BAMPTON FIRE AND RESCUE STATION Needs YOU!

Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service has 24 Fire Stations, with 35 operational Fire Appliances, 29 of which are crewed by retained fire fighters. One of these stations is A12 Bampton, located on New Road. This is the first responding fire engine to Bampton

and the surrounding area, including Carterton, Aston, Alvescot, and villages as far away as Little Farringdon. During 2003 we received just under 200 calls, and for the majority of these we returned to the station within an hour.

Bampton is crewed by just 7 fire fighters, 2 crew commanders and 1 Watch Manager who all provide different hours of availability, which suits them and the fire service - they are not required to be available 24 hours a day! They may re-

spond from home or work upon activation of a pager they carry, being alerted by our control room

in Kidlington. They may be builders, shop keepers, office workers, technicians, mums or dads, but when a call comes they all become part of a dedicated team, ready to face any emergency. They may be 'part time', but they are highly trained and capable people, working in the front line, saving lives and occasionally making headline news!

Upon receipt of a call they are required to get to the fire station within 5 minutes. They could be responding to anything, including road traffic accidents; fires, chemical spills; trapped animals; river rescues; aircraft incidents; and are even trained to deal with terrorist attacks. They get paid for every call they respond to. Competent fire fighters now get paid the

following rates.

An annual retainer fee of £1738 on limited cover a week - anything under 120 hours - and £2318 if they offer 120 hours or more a week.

£13.73 per call they attend and then £10.58 an hour after the first hour.

£21.16 per drill - this is weekly and lasts two hours.

£10.58 per hour for any other additional activities and duties carried out, such as equipment checks and testing. They also receive holiday pay, loss of earnings or hourly pay for any training courses they attend. On average they can take home anything from £250 to £700 per month, depending on the number of calls.

At Bampton during the day we are extremely short of retained fire fighters, which means the fire engine is not always available, causing delays whilst an engine responds from a another station. This situation is putting

LIVES AT RISK.

Bampton's fire engine was unavailable for over 500 hours last year in the daytime, due to the fire fighter shortage. The problem is set to get worse as house prices are forcing one of our fire fighters to leave the village, and another experienced fire fighter is moving out the area, leaving us with a crew of only 8 - a minimum of four people are required for the fire engine to be able to respond in an incident. The fire station has been in the

> village for over a hundred years, and once lost we will never get it back. Men and

Bampton Market Square Phase 2 Improvements

We can only hope that the Market Square will cease to be used as a 'Rat Run' and that road users will reduce their speed when travelling through the square.

Finally, we would ask the young skateboarders to refrain from using the Market Square as a skate park! We have an excellent facility only a few hundred yards away – it really wasn't the reason the refurbishment was carried out!

BAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

100 New Houses now Unlikely

WODC have decided to ask the Inspector to delete the proposal for 100 new houses from the local plan. They will suggest that only 25-30 affordable homes are built on the site. WODC have now informed us that this important change will be advertised for public comment before the inquiry begins in mid Summer 2004. The public consultation will take place in May/June 2004 and anyone interested in the fine details can find more information on www.westoxon.gov.uk

Survey for Affordable Housing

All Bampton households received a survey form last December not only so that your Council has a clear idea of your views on affordable housing but also whether you have anyone in your family who is in urgent need of such accommodation. Nearly 500 forms were returned, which is a great response and the results are summarised elsewhere in this edition.

Traffic Calming

Please refer to the article from Fred Gray. An initiative from the Parish Council solved the technical problem associated with the installation of a Buildout on the Buckland Road, and it would now appear that the Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) has also approved the installation of this Buildout, as well as the three others on the Aston, Clanfield, and Station Roads. Good news for the Village.

State of Roads

OCC Highways have been informed of the many potholes that have appeared in Bampton roads during recent months. We await the repairs.

Poor Drainage Outside Surgery

We still await action from OCC Highways to construct a drain for the road that runs by the surgery. When the pavement was constructed some years ago, no drainage was planned and so large puddles collect on the road. Vehicles then soak patients on their way

to and from the surgery. While it has taken some time, we understand now that Highways have it on their agenda to fix, although they have not yet decided quite how to do it. We will watch it closely.

Bid for Parking Bays

A bid by residents around Mill Green for parking bays to be built on the north side of the main road has been supported by the Parish Council but only provided OCC Highways foots the bill. At present residents park on the muddy area that has become an eyesore.

Market Square Improvements

The project to improve many aspects of the Market Square is virtually complete. We await 3 new seats and a bus shelter next to the Village Hall. Floodlighting options are also being examined.

The Parish Council is most grateful to WODC for all their massive support during this project and also to Graham Haslam who has been our Project Officer.

New Councillor

The Council welcomed Anna Pitt as a replacement for Barry Gray who resigned recently through pressure of work. Anna, who was brought up as a child in Bampton, was instrumental in the setting up of the Village College concept in Bampton a few years ago. She now lives with her family in their house on Mount Owen.

Revamp of Play Parks

Two roundabouts in the playparks will have to be removed as a result of vandalism to the standing surfaces. Holes about 5 inches in diameter have been made and the danger of children damaging their ankles is very real. Attempts to repair the holes have been unsuccessful and so they will be replaced by new play equipment. We have been asked to provide more units for the under 5s and this gives us the opportunity. **Anna Pitt Tel: 850226** would welcome any suggestions for improving either playpark.

Parish Rates 2004/05

Your Council is delighted to announce that for the second year running there will be no increase in the Parish Rates, not even for inflation. By using local labour wherever possible for various projects and not incurring huge bills that outside firms may have charged, we have managed to keep expenditure to sensible levels. The bad news, however, is that two of the other parts to your Council Tax i.e. WODC and OCC rates, are both likely to increase for 2004/05.

Future of RAF Bampton Castle

After over 40 years of huge aerials to the south of Bampton, we have been told by a spokesman from Brize Norton that the whole area will become a 'greenfield site' by end March 2004. Most of the tall aerials have been removed and only a few small ones remain for training purposes. We understand that any land owned by the RAF will be offered first to the farmers who released it in the first place. End of an era but few regrets I suspect from those who have protested about the large aerials.

Broadband in Bampton

The Council has heard that BT has received the requisite number of interested residents for the exchange to be upgraded for Broadband. Simon Hayler who has masterminded this venture has been told that the upgrade will take place on 16th February. Bampton residents, who want Broadband, should then approach their preferred Broadband Internet Service Provider and place an order. Firework Display Profit

Congratulations to all concerned with the organising of the firework display for making over £3000 towards charity. This was a high risk venture which turned out to be most successful. Very well done to the organising committee. We understand that our local Fire Service followed up the above success by raising £4000 for the Children in Need collection

shortly afterwards.

Recycling

From Tuesday, 6th April followed by Thursday, 15th April and thereafter every Wednesday there will be a **weekly** collection for recycling together with the normal wheelie bin. Plastics, cardboard, aerosols and batteries will be collected in addition to the existing collection of paper, glass, cans, aluminium foil and textiles.

By now you should have received an additional recycling box and a recycling booklet from WODC.

Please make good use of this facility and help West Oxfordshire to reach its target of recycling 18 % by 2005/6 – at present it is 12% - and by 2010 it should be 30%.

District Council Housing Needs Survey

This will now take place in May this year and will give WODC an up to date need for affordable housing particularly for those who live here and who have a Bampton connection. Each household in Bampton will be written to with the questionnaire. Please complete it and return it to WODC in the pre-paid envelope.

The Parish Council survey carried out in December/January has revealed the need for affordable housing with demand from 43 close family members and 53 members of existing households. These figures include those overcrowded and needing a larger house.

Parish Council, Affordable Housing Needs Survey

Included with the last edition of the 'Beam' you received a copy of an Affordable Housing survey form from the Parish Council. The aim of the survey was to obtain a true picture of the needs and views of Bampton people in respect of Affordable Housing. Approximately 1,100 forms were sent out and I am pleased to report that we had a 43% response with 468 forms returned to the Parish Council by Bampton families. 455 of these forms have been included in the survey results, the other 13 deemed "spoiled" in some way that made them unusable (although surprisingly a rather mauled form, accompanied by an apology that it had been "eaten by the dog", proved to be still OK).

The Parish Council would like to thank all of you who took the time and trouble to complete and return your form. These are providing us with much useful information, giving us a clearer understanding of the true requirements for Affordable Housing in Bampton. A copy of the survey results is to be sent to WODC, who will be following up our survey with a more detailed questionnaire for completion by those families with a specific housing need.

The Parish Council Affordable Housing Sub-committee is now analysing the results and their implications in detail, but I am able to give you below a summary of the main figures that we have been able to extract from the information that you provided.

Housing need:

53 families already living in Bampton said they needed Affordable Housing here. This was split between: 22 families where one or more family members needed to move out into their own separate accommodation, and: 31 families where the complete family group required a new affordable dwelling (presumably their requirement is for a transfer to alternative accommodation e.g. a larger, cheaper or in some other way improved dwelling, releasing their current accommodation).

A further 43 families living outside Bampton (but with a Bampton connection) were identified as wanting Affordable Housing in Bampton.

These requirements should be clarified by the more detailed and specific questionnaire from WODC but on the face of it there appears to be a requirement for at least 65 new affordable dwellings (53 plus 43 less 31 possibly existing dwellings released by transfers).

The numbers of bedrooms requested (excluding the 31 families presumed to want a transfer, but including those currently living outside Bampton) were:

13 - 1 bedroom; 39 - 2 bedrooms; 13 - 3 bedrooms.

The numbers of bedrooms requested by the 31 presumed to be transfers were:

4-1 bedroom; 14-2 bedrooms; 12-3 bedrooms; 1-4 bedrooms.

Views on building new Affordable Housing:

342 (75.2%) in favour only for those with a Bampton connection; 42 (9.2%) in favour for anyone; 71 (15.6%) not in favour of any at all.

Views on maximum single site:

327 (71.9%) are in favour of sites of 30 dwellings or less; of which 287 (63.1%) want 20 or less; of which 220 (48.4%) want only 10 or less.

While at either end of the range we have:

71 (15.6%) not in favour of any building at all; 37 (8.1%) in favour of more than 50.

Concluding thoughts:

If, like the majority of people, you are turned off by these statistics, the main points that the survey indicates are: It appears that at least 65 new Affordable dwellings may be required to meet the needs expressed in the survey by people with a Bampton connection.

The majority of people want only small sites, with half in favour of only 10 or less dwellings per site. There is little support for sites exceeding 50 dwellings, implying very little support for a site like the 100 dwellings that have been proposed for New Road.

The vast majority want any new Affordable Housing site built to give priority to people in housing need with a Bampton connection.

Things Never Change do they!

A article out of 'The News Chronicle' 1935 'Cottages at 3/- a Week'

Plans for a new attempt to overcome the shortage of cheap and sanitary cottages for agriculture cottages for agriculture workers are contained in a Housing Bill to be introduced by Sir Kingsley Wood, Minister of Health, this season.

The Bill, the News Chronicle understands swill include provision of a subsidy to local authorities t provide cottages at a rent of 3s. a week exclusive of rates.

It is believed that the subsidy will be provided for a period of five years and that it will be assimilated with that available for the relief of overcrowding among the agricultural population. A further provision will be made for a similar subsidy, payable annually over a period of years, for farmers and others who are prepared to build cottages for farm workers according to approved rent scales.

Policy that failed

All previous Housing Acts concerning rural housing have merely provided financial assistance for restoration of crumbling cottages in proven cases of overcrowding.

No direct Exchequer contribution has so far been available for local authorities to provide new houses to meet general needs.

The result of this policy which Sir Kingsley Wood admits has failed.

That out of some 3,000,000 new houses of all types built since the war only about 20,000 extra houses have been built to meet new needs as distinct from replacements for agricultural workers.

Unable to Marry

Yet as far back as 1913 the Land Inquiry Report declared that at least 120,000 new cottages were needed for rural workers.

Consequently agricultural workers the country over are crying out for decent houses at rents they can afford to pay. In many distri8cts young couples have been prevented from getting married through lack of cottages

POLICE REPORT FOR 2003

At the beginning of this year, Thames Valley Police introduced a new single telephone number for all non-emergency calls. Members of the public are now able to contact the Police with their day to day enquiries by dialling 0845 8 505 505. This new number gives you 24 hour access to the Thames Valley Police Enquiry Centres, with teams of trained operators able to help or forward your call to the right department. They will also provide a round the clock crime recording service which will help free up officers to be out and about in the community. The number will be charged at the local call rate and it was chosen in the hope that it will be memorable with the last six digits spelling SOS - SOS. For a long time members of the public haven't been sure about what is the best way to contact the Police when it's not an emergency. Now I can make it absolutely clear - call '999' if there is a threat to life or limb, or a crime 'in progress' and 0845 8 505 505 for everything else which is a genuine police matter.

Between 1st January and the 31st December 2003 a total of 162 crimes were recorded in Bampton. Now I know that might sound a lot, but in reality, that equates to only 3 incidents a week and the vast majority of them being of a very minor nature, with a fair few being of a 'domestic' nature. The breakdown of this figure is as follows:

Despite these figures we still live in a very low crime rate area, as I am sure any insurance company will inform you. However, I will impart one piece of very relevant crime prevention advice, and that is, take a look at where you currently keep your house and car keys. Are they anywhere near your front door? If so, a current trend amongst burglars and car thieves is to fish out your keys through you letterbox then obviously giving them access to both your house and vehicles. A simple remedy, keep them away from the door.

By far the majority of complaints I receive from Bampton residents concern the behaviour of the local youth. Anti social behaviour amongst the young seems to be our biggest bug-bare, a problem I can't deal with alone. I have two requests; firstly, parents, you can help by educating your children on what is and what isn't acceptable behaviour in public? And secondly, you the residents, if you see anyone misbehaving, causing damage or even suspicions of drug abuse, then please report them, so that I can bring them to book.

Whilst we are on the subject of drugs, there seems to be an increase in cannabis use by local teenagers in the village, some of whom were caught last year and subsequently paid a visit to Witney Police Station. Despite many attempts to point out the dangers of using cannabis, the old adage 'old head and young shoulders' always springs to mind. Many I speak to are under the misapprehension that the recent down grading of cannabis as a drug makes it virtually legal. Take it from me, that is most definitely not the case, and those found in possession of it are just as liable to arrest as before. Now I'm not so naive as to believe youngsters aren't going to try these things, the same as I tried cigarettes (which I didn't take to), and alcohol, as a young teenager myself. Apart from the obvious health implications, problems arise when this drug abuse results in anti social behaviour and the accessibility of these substances to the younger generation. Again I ask for your help in combating this problem. Any information will be dealt with in strictest confidence.



Let me start by saying I am not against the motor car in spite of my work towards a safe cycle path and the fact that I may frequently be seen around the village on my bike.

However I am against the car being allowed to dominate the verges of Bampton. I believe the Parish Council is planning to take up some of the verges in Broad Street and Bridge Street for hard surfacing for car parking. I wish to say that I am very much against this solution. Creating new parking spaces, benefits solely the owner of the car which parks there.

The look of well kept verges benefits the whole of the village. You have only to look at Alvescot at this time of the year to see what a pleasurable impression the verges of a village can be

We have two problems in Bampton as far as traffic is concerned, one is parking on the verges even on the daffodils that are planted there. The other is speeding traffic through the village.

IF cars were encouraged to park on the road instead of on the verges, this would be very effective at calming traffic. If you look outside Emmies Newsagents, you will notice that cars parked there are very effective at slowing traffic. If you are familiar with Eynsham's main street, it is impossible to speed through there because of the cars being parked there. Goring and Streatley on the other side of Oxfordshire, have a similar solution

Once again there is so much to tell you about what's been going on at Bampton Primary School since the last issue of The Bampton Beam.

Firstly, although it seems like it was a long time ago, we must talk about Christmas. The Key Stage 1 concert was an adaptation of the nativity theme in a play called Whoopsadaisy Angel. It's always marvellous to see the very youngest children perform so bravely on a stage in front of so many parents and friends. Well done to you all and to the staff who work so hard to pull the event together.

The older children from Key Stage 2 performed The Stable Story in St. Mary's church. We had acting, singing and dancing to entertain us. Again it's great to see such an array of talent and thanks to the children and the staff involved in this production.

Still on the theme of Christmas many thanks to all the people at FOBS for their superb fundraising efforts, particularly the bazaar and the carol singing.

Moving on to 2004, Mrs. Newman's class of year 5 and year 6 children made the annual visit to Yenworthy, Oxfordshire County Council's residential outward bound centre based on Exmoor. Leaving school early Monday morning and returning Friday evening, everybody spent their time in between going on moor walks, orienteering, completing assault courses, abseiling and zip wiring, amongst other things. Everybody worked very well together and the children were thrilled with all their achievements.

Meanwhile we had International Week. Teachers from Spain, Germany and the Netherlands visited for a few days in January. During their stay they had tours around Bampton and the School, spent a day planning a joint project and visited Oxford. The project will be submitted to the British Council in September and if approved it will run for a three year period under the title of 'Life in our School and Town'.

Then there was Health and Fitness

Week, which ran from February 5th to the 13th .Miss Copping organised an action packed week of energetic activities. These included a skipping day, netball matches, introductions to hockey and cricket, boys' and girls' football and fun runs around the playing fields, along with other related events such as guidance on healthy eating and first aid. Thanks to all who helped out with the events and turned out to support them.

The historical theme has also continued this term, as you may have noticed if you have recently visited the Bampton Museum in the Robert Vesey Room at the Library. This time the project centred on the First World War and the contributions Bamptonians made during it. The children completed worksheets which encouraged them to take an interest in events of that time. Many thanks to the staff at the museum for the assistance they gave to the children.

A couple of other items to finish with. Firstly, many congratulations to the School Council who have won an award of £2,000 from BT. To win this, they submitted a project called 'Better Talk for Better Times' which was to do with PSHE and Citizenship to improve their playtimes. The money will go towards training adults and children in mediating skills and

building a trim trail.

Secondly, Oxfordshire County Council has changed its admissions policy with effect from September 2004 Until now the County Council policy has been to take reception children into school part time the term in which they are 5 years old. From September 2004 this will change so that children will be offered a part time place in the September of the year in which they turn five. The School's policy was to offer to take reception children into school full time the term in which they are 5 (i.e. rising 5's). This policy will now be enhanced as fol-

To continue our present policy for rising 5's and offer full time places in September 2004 for autumn starters and offer part time places (a.m.) in September for those that would have been spring and summer starters. As children become rising 5's we would continue to offer them full time places.

BAMPTON YOUTH CENTRE

A fund raising exercise is now in process to raise the sum of £12,000 needed for a new gas-fired convector heating system for the main hall of the Centre. The aim of the project is to provide a comfortable environment for those using the premises - either for youth activities or by rental for social purposes. We have already received substantial assistance from the Parish Council and from the Welfare Trust and, together with what can be allocated from the Centre's own reserves; the amount already available stands at approximately 30% of the total required. Approaches have also been made to a number of local charitable concerns but it will not be until towards the middle of the year that the outcome of these contacts will be known. The aim is for the installation to be carried out in the third quarter of this year so that the new system will be in operation for next winter.

A serious problem has developed during the last few months with regard to the very successful Tuesday Junior Youth Club, which caters for young people of 11 – 13 years of age. One of the youth workers for the club is already funded by the Parish Council but two workers are required and the-

County Council have indicated that they will not support clubs for those below 13. The local county youth service organiser is attempting to obtain funding from commercial sponsors and the Parish Council has, kindly, offered further help but it is now certain that the junior club will have to be suspended until financial matters can be sorted out and the best that can be hoped for is that it may be possible to restart in September.

Matters have been made worse by the difficulty of obtaining volunteer youth workers to assist in supervision and anyone willing to help should make contact with Shelley Vaisey (842416). Shelley will also be happy to deal with enquiries regarding the Senior Club, which operates on Thursday evenings.

It will be well known that the Centre is available for rental at times when the youth clubs are not operating and the main hall of this attractive old building offers a pleasant atmospheric venue for dances and social gatherings of all types. Jill Ruck (852010) will always be happy to provide information and to take bookings.

The Centre's annual general meeting will take place on Tuesday 27th April and all residents of the village are welcome. For any further information or for general enquires, please contact Colin Allport Tel: 850411.

Bampton Traffic

By Sue Helm Residents for Action on Traffic

Increased numbers and size of heavy goods vehicles Unacceptable speeding Rat running Road safety

These were the main concerns of those responding to a short pilot survey on attitudes to traffic in Bampton. RAT (Residents for Action on Traffic) has been formed to represent those who are concerned about these

A high percentage of returns for the survey showed that there arc major concerns with traffic and its effects on life in what is essentially a rural community. Consequently RAT has been working hard in the background - on Bampton's behalf - for over a year.

With expanding housing developments in areas close to Bampton, and corresponding predicted increases in local and national traffic volumes it is essential that traffic issues be addressed with greater scrutiny than ever before.

Between major strategic road links, Bampton is in danger of becoming a more useful route for HGVs, whilst the closure of RAF Lyneham and relocation of its activities to RAF Brize Norton will probably result in more commuters.

No one would wish to prevent legitimate deliveries or commerce within the village, however the way in which traffic behaves within Bampton undeniably influences village life for us

RAT does not aim to stop drivers using our roads, but asks them to respect the community by obeying speed limits and respecting the safety of both pedestrians and other drivers. In other words we are guided by - and share the aims of - national bodies such as the established 'Transport 2000', which has developed an excellent approach to these issues.

The Parish Council has achieved some successes in cutting speeds and improving driver behaviour using painted calming methods, and has been successful in getting the OCC to agree to install buildouts at the entrances of the four main roads coming into the Village.

RAT is keen to work with the Parish Council to ensure that this work continues and has also lobbied the County Council on your behalf regarding many issues.

RAT is concerned to note that despite requests from the Parish Council and RAT, the present calming scheme has not been refurbished by the County Council.

We also note that many Oxfordshire Villages and roads are being supplied with updated calming measures, the most notable in the area being Long Hanborough. We would like to redress this imbalance.

To this end a questionnaire is enclosed with this copy of The Beam. We would be most grateful if you could take a little time to fill it in and return it by 20th April to Cotton Club or Temples.

Even if you responded to the original survey it would be useful if you could also respond to this one too, so that we can get the broadest possible pic-

RAT is also arranging a 'Day of Action' following the successful and well-reported day last year. Following Police guidelines on what is permissible we aim to be present on several roads to bring our message to the attention of all users.

The next day of action is planned to take place on April 26th 2004. Please do your best to attend. We will meet in the Market Square at 8am.

We hope to publish the survey results in the next issue of The Beam. Thank you for your time. We look forward to hearing from you.

Road and Traffic Issues

Elsewhere in this edition of 'The Beam' you will find an article from 'RAT' — Residents for Action on Traffic — and a questionnaire, which we would all appreciate you filling in so that we can find out your views on traffic issues within the Village.

Please fill it in whether you support or do not support the various traffic calming measures listed in the questionnaire, as this will be valuable information to gauge the strength of feeling on the issue.

While the RAT article covers what the concerns of RAT are, it was thought beneficial to accompany it with an article on what the Parish Council's policies and plans are on traffic issues; this with a view to helping you all to fill in the questionnaire, and of course to hopefully enlighten you as to what your Parish Council is trying to achieve on road and traffic issues.

There are two main issues which the Parish Council is addressing at the moment, viz., speed of traffic, and the increasing use of the Village roads by HGVs.

Speeding

Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) Highways Department conducted a traffic (speed) survey for us in late 2002. What the survey found was that Bampton does have a traffic problem in terms of vehicle speed at the extremities of the Village, but does not have a major problem within the Village itself – some motorists were found to be speeding, but the majority were within the speed limit. These results have recently been verified by a survey by 'Speedwatch'.

On the basis of the survey, the Parish Council requested the OCC to install 'Buildouts' (Chicanes) on the four main roads leading into the Village, in order to slow down incoming traffic—the experience with Buildouts is that once the traffic has been slowed down, it generally does not speed up again (although you will always get some drivers speeding no matter what you put in their way!).

The Buildouts have now been ap-

proved by the OCC, and the detailed design has been sanctioned. Funding for them has not yet been cleared, but the Parish Council is hopeful that the OCC's 2004-2005 budget will include the funding.

In the meantime, discussions have also been held with Speedwatch and the Police to review what other measures might be considered to tackle the drivers who break the speed limit within the village, and consideration is being given to the ad hoc use of temporary mobile speed cameras, speed warning devices, posters, etc.; and perhaps additional road markings. It has to be stressed that the surveys mentioned above found that only a relatively small proportion of drivers were speeding within the Village limits. As such, the Parish Council wants to target these drivers with appropriate measures to try and get them to reduce their speed, rather than to attack the issue by the wholesale use of major permanent traffic calming measures, such as Buildouts and/or speed humps, within the Village itself. Such measures, if employed, would have a major detrimental impact on the character of the village streetscene, and the Parish Council does not believe that the Villagers want Bampton to be turned into another Long Hanborough with its plethora of traffic calming devices. An additional concern of the Parish

Council in employing traffic calming measures is that it is very conscious of the need not to put too many obstacles in the way of the car driver who uses the Village for shopping. Bampton, for its size, boasts an excellent array of shops. It also has a bank and a post office, and they are well used by people from the surrounding villages such as Clanfield, Alvescot, Black Bourton, Aston, Buckland, Brize Norton, Curbridge and Lew, as well as the Villagers themselves. The Parish Council wants people from surrounding villages to continue to come to Bampton to do their shopping and to feel that they are welcome in the Village.

Hence the Parish Council's policy of using appropriate traffic calming measures to try to ensure that the approach on the issue is balanced and proportionate to the scale of the problem, and that the commerce of the village is not negatively impacted by any of the measures taken.

HGVs

On the HGV situation, a key issue is that some HGV drivers are using the Buckland Road-Bampton-A4095 route as a 'rat-run' to go between the A420 and the A40 - instead of using the A415 via Standlake. Discussions have taken place with the OCC to try and have the Buckland Road declared 'Unsuitable for HGVs', and the appropriate signs put up, but so far all that has been achieved is the installation of signs warning of the dangers of 'Grounding', which are having no impact on HGV drivers at all as far as can be determined. This is being followed up in the hope that the OCC can be convinced of the need to declare the Buckland Road as 'Unsuitable for HGVs', even though it is understood that such signs are not 'mandatory' but 'advisory'.

Notwithstanding the lack of success here with the OCC, letters have been written to companies whose HGVs have been seen using Bampton as a rat-run, and some success has been achieved, with one or two companies (notably Smurfitt) advising that they would be advising their drivers to use other routes – as long as driver working hours were not at risk of being breached.

In addition, letters have also been sent to local firms whose heavy vehicles use Bampton's roads regularly, and whose drivers had been seen speeding. Positive action has been taken by those firms – for example Watson – and it has been noticeable that these drivers do now tend to respect the speed limit within the Village.

Although the Parish Council has two main priorities at the moment in terms of the speed and HGV issues, there are other traffic issues being looked, such as the need (or not) for Pedestrian Crossings in the Village, and the problems of car parking.

Pedestrian Crossings

The crossings at first seemed easy to resolve; just find out where you want

to put one, obtain the Villagers agreement, and arrange finance! However, it is not as easy as that. As far as is understood, such crossings need 'noparking' zones each side - around 30 metres either side - which would increase the parking problems we already have; and there are also issues over distances from road junctions etc. Further work will be required before we know whether we can install pedestrian crossings, and where; and of course we then have to ask the question "do the Villagers want them?"

Car Parking

Car parking can be a contentious issue, and even more so when the grass verges along the Clanfield Road, and the grassed area on Broad Street, are being considered as potential car parking areas. On the latter, there is no intention to remove the grassed area completely and turn it into a car park. What is being considered is to create more car parking bays around the grassed area perimeter, by constructing some additional bays on the west side of the grassed area by the houses. It is then understood that, if we have the remaining grassed area declared an 'Ornamental Verge' we could legally stop cars being parked on it, which would arguably help us in maintaining the grassed area in a better condition than it is today.

On the use of the verges along the Clanfield Road as car parking bays, this has been looked at in the past, but was turned down by the OCC. However, the subject has been raised again by some of the residents of the area. and as such is on the Parish Council agenda once again.

The issue in fact will be the subject of a debate at the Annual Parish Meeting on 21st April (Village Hall 7.30pm), with the arguments for and against being put by the opposing sides. It could be an interesting debate, so please do come along and participate, since it is important for the Parish Council to hear all of the views.

Transport Study

Finally, the OCC do recognise that the County has a major problem with traffic, and have commissioned Halcrow to conduct a comprehensive Transport Network Review, with one of the main aims being a total review





The Gardening Page

I expect like me you have all been inundated with bulb catalogues; they seem to appear with each post. While reading through some of them 'Blueberries' caught my eye. If I buy some specified plant I can get two blueberry bushes free, and if I buy two of another, I get one blueberry bush free.

It made me begin to think, we don't really use the blueberry over here, it's more common in American. There, they seem to eat this fruit for breakfast, lunch, tea and dinner. There are blueberry pies, blueberry crumbles, blueberry muffins, blueberry cheesecakes; anything it seems can have blueberries in it.

So I thought to myself, I'll have a go at growing one of these bushes. But first I'll find out a little more about this plant. I do like to know what I'm planting in my garden!

Believe it or not it turned out that the blueberry bush is a distant relation of our ground covering wild bilberry, which flourishes best on the wild moors Dartmoor and Exmoor.

With that piece of knowledge I now know that it likes peat to grow in, and as most of our soil around here is clay, I guess it would really benefit by planting it in a tub, using a peat based

Another interesting fact is that blueberry does not need to be sprayed, as it has its own unique way of dealing with pests and diseases.

As the bush matures it has lovely light green foliage which in the autumn turns to a lovely orange scarlet colour just before the leaves fall. These bushes will carry on bearing fruit for at least 50 years. Just think, a lifetime of delicious desserts from the same bush - a new entry in the fruit section at the Gardening Club's show??

Don't forget about all your springtime bulbs that have been flowering away for weeks and brightening the garden up after the misery of winter. It's a great temptation to cut those unsightly dead looking leaves off, but don't. The bulbs need the nourishment of the dead plants to be able to flourish well the next year. This normally takes a

month or so to do. To give them a treat you can give them a drop of 'phostrogen' which the old leaves will love. The same applies to the bulbs, which you have had in the house. Let them stay in the pot and wither away. then keep them somewhere dry and you can plant them out the following autumn.

Getting back to all these catalogues, as they like to remind us it is time to think about what plants we will be putting in our hanging baskets and pots this year. Also, what seeds we need to be planting. Always so much to do and think about this time of the year! These days though it's easy just to pop down to the local Garden Centre and choose. You then don't need to store trays around the window sills or wherever they won't get the frost. Many times I've lost my young seedlings as I've left them outside thinking they would be safe.

Good Friday is the day when you should be planting your first potatoes, so when the evenings get lighter and the weather warmer you can sit back and enjoy that lovely taste of fresh early new potatoes, especially with the aroma of fresh mint.

I can't remember too many wet Good Fridays; they always seem to rally around things which were happening in the garden and it was always sunny. Mother would be weeding the flower borders, my father giving the grass its first cut of the year and inevitably the mower would misbehave so the job took twice as long! We enjoyed our hot cross buns, with freshly made butter and jam, which the baker had delivered to the house a few days before. The garden at Bampton Manor as you look through the gates is a beautiful picture of early snowdrops and crocuses. Easter time it will be daffodils and tulips. It's worth making a detour when you're out walking in the Village just to look in as you pass the gate.

That's enough from me rambling on, hope to see you at the Garden Club's Summer Show in June. Get busy with manuring those roses as you've got some competition coming!

Bampton Environmental Watch Group (BEWG)

On the 15th October last year BEWG held its last open meeting of the year when Dr John Wilson, an historian based at Cogges Farm Museum, gave a fascinating insight into past rural life in England. He based his talk on his own collection of rural artefacts, which he brought along to the meeting.

As is usual we held no open meetings throughout the winter months with the next meeting being our AGM on 5 March 2004 when our speaker will be Mark McArthur-Christie, an independent writer and commentator on transport. His talk entitled "Road Rage — road traffic in the 21st century" is close to the heart of everyone living in Bampton. Our other open meetings scheduled for the year are: 28 April, when Martin Way will give a talk on "The History of Brize Norton and Carterton"; 28 July when we will have a talk given by Ian Gourlay who is a dendrologist [dendrologythe scientific study of trees]; 27 October when we hope to have a speaker on conservation.

There are three planning issues that have been exercising BEWG for some time. The first, which has finally come to a conclusion relates to the redevelopment of the Fairacres Nursery. Following various proposals spread over several years, the last application to redevelop the site with six industrial workshops (Class B1/ B8) was given conditional approval on 16 February. Many Bampton residents along with BEWG, the SPB and the Parish Council opposed this proposal, but both our District Councillors supported it at the final stage. Let us hope that the site does bring some jobs to Bampton without too great an effect on our traffic problems and the floodplain.

The second planning issue, which is becoming something of a saga, relates to applications by the Church Commissioners to build on the water meadow alongside Deanery Cottage in Church View. The initial application for two cottages was refused by WODC. The Church Commissioners

went to appeal but at the same time submitted a new proposal for one cottage. Subsequently WODC refused their second application for a single cottage. The Church Commissioners then went to appeal on this second refusal. This means they now have two appeals outstanding on the same site. We understand that the Inspector, representing the Secretary of State for the Environment, will be hearing both appeals together in the summer. We must wait until then to find out if there will be one, two or (we hope) no cottages built on this site.

Finally we have the West Oxfordshire Local Plan 2011. You will be aware that in the second deposit draft of the plan, against the advice of both their Cabinet and Planning Officers, WODC was persuaded by one of our District Councillors (Jonathan Phillips) to include a site at New Road for 100 houses with 50% "affordable". This was met with much opposition and a little support (in fact it attracted vastly more letters of opposition than any other change to the plan across the whole of West Oxfordshire). The next official stage in the progress of the Local Plan is a Public Inquiry scheduled to begin on 6 July this year, but in the light of the opposition WODC have now decided to recommend to the Inquiry Inspector that the New Road site be deleted from the plan. WODC have also decided to express their preference to the Inspector for a smaller site of 25-30 houses with 100% of these being affordable (but this last preference is dependent on changes to the planning guidance that is still to be published by Central Government). Even if both these recommendations are adopted by the Inspector, included in a revised Local Plan and the houses are built, the Plan will not give any priority to people with a Bampton connection in the allocation of the "affordable" houses on the site.

The Cookery Corner

When thinking of April we think of April showers, freshly cut grass, Daffodils and of course Easter eggs! So in anticipation I have come up with a fantastic egg recipe which is great for springtime, as it is slightly summery and light but also nutritious and satisfying! This classic recipe can be a great meal for breakfast, brunch or really any time of the day!

Ingredients

180g of basmati rice
700g smoked haddock
4 eggs boiled for 9 minutes
bay leaf
ground cumin
lemon
turmeric
1 onion chopped
2 cloves garlic
fresh parsley

tablespoon of cream
Firstly cook the rice in plenty of salted water for the appropriate time then drain, rinse in cold water and refrigerate until needed. Next, fry the haddock in a little olive oil for a few minutes on a low heat then add a little water and a bay leaf and turn off the heat and cover. When cooled flake

the fish into chunks. Peel the eggs and cut into quarters. Melt about 115g of butter in a pan over a gentle heat and add the chopped onion and garlic. Soften for five minutes then add the cumin and two teaspoons of turmeric and continue cooking for one minute. Add the juice and grated rind of one lemon, the fish and the rice, and gently heat. Add the cream and stir through. Finally add the eggs to heat them then serve with a generous handful of chopped parsley and wedges of lemon.

They say that when you get older all you have left in life is your memories! That sounds terribly sad doesn't it? But I must admit that it is nice to have been there, done that, and got the 'T' shirt. If more of our youngsters were to take time out to listen to the tales of us 'oldies' they would find out that we are guilty of more outrageous behaviour than they could ever dream of. It is just that our tricks were not quite so destructive!

I do find it increasingly difficult to keep up with modern parlance, even with the help of my Grandchildren. I

overheard some voungsters the other day discussing STD Now Subscriber Trunk Dialling is something I happen to know about. I remember when it first came in, as it saw the demise of the Witney telephone exchange; all those lovely girls that we could have a chat to and get to know them by name as they made our telephone connections to the National Network were made redundant. But sadly I had got it all wrong! STD nowadays mean Sexually Transmitted Diseases! Thank good-

ness there was not so much of that about in our days. It is vogue nowadays to be 'wicked' and 'cool'. As I have always been naughty and these last few months been so cool that I've been ruddy frozen, then surely I must be part of the 'in' crowd.

Getting back to memories, I spent a wonderful morning recently viewing the "Bampton in World War One" exhibition in the Vesey room of the old Grammar School. It was fascinating; all credit to those who prepared and presented such a wonderful show. I did not come to Bampton till 1943 so I did not know many of the people in the photographs. Those that I did were of course much older when I knew them, but every one was a true Bamptonian with loads of character. My memories are based more on World War Two and I do feel that there is a great need to get a record of what went on then in Bampton whilst there are still people about who can remember. Things like the aeroplane crash at Backhouse Farm - we were

Guard with their parades. Much more entertaining than the 'Dads Army' that we used to see on television. To be honest they were much more frightening as well, especially when you consider that they were Bampton's last line of defence! I remember George Collins, my Dad's boss, always being immaculately turned out. I am sure that he has a few stories to tell. On one 'Sunday exercise' down by the Signal camp, they were using a similar appliance tied to their rifles that you get in the middle of a Christmas cracker to make it go 'bang'. This was done to accli-

matise them to gunfire! Then there was the V.E. day celebrations in Bampton; what a day! There was a band playing, much singing, dancing and revelry culminating with a bonfire right outside the Town Hall. My best memory was seeing father leading my pet lamb Valentine (she was born on the 14 February) through the streets with two Union Jacks stuck in her fleece. I do feel that all these things are part of

Bampton's history and should be recorded now. So those of you who are a little older than me and were able to play a bigger part in Bampton's role, please get in touch with either the Editor or those responsible for recording our heritage. Let's call them the 'Vesey Gang'. We shall all be richer for it.

In my last Beam article I raised concern about the alterations to the area around the Town Hall and how it



still ploughing up remnants in the 1960s. Then there was the young teenagers who used to trek over to what was known as the 'DZ' down the Chimney road and come back with pieces of silk parachutes and elasticised ropes, I was too young to go with them, but they would come back and regale us with what they had seen. How I would love to hear those stories again.

Then there was Bampton's Home

might affect our Shirt Race. I see now that there was no need for alarm, in fact I must say it is fantastic and I just can't wait to try it out.

Wearing my Agriculture and political hat, I find it fascinating that many of the immigrants to this country, both legal and illegal are being employed in agriculture. Why? Is there a resurgence in menial tasks on the farms? All my life I have seen foreign people being part of the lowest paid work force; there were Italian POWs followed by Germans; then, what was for the day, a very politically correct description 'Displaced persons', who were mainly Poles and Slovakians. So I don't know what all the fuss is about. I know that the Government is complaining that it is very difficult to keep 'tabs' on these people, but for a Government who, mainly due to the co-operation of our farmers, knows the where-abouts of every cow and calf in this country, as well as their birthdays and gender, I would have thought that it was quite simple!

When you look at the agriculture scene around Bampton now, those enormous tractors and equipment, no animals, just acres and acres of arable crops you can see that there is no need for a large work force. Yet it was not so long ago when many of us were growing sugar beet as part of a Government initiative as well as potatoes and swedes that we were desperate for helpers on the land. Thinking about it, sugar beet was very labour intensive. First there was the operation in the spring known as 'singling', where the seedlings had to be singled out to twelve inches apart. This involved a large number of Bampton women folk as well as the local gypsies; the ones that were of the true Romany tradition, who for a field to camp in and a small remuneration would work for you.

Then in the Autumn at harvest time the sugar beet would be lifted two at a time to be banged together to knock all the dirt off then placed in rows with their roots facing each other ready for the next operation, topping. Here, armed with all sorts of appliances from billhooks to meat cleavers, machetes to broken slasher heads, the work force would chop off approximately one inch of the top of the beet and throw them into small heaps along the field, a bit like the Indians scalping the cowboys! You can imagine that during cold weather spells when you could not feel the tips of your fingers, that we kept the local doctors busy with their stitching. In fact Dr Bullen was renowned for his expertise at stitches. After all this work, the scalped tops would be placed in rows ready to be fed to the cows as fodder, then it was time to pick up the heaps of beet, load them onto a trailer, very often putting two trailers on to the tractor, one behind the other; it was allowed in those days, no brakes on the trailers but then they only travelled at about eight miles an hour - imagine the chaos it would cause on the roads today! Then off we would go to Bampton station, where if we were lucky, and the rail staff were in a good mood, they would arrange for a fifteen-ton truck to be in the dock by the platform for us, making it easy for us to unload. More often I am afraid, they were awkward and made us throw the beet some six feet into the air onto the trucks that were left in the sidings.

It was hard work, but to this day I still enjoy the rapport that I have with all those people that I worked with; the Bamptonians with great characters and a fantastic community spirit. Yes I know that all that I've got is my memories. But I am definitely not sad!






