

The Graves

Most of the graves are on the west side of the church. There are very few really old ones, but on looking round we found one of 1500 with the next quite a lot later.

Some of the interesting ones are a sailor one, this is a cross with a stone chain wound round with an archor at the end. Another is in the shape of a windmill and a third is perhaps the

most interesting of all. It is a flat stone with sausages carved in it, with this goes the legend of a man who died eating mashed potatoes and sausage, Most of the graves are on the west side, there are many people still living in Bampton with the same sumame as on the graves, Names like Monk, Green, Rose T Townsend, Tanner, Fox and Stevens. The materials of the graves have not really changed, expexcept the col p of the stone.

The Faths The main path goes all the way round the igs church. Another leads to the road leading to the vicarage and the last follows alongside the wall on the north front. The Vicarage The Vicarage was completed only four years of ago in 1958. It is about 100 yards away from the church gate. The old Vicarage is just across the road


8 and is considered to be almost as old as the church. -1 This has a stained glass window in the hall.

The Manor and Deanery The Deanery, just across on the west side, or is older than the church. There are underground passages leading from the Deanery to the castle. The Manor further away from the church and is asold as the church but not as old as the Deanery.

Bampton Castle

Bamyton castle is about half a mile from the church, It has some walls which date back to the twelth century. There is supposed to be an underground turnel from the Church to the Deanery and from the Deanery to the castle but no body has ever found them.

The castle used to be called just Bampton

Castle, but now it is called Hampton Court.

The cemetery is about two hundred yards from the church yard. It was opened about one hundred and twenty years ago.

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
THE EXTERIOR OF THE CHURCH The windows There are many different kinds of windows including Geometrical, Perpendicular and Plate and Flowing tracery.

There are five stained windows, one in the Lady Chapel, above the Alter, in the Vicars room, in the childrens corner and one by the main

The south door is the only door with a

porch. The porch has notice boards either side of it the door, on the right is a place where a statue once stood and on the other side is a plate carved in the wall. This is of 1685. The porch has new cloors put there just over a year ago, in memory of William Tanner who died in 1934. All of the doors are of solid oak. The Steeple The steeple is 3 times as high as the

rest of the church which is roughly ft high.
There is a cock on the top of the steeple.

The bells.

There are nine bells and many bell-ringers the captain being MR. H. Bunce.

There are two clocks, these are very large and blue in colour. They strike on every hour and thine at five, nine and twelve o'clock, but rect in the night. These are different time each

day of the week.

INTERIOR OF THE CHURCH

The font is very old. It has a thick oak cover. It has patterns of flowers on each side, on each side the flowers are different. The font stands on a step, around the bottom is a pattern in red

- The pattern carried in the lower half of the font. As you go in the South door the font is on the left. It not very high.

There is a pattern carved in the sides with goes all the way round,

The Pulpit

The Pulpit was put in the church about eighteen months ago. This is made of wood. Before this was put there there was a beautiful old stone pulpit.

Hs you stand in the Nave the pulpit is on the right at the top. When the Vicar preaches the serman he has to go right around the front of the pulpit to get in it.

The children's corner

When you stand in front of the pulpit facing the pews the children's corner is on the left. This was made about thirty years ago by the children of Bampton.

Up by the Alter are two stained windows, one behind and one to the right of it. Behind the Atter is a beautiful carving of Jesus and his Disciples. On the right are three chairs carried in the wall. Up by the Alter are two very old wooden chairs. In front of the Alter is a blue and yellow mat put there in memory of Mr. & Mrs Green, who served the Church for a long time, by their

The organ is about thirty feet high. It has a curtain in front of it which has been there a long time. The top of the organ is colorineal gold

the walls of the Church are made in rows of bricks in a scale like fashion.


The pattern can be seen clearly from the

The pews are all made of oak, there are three rouss of them.

There is a new floor which was put down about three years ago. The path floor is of stone all down the Nave and the aisles and of wood underneath the pews. The wooden part is the new part the stone floor being very old.

Just inside the South about is a very old burred wood money box. In this is placed the offenings for the upkeep of the Church.



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
LOCALITY

The Alter is at the east of the Church. The organ and the vestry are in the south transept while the Lady Chapel and the Vicar's room are in the North transept. The font is on the left as you go in the South door.

The church is at the north end of Bampton, all of the houses surrounding the church are also very old. These include, the old vicarage, church gate and kilmore, St. Stephens (a Kindergarten), The Manor and the olde grammar school, and the Deanery. Weald Manor, by the castle, is also very old.

The olde Grammar school has not been used as a school for a long time. It is now used

as a place for meetings and badminton. It is is also used for the old age pensioners meetings. This used to be the local grammar school, on the wall there is the badge carried in the stone. Inside are dates scratched on the wall, there is one which dates back to about 1539.
