they realised that they were looking at COW brains by mistake! Why is it that people in Officialdom appear to have all the necessary educational qualifications, yet have absolutely no idea at ground level about the subject they are dealing with? We once had a man from the Ministry visit us and, on seeing three animals in the field enquired "Why have the black animal and the white animal got horns, and vet the brown one hasn't?" My brother took great delight in telling him that the black one was a British Friesian Cow and that they have horns, the white one was a Shorthorn Cow and they also have horns. And the reason that the Brown one hadn't got horns was because it was a HORSE!!!

Talking to a 'Horsie' friend the other day I was voicing my concern about horses on the roads, which I know is often a 'Beam' subject. Cows have been off the roads for years. Although back in the 1990s, Bampton people



travelling to Witney were often treated to the sight of 100 of my cows heading for the fields after milking. I travel some 60,000 miles a year yet I cannot remember the last time I saw a cow on the road. From a motorists point of view this is of course a good thing. Although I accept that there were cows and horses on our roads well before there were cars, it is still a big surprise to me, in this day and age, to be doing no more than the legal speed limit, go round a bend and be confronted by a pair of horses in the middle of the road. The road is not the best place for them. It is unsafe for them to gallop and get really fit, all they can do is walk or at best a gentle trot. Yet farmers in the area have acres of 'Set Aside' where both horse

and rider could get the wind in their hair and have fun and for a Small remuneration I'm sure everyone would be happy and safe. However, our farmers tell me that the Government would not allow it! Farmers are not allowed to make extra money out of 'Set Aside'. What a shame! One cannot put a price on safety!

According to the Government – and this is official - horses are not farm animals! What on earth do they think pulled the carts of yesteryear, heaven only knows. Perhaps you now will

believe my story about the man from the Ministry not knowing the difference between a horse and a cow!

Although it appears to the general public that the foot and mouth is now over, believe me it is not. Farmers still have to apply for movement licences. Vets must still inspect the animals before movement, and the animals have to be moved within 24 hours of the license being issued, or the whole process has to start all over again. Evidently it is possible to have an

Occupier's licence which allows you to move anything at any time, but with the amount of extra work that it entails it is

better to continue with the movement licence system.

There has been a petition going around for people to sign demanding that the Government holds a public enquiry into the whole foot and mouth debacle, and not one behind closed doors. If you feel that you would like to support this view, please get in touch with your local MP

I have just started to read the November issue of Private Eye! This month it identifies many of the cock-ups made by Government scientists and advisers. Did you know that there was a funeral pyre of over half a million sheep and yet not one of them was found to have the disease? There are so many questions that need answering in public. I do hope that farmers

get their way.

This year's planting season has gone extremely well with the crops looking better than I have seen them for years. Lets hope we don't have too harsh a winter to ruin things, although the main fear for farmers is that if the crops are that good, then the sale price of next year's corn could be as low as £56.00 per tonne. This year's prices are round about £64.00 per tonne about what they were back in the 1960s. To put things in perspective a Mini car in those days cost about £500.00. Therefore 9 tonnes of wheat. which needed about 4.5 acres to grow would have bought a top-of-the-range

At today's Super Mini prices you would need 180 tonnes, which with modern techniques, would need 53 acres to produce. No wonder my brother has taken to riding a bike!

For many years now successive

Governments have told farmers to diversify. Why farmers cannot be allowed to earn a living by doing what they do best, I just do not know, so diversification comes second nature to me. With my new role in life as a Private Hire driver, when the chance of a little diversification came along I grabbed it with both hands. With my colleague, who is also of farming stock, we set off in a farm pick-up truck to Hastings to transport a hive of bees to Long Hanborough. "Don't lose any we were told". "Well how fast can they fly", we asked, "so that they can keep up with us?" Halfway home we got out to see how they were doing, and to our shock-horror they were all clinging on to the outside of the hive! A quick phone call to the farmer (thank goodness for mobile phones), assured us that all would be well providing we kept going! Needless to say we did not hang about! Although the trip was successful, what worries me is, what if we had been stopped by the Police and one of the Bees were to have stung the Policeman, would we have been done for constructive

assault? Or would the Policeman have just told us to "Buzz Off!"

To all of you, who work the soil, gardener, smallholder and farmer, have a good Christmas and may next year be good to us all!

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THE COOKERY CORNER

Flavours of Provence

This column was inspired by a recent autumnal short break to Aix, which can be reached in six extremely civilised hours by train from Waterloo. With its narrow streets, bright vellow buildings and street life. along with the Mediterranean climate, it is a place that is rightly pleased with itself, and exudes comfortable but

unostentatious living. The locals clearly take their food seriously, and the thrice-weekly market was full of stalls offering a zillion types of saucisson; local olives and olive oil; the prized cep mushroom, where a good-sized specimen costs about £10 per kilo (by comparison, the last time I looked Carluccio's in Covent

Garden the were £18 per quarter!; the delicious brandade, which I've never had the patience to make but think I'd better start; vegetables of a quality only dreamed of here, and freshly caught fish and shellfish in abundance. Not to forget cheese, flowers, local honey and the local pastis. Provence has a cuisine all of its own - the famous bouillabaisse, for example, which purists say is simply not obtainable more than an hour's drive from Marseilles (something to do with the required rascasse and, I suspect, the climate, and the questionable quality of the local water!)

Ancholade

This classic Provence dish is wonder-

- 1 iar anchovies in oil
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 cloves garlic


pepper

raw vegetables, e.g. cauliflower, radishes, carrots, baby corn

Put the anchovies in a small pan with the crushed garlic, and warm until the anchovies have disintegrated. Add the oil a bit at a time until incorporated. Add pepper to taste. Put the sauce in ramekin dishes and surround with the vegetables, which are dipped into it. Serves four.

Boeuf en daube

The daube is Provence's answer to Burgundy's Bourguignon.



Bouquet garni of

thyme, parsley, tarragon, and a bay leaf, tied in a bun-

Heat the oil in a casserole or heavy pan. Season the meat and brown, a

few pieces at a time. Remove all but a light film of fat from the pan. Add the wine, bring to the boil, scrape in any browned bits and reduce until half the volume (7-10 minutes). Whisk in the mustard, and return beef plus accumulated juices to the pan. Add the tomatoes, onions, garlic and herbs, and simmer for 2-3 hours, until the meat is fork tender. Remove and discard the bouquet garni. Remove the beef, onions and tomatoes to a platter. Increase the heat and boil until reduced by a third (about 10 minutes). Return the solids to the casserole and reheat gently. It is a nice idea to serve the same wine as that used in the cooking.

Lemon Comfit

This recipe is not from Provence, but was gleaned from the chef of a French restaurant in Birmingham!


Quarter two lemons. Add 100gm sugar, and water to cover, and a halfteaspoon of five-spice powder. Warm until the sugar has dissolved and cook until done - that is until the lemons seem to have incorporated the sugar syrup and have a glazed appearance. You can serve as part of a plate of

lemon puddings - a mousse, jelly, some sorbet - or just on its own.

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The Gardening Page

Looking after house plants in December

If you're like me, watering my poor houseplants is a hit and miss affair. Either they are too dry or too wet. Finding just the right spot in the house for a plant is difficult. My rubber plant (which I inherited), after many years doing nothing, has suddenly taken on a new life in the conservatory, and I can't stop it growing now! This is what the experts have to say about it

With today's modern radiators, gas and electricity fires, plants have to try and survive in a much drier atmosphere than they like. Placing peat around the outside of the pot and keeping it moist does help with this problem. Another way is to put all your pots together into a trough or a fairly deep tray, packing peat all around the pots and keeping this peat moist at all times.

Window sills are one of the best places as plants receive light and moisture, but remember it does get cold at night so delicate plants may have to be removed to the centre of the room.

Turning the plants occasionally will help to prevent uneven growth, as we all know plants tend to grow to the

If you want your pot plants to be as healthy again this time next year, try this. When the new growth starts showing, tap the pot so it releases the plant, have a good look at the root ball, if it looks over-crowded re-pot to a larger size, otherwise put it back in its old pot, replacing the old compost with new.
