Tuesdays-Saturdays 10.30am-12.30pm, 2-4pm, Sundays 2-4pm. Until January 25, Four Painters Argue it out: Keith Allen, Felicity McCormack, Jonathan Gooders and Sue Powell, who all followed the fine arts degree course at Cheltenham College of Art, present work done since leaving college.

Four Painters: Bampton



Four young artists who all studied art at Cheltenham College have got together to display their work at Bampton Town Hall.

Despite the fact they shared the same tutors, their work, which they have put together under the title Four Painters Argue It Out, couldn't be more different.

Keith Allen is striving to create something he has come to consider as "resistance"; he says his work is abstract but not abstracted from experience. They are huge canvases, in which colours appear to fight each other for position. I am glad he explained them to me, for I was struggling to come to terms with his bold slashes of colour initially.

By complete contrast, Sue Powell, whose work has been influenced by Vermeer, uses tone and colour to create form. Her works are striking, dramatic and superbly executed in oils, with five studies of faces and hands worked in charcoal. The faces suggest more than a class room exercise – indeed one exposes such a distressing amount of pain that it stands out quite dramatically.

Working in charcoal and oils, Felicity Cormack expresses herself on canvas by

making the folds of fabric her central theme. Her paintings are dramatic and compelling, spoiled only by heavy wooden frames which do not balance well with the work they contain.

Jonathan Gooders's three untitled works are landscapes, but display very few trees, for he is making a statement about the way the natural world relates with the man-made. With the sky the dominant factor in each picture, Jonathan's work is certainly thought provoking.

It's always interesting to see the work of young artists, then watch it evolve over the years. For that reason alone, this excellent exhibition is well worth a visit if you are in the Bampton area up to and including January 25.
